Life of St. George, Martyr

Feast Day - April 23rd

St. George was born in Cappadocia, at the close of the third century, of Christian parents. In his early youth he chose a soldier's life, and soon obtained the favor of Diocletian, who advanced him to the grade of tribune.

When the Roman Emperor began to persecute the Christians, George rebuked him sternly and openly for his cruelty and informed him that everyone should believe in Jesus Christ and His teachings. He then gave up his title as colonel. He was subjected to a series of torments, and finally beheaded.

There was something so inspiring in the defiant cheerfulness of this young soldier that every Christian felt a personal share in this triumph of Christian fortitude and as years went by St. George became a type of successful combat against evil and cowardice, the slayer of the dragon of sin, the darling theme of camp song and story, "so thick a shade his very glory round him made" that his real lineaments became hard to trace.

Even beyond the circle of Christiandom he was held in honor and invading Saracens taught themselves to except from desecration the image of him they hailed as the "White-horse Knight."

True devotion to St. George is one of the most ancient and widely spread in the Church. A Church of St. George is ascribed to Constantine, and his name is invoked in the most ancient liturgies, while Malta, Barcelona, Valencia, Arragon, Genoa and England have chosen him as their patron saint.

St. George was beheaded by the Romans when he was still a young man in his late twenties and was very happy to be a martyr for Jesus Christ.

Origin of St. George Society

On a beautiful May evening in 1887 a small group of Polish immigrants met after their hard day's work to discuss and gossip about their work and conditions in this free and friendly land of Bay City, Michigan. As they conversed they came to the conclusion that there was a need of a young organization which would be the answer to their various problems. This Society would have two groups: the first group would be the administrative group from which they would get aid during sickness, injury and death benefits. The second group would be a military unit in which the members could show their physical abilities. With this in mind they set out to acquire as many young men as possible who would be interested in joining and forming this organization. After a month's work of contacting possible members, a meeting was held on Sunday, July 10, 1887 and the Society was officially organized. At this meeting the group named itself the Society of the Knights of St. George. (Rycerzy 'Sw' Jerzego).

They formed the two groups as suggested. The military unit was formed to carry on the tradition of the Polish Army,

with the thought in mind that possibly they may be called to their homeland to help fight the oppressors of Poland who in those years were numerous and persistant.

The first President of the administrative group was John Zaremba. Recording Secretary, Francis Agdanowski; Financial Secretary, Joseph Dukarski; and Treasurer, John Jozwiak.

The military unit was headed by John Zaremba Captain; Michael Wojciechowski, First Lieutenant; Stanley Wozniak, Second Lieutenant; John Szulc, Sergeant; Leon Waljrowski, Drummer.

The Society held its meetings at St. Stanislaus Parish School until years later when the society moved its activities to Pulaski Hall after acquiring shares in the hall.

The military unit lasted about 37 years and was disbanded when young members could not be encouraged to continue the activities of the unit.

The Knights of Columbus Color Corps participate and act as honor guard for the group on these occasions and the Sciety is deeply grateful to the Corps for their generous co-operation and spirit of fraternalism.

History of St. George Society

Through the early years of this newly organized society it was a hardship for the members to keep up their sworn duty to aid their sick and needy members. With the minor dues of 25 cents per month, which were paid by each member, it was soon found insufficient to meet the request of aid to sick members. When the treasury was in very poor condition the members contributed to a collection at the meetings which was used to aid the needy sick members.

In order to build up the society treasury it was agreed that all members would be assessed 25 cents at the death of a member and 25 cents fine for not attending semi and annual meetings. At the death of a member the society arranged for a Mass to be said for the deceased and the Knights in uniform served as pallbearers.

In May, 1918, it was decided to hold an annual party or ball for the members and their wives. This practice continued through the years and a party was held regularly except for rare occasions during the war when funds were used to purchase war bonds and aiding the needy.

In December, 1918, the members agreed to pay \$2.00 each to the treasury so that the society could increase the death benefits to the widows and families of deceased members.

The membership for years was comprised of about 50 members who at times found it difficult to continue their membership due to lack of funds and shortage of work. As conditions improved and the men were again able to renew and continue their membership they encouraged others to join. The membership did not increase very rapidly through the years until about the early 20's when membership drives were put on to acquire active members. During this period the society funds grew steadily and as the demand for benefits decreased the society was able to meet its obligations readily and had built up a reserve fund.

