Convent Must Be Built Now

It is quite possible that a very large number of St. Clement's parishioners are solidly behind any and all projects that will advance the parish. We mean by that, that they have realization that in order for us to do a thorough job in our religious work we must be able to keep pace with the requirements.

The new school is a shining example of what can be done when the will of the people is stirred sufficiently. Although it is not completely paid for, we have reduced its debt handsomely. However, as facts printed elsewhere reveal, we may not be able to start construction of the convent because of financial reasons.

Our debt cannot exceed \$300,-000.00, by Chancery orders. The debt (unless some miracle happens) will be approximately \$200,000.00 in April. We must start construction in April so that occupation of the building can take place before school opens in September.

The anticipated first grade enrollment will be somewhere around 500. Add that to the last two large first classes and it is easy to, see where the seven rooms, now used as the Nuns dormitory, will be quickly occupied with students.

It is easily observed then, that those who are merely making token (small change) donations must accept their full share of responsibility and increase their offerings to a substantial level comparable to their ability to give.

Habitual dollar givers who can give more are, likewise, urged to honestly raise their level of donations.

Actually, what really is needed is for more families to give five dollars per Sunday. Many families are enjoying both husband

The editor of THE REPORTER said we would have to head this column with my picture. I told Mr. Editor the parishioners knew what I looked like. He said; "Maybe so, but how about the people who continuously go to the late Masses - perhaps your picture would refresh their memories." He had me there.

> The picture is the same one we used last year but, after all, I haven't changed much even if I say so myself. (Editor's note: let's not disillusion him.)

> To become serious, however, and to discuss happenings of the past twelve months, and to look into the future is the intention of this column.

> You have noted, perhaps, that we intend to make as complete a report as we possibly can. Two issues of THE REPORTER will be necessary. By careful segatiny of this issue and the one of next Sunday you will find quite complete details. Statistics are presented on the matters vital to the conducting of a parish. Besides being 'interesting', we hope that you will make them your concern.

By the Grace of God, and your cooperation, we paid off \$155 000.00 to the Chancery. As of January 1954 our debt was \$385,-000.00. As of January 1955 (right now) it is \$230,000.00.

A year ago (1953) we had just completed a major parish money-raising project - "The Manor from Heaven." In 1954 we relaxed. No major project was undertaken. It was felt that the parishioners would appreciate it if they weren't burdened with anything beyond the Annual Bazaar effort.

It would be very nice, I presume, if I could promise that we wouldn't undertake any big money-raising project this year. I dare NOT promise. I'll have to wait awhile and see what kind of promises I get from your Sunday offering envelope pledges. If they are good and it looks like they will be kept — well — maybe there will not be a big project.

THE CONVENT is our big problem for this year and it is upon us right now. The problem trimmed down to a few words is this; we need it so as to be occupied by September in order to release classrooms now being used as a dormitory by the Nuns. His Eminence, Edward Cardinal Mooney, is holding firm to his order not allowing parishes to exceed a debt of \$300,000.00. Our present debt when added to the anticipated cost (\$300,000.00) of the convent sends us well beyond the ceiling.

When April arrives, the time when construction should start, we shall have paid off another \$30,000.00. That, of course, is \$200,-000.00 beyond the limit and that is what presents such a problem. From the above figures it can be seen that with a \$200,000.00 current debt our borrowing limit would be \$100,000.00. That is insufficient to start construction. We could not build on a stop and go bers of the family do, too, we'll

Rosary Altar Society | Vital Statistics

When there is a loving and devoted mother in a home it is quite a certainty that that home is a happy one. You can be sure that all things are lovingly tended, and that things really get done.

It is quite the same in a parish where you have a Rosary Altar Society filled with so many such mothers such as we have at St. Clement. They had a very busy year in 1954 and without their helping hands we don't know what we would have done.

During the year they sponsored five card parties; many bake sales; cooked and served numerous breakfasts, luncheons, banquets, and dinners. Worked like beavers before, during, and after the annual bazaar. Sponsored a successful pantry shower for our Nuns.

Recalling the gigantic Living Rosary of May 2nd, it is remembered that the Rosary Altar Society gathered the 750 women that comprised the 50 Hail Mary beads - and had all of them there.

They were a great help at Fr. Murray's Silver Anniversary and on several other occasions when he had many priests for dinner, one at which Cardinal Mooney was present along with about 200 priests.

In June they entertained the National Council Archdiocesan League of Catholic Women at a buffet luncheon and were awarded a gavel for having the largest attendance. They took care of the dinners for Confirmation, the closing of Forty Hours Devotion and the mission store during the two weeks of the Mission.

They inaugurated the weekly Donation Parties by using ALL the linens and other prizes that were left over from the 1953 bazaar (and cleared \$500.00 on that event).

