


ST. PATRICK CATHOLIC CHURCH CELEBRATES 150TH ANNIVERSARY



St. Patrick's Church of Palms will celebrate its 150th Anniversary as a parish on Sunday, September 18, with Mass at 11:00 a.m. with Bishop Joseph Cistone and Fr. Peter Nwokoye.

After Mass a luncheon will be served in the Parish Center at 12:30 p.m. with kid's entertainment and a church raffle to follow.

Anyone in the community that would like to celebrate this special day with St. Patrick's is welcome to attend.

A HISTORY OF THE ST. PATRICK PARISH

Catholic settlers arrived in what is now the village of Palms in the 1850's.

Coming from Canada, the families of John Smith, Michael Dyer, Patrick Deegan, and John Lavin settled on the land. It was predominantly Irish families that first came to Palms.

One early settler, Patrick Deegan, was a teacher as well as a dairy farmer. He taught both religion and education to the people of the area. His two brothers, John and Peter, also settled in Palms. John had 13 children and it was the custom that the youngest son (Edward) get the farm with the understanding that he would care for his parents in their old age.

Mrs. Lavin, mid-wife and doctor, brought with her a surgeon's needle and Irish linen thread which would not cause infection. She and her husband lived across the road from the Deegans. As early as 1852, these families were ministered to sacramentally by Fr. Lawrence Kilroy who came about once a year from St. Clair. Mass was celebrated in people's homes. It was most often celebrated in the residences of the Brady's and Deegan's since their homes were centrally located.

The first man to die in this Catholic settlement, Mr. Cleary, was buried in the Ruth Cemetery. However, in 1855, when Matthew Brady died, it was decided to bury him on his own land instead of taking him north to Ruth as was the custom. This became the site of the church cemetery and also determined the location of the first parish church, one mile north of the present site of Palms. DECKERVILLE MAN DIES IN TRACTOR ROLL-OVER ACCIDENT

Sanilac County Sheriff Garry Biniecki stated that Central Dispatch received a call on September 12, 2011 at 1:17 p.m. for a roll-over accident involving a farm tractor while in a field brush-hogging.

Deputies responded to the scene and the investigation revealed that 74-year-old, Blaine Allen Kerbyson, of Deckerville was brush-hogging a lane in a field near Stevenson and Loree Roads in Marion Township, when he rolled the tractor into a 20-foot ravine.

Deputy Brad Thompson

advised that Mr. Kerbyson was

backing his John Deere Model 3020 tractor northbound down the lane to make another pass with his brush-hog when his rear wheel went off the lane and caused the tractor to roll over into the 20-foot ravine to the east of the lane. The rolling over of the tractor crushed Mr. Kerbyson between the tractor and the ground causing fatal injuries. Mr. Kerbyson was pronounced deceased at the scene.

Sheriff's Deputies were assisted at the scene by Deckerville Fire Department, Sanilac EMS and the Sheriff's Victim Services Unit. See obituary on page 4.

helped support the pastor there, Fr. Marker, by furnishing food and cutting his wood.

It was in 1861 that St. Patrick Parish was established. At this time, the settlers were all of Irish descent. It was only in 1880 that the first Germans, the Philip Roth family, settled in Palms.

Mass was celebrated on Fridays in that first simple log church. It was Fr. Laugel of Ruth who came to say Mass. Later in 1870, a frame church was constructed, but it burned in 1898.

In the meantime, the railroad was built in 1881. Francis Palms, after whom the town was named, owned considerable land and lumber and promoted the railroad intersection at Palms.

When Fr. Anthony Burke became the first resident pastor of St. Patrick's in July, 1894, he realized that the railroad depot would facilitate departure to other parts of the diocese. Therefore, he had the rectory built in Palms.

The third church of St. Patrick's was built on its present site in 1899, next door to the rectory. Land for the church was donated by the John Deegan family. It was begun in the springtime with brick being hauled from the Minden City brick yard. The church was opened for Christmas.

Fr. Edmund McQuaid replaced Fr. Burke in 1908 and stayed until September, 1926, when Fr. A. J. George arrived. The rectory was remodeled. He remained until January, 1938 when he was transferred.

Fr. Anthony Busutti was appointed to succeed him. It was at this time the Diocese of Saginaw was established under Most Rev. William Murphy and from this time Palms was part of the Diocese of Saginaw. Fr. Busutti renovated and decorated the church. He remained until the fall of 1947.

Fr. Phillip Viktonoski came here for a few months and then Fr. Cornelius Bates was appointed administrator and stayed until the fall of 1948.

Fr. Michael Wolf was administrator from the fall of 1948 until the spring of 1949. He passed away on January 5, 2011, at the age of 96. He was the eldest and longest serving priest of the Saginaw Diocese.

Fr. Kyran McGinn came here for two years starting in the spring of 1949 and Fr. Francis Piaskowski stayed for four months starting in September of 1951 and he was succeeded by Fr. John Nagel in January 1952.

In 1952, the Men's Club of the parish built a hall west of the church which served as a meeting center for classes, funeral dinners, and wedding receptions. This land was donated to the parish by Edward Deegen, son of John.

Fr. John Nagel celebrated his 25th Anniversary on June 2, 1954, with a High Mass of Thanksgiving at St. Patrick Church. Fr. Nagel served the last 18 years of his priestly ministry at St. Patrick's Church retiring in March of 1970. He died on November 22, 1977, in Utica.

Fr. Ray Oswald was ordained on June 2, 1962, at St. Mary's Cathedral in Saginaw. The next day he said his First Solemn Mass at St. Patrick's in Palms. Fr. Ray was a graduate from Sts. Peter and Paul High School in Ruth. He died on November 8, 1986.

Fr. Richard Ratajczak was here for a short time followed by Fr. Francis Lukowicz who stayed until 1972.


In 1972, St. Patrick Church became a mission church of Sts. Peter and Paul in Ruth. Fr. Gerard Gumbleton was the first priest to serve both parishes and he was here four years.

In September 1973, St. Patrick's parish honored Fr. Francis Lukowicz on his retirement with a Mass and dinner. During the dinner that followed, Parish Council president, James Roth, thanked Fr. Lukowicz. He died in July, 1995.

In 1976, Fr. Francis Murray's six year stay was interrupted with a special mission from the bishop. During his absence, Fr. Ronald Dombrowski became pastor for eight months. On Fr. Murray's return, he was promoted to a monsignor on February 15, 1981, at Sts. Peter and Paul, *CONTINUED ON PAGE 5*


Sister Betty Zeestraten, O.S.F. took over as pastoral administrator when Sister Theresa left in 2002. She remained here for three years leaving in 2005.

What began 150 years ago strictly Irish parish is now co posed of a number of national





St. Patrick Church has two cemeteries. Our current cemetery, St. Patrick Church Cemetery, is located on Ridley Road in Minden Township about one mile north of the church and is approximately five acres in size. It dates back to 1855.

Rosbury cemetery is located Road Church on Bridgehampton Township southeast of Deckerville. A Catholic Church was located about a quarter of mile north of the cemetery and closed in 1908. The last person to be buried in the cemetery was in 1937.