So, as you can see quite clearly, their unselfish devotion has been given quite tirelessly and very productively. As we stated earlier: "Without them we don't know what we'd do."

EDITORIAL-SUNDAY OFFERINGS

It is revealed in St. Paul's writings, that support of the church by its parishioners was deemed necessary from the very beginning. He made frequent references to it and its necessity has never been questioned. Nor is it likely to ever be questioned because of the basic and obvious soundness of the principle.

Churct history reveals many eras in which the faithful, moved by a great urge to give, brought into existence great churches and cathedrals. It reveals also, that customary tithes of 10% paid in wheat, lambs, or whatever the faithful could offer sustained the church through many centuries.

It is revealed too, that where God's house was deemed unworthy of support, the land soon failed to yield.

It is not intended to imply that God makes it a practice of "getting even" with those who fail to give to Him. The statement was merely revelation of coincidental happenings which may lead to the belief that God's displeasure was achieved.

CHARITY heads the list in desirable emotions that can spring from the human soul. From that source goodness emanates in the form of love and, again, from love we find other virtues pouring forth — among which is — giving.

Giving, of course, without expectance of recompense has greater wealth in its structure than that which expects a comparable return. Giving, however, in the true spirit of CHARITY, must, according to Holy Scripture, yield a return beyond the comprehension of mortal minds. For, as St. Paul states in the second epistle to the Corinthians (1X-7) "God loveth a cheerful giver."

Would not giving generously in Sunday offerings be giving in Christ's name? Is it not in furtherance, or perpetuation of His works? Is it not for the purpose of expanding God's word in this world so that more souls can find the way into the Kingdom of Heaven?

Why then — when God's bounty pours generously into one's life can it not be seen that a great Love is endeavoring, perhaps, to awaken a sleeping soul that has not yet realized that — "from God do all blessings flow."

It would seem wise then, to reconsider, or re-evaluate the measure of CHARITY pouring forth from the number one source oneself. One can say; "I love God with all my heart." To which one might ask; "Have you successfully separated your heart from your purse to the extent that while you personally will NOT MISS MASS - you will, however, allow your Sunday offering envelope to MISS MASS?

basis as that would increase costs considerably. Where then will the needed \$200,000.00 come from?

Through use of the CONVENT ENVELOPES. If each one of our 2000 families would give a minimum of \$10.00 per month specifically for the convent (exclusive of regular offerings) we would realize \$20,000.00 per month. If this can be accomplished for the next eight months (February thru September) and to be added to our regular collections, there would be the \$200,000.00 needed.

There are many who can exceed this and some who could give a substantial gift at this present time which is so utterly important.

The parish will have the opportunity to exhibit their intentions, regarding this request, through the donations to be made during the next two months of February and March. From the donations obtained and the seriousness demonstrated in the use of the convent envelopes we shall determine whether or not the construction shall start in April.

We have pointed out the need for this building so frequently that I believe it hardly necessary to again affirm it.

You recall that last year I asked you to give this \$10.00 extra a month which was met with 5% response. Had this request been met even halfway, you can see how much lighter my burden and your burden would be today.

I ask you in all seriousness, with great pleadings, and even beg of you, together with my humble forgiveness to hear this plea.



St. Vincent de Paul

St. Clement parish has an active St. Vincent dePaul group who meet regularly each week. their work, of course, covers a wide field of charitable needs. There are the poor; sometimes a destitute soul or family; a deprived aged person or couple; deserted children; and many other serious situations that need a helping hand.

In the spirit of St. Vincent de Paul these men, listed below, analyze the cases and act to the best of their means and ability. They have splendid ability but usually the means are rather meager.

The Living Rosary

An outstanding parish accomplishment was the unique, and original, presentation of the gigantic Living Rosary produced last May 2nd in which the parishioners of St. Clement paid dutiful, and loving respect to Our Blessed Mother in her Marian Year.

Seven hundred and ninety-five women and high school girls (fifteen to a bead) comprised the Hail Mary prayers. Ninety men comprised the Apostles Creed, Lord's Prayer and Glory Be pravers.

A gigantic rosary was formed by the 885 parishioners. Accompanying these people were; a large assembly of fully dressed K. of C. Honor Guards; several hundred school children; the Nuns; ushers; and hundreds of the faithful.

The Blessed Sacrament was carried in all its glorious dignity and, as you should never forget, while father Murray elevated the Sacred Host for adoration - the overcast clouds parted at that precise moment through which God's everlasting sun shined brilliantly upon us - just for hat fleeting moment.

Following the recessional of the Blessed Sacrament, rain again fell from the Heavens. The good people returned to their homes with a feeling in their hearts that God was pleased that they had so honored His Beloved Marv.