In due time the society was financially able to loan money to the Pulaski Hall, later acquiring shares for the amount of the loan.

The society boasted having 80 members who all were members of the Association insurance and by virtue of this membership were able to move their meetings to the Pulaski Hall. Membership in the society was extended through the Polish area of the south end and the activities were limited to St. Stanislaus Praish before St. Hyacinth Parish was organized.

In November, 1919, the society with many other Polish organizations participated in the 150th celebration of Pulaski Day to honor the Polish General.

In 1920 the members agreed to aid returning war veterans who had ben members by giving each one \$25.00. The society

as well as others of Polish descent purchased Polish W. Bonds to aid Poland.

To make it more desirable and easy for prospective mebers to join, the society changed the age limits from 16 35 inclusive.

In September, 1924 the society sponsored a family pict at the Wenonah Beach which was a very popular resort the time. Transportation to the beach was mostly by stre car and many families attended.

To encourage members to join, it was agreed to perr members to join the society as social members only, in those that later they may be impressed upon to join the surance and benefit group. These social members paid 5 ce per month and were not eligible to any benefits but con attend social functions.

In 1925 when the St. Stanislaus Parish celebrated 50th year and Golden Jubilee, the society members participawith a contribution and the Knights attended in unifor The Pulaski Hall celebrated its 25 years of existence same year.

At some time in this early history of the society was noted that the members separated into two groups; a section belonging to St. Stanislaus Parish and the other coprising of the St. Hyacinth Parish unit. When it was for that it was not practical, the two units rejoined.

In July, 1937, the society celebrated its Golden Jub very modestly with the members and wives attending a sole High Mass and a Corporate Communion.

In July of the following year the society put on anor membership drive offering to give each promoter \$1.00 a the new applicant had joined and remained a member six months. A large number of members was initiated and the time the members were to receive their fee for gain new members it was voted to leave the money in the treas and forego paying the \$1.00 to the sponsors of new memb These funds were to be used to promote social activities the members. Activities for the members varied from an parties to Halloween and New Years Eve celebrations.

About 1940 the membership began increasing and activities of the society continued. This was the incentive the membership gain as the area people took advantage participating in the social functions sponsored by the soc

Donations were made through the parish to service and the society pressed its members to aid the March of Di

History of St. George Society

The first record of a Fish Fry for the members was put on in November, 1942 and \$48.40 was made, and from the records it was assumed to have been for the March of Dimes.

In 1943 the society purchased additional U.S. Government Bonds. This same year the age limit for applicants was raised to 40 years and anyone over 40 could join the "social' group.

The following year the society agreed to preserve the statue of St. George which was in St. Stanislaus Church, and have it reconditioned to be presentable to keep in its place in the Church.

Members entering the armed forces were exempted from paying dues and a collection box was used to promote the gathering of extra funds to buy items for the men in service.

In June 1944 this society presented a request to the Pulaski Hall to arrange for a larger meeting room which was needed, due to the increased attendance at meetings of members.

This same year the society members agreed to accept members who were not necessarily of Polish descent but were married to wives who were Polish.

In 1946 new amendments to the Consitution were approved and a resolution made to have the Constitution printed in both Polish and English. Up to this time the society conducted its meetings in Polish and many members of the younger group were unable to speak and express themselves well in Polish, so it was agreed that these members could speak in English at the meetings.

The following July the society celebrated its 60 years of existence with Corporate Communion and a breakfast served at Pulaski Hall.

In July, 1948 a resolution was passed by the members exempting members over 70 years of age from paying dues. Although these members were still eligible to receive all benefits of the society. This resolution was received with appreciation by the members in the eligible group.

In November of this year Robert Przepiora was chairman for a dance which netted \$36.90.

In January, 1949 it was agreed that the social members be absorbed into the society and all these members, if they wished to continue in the society, would pay dues and assessments the same as the beneficiary members and would be eligible to all benefits.

In February, 1949, Michael Borkowski volunteered to chairman a committee to translate and word the Constitution

into a revised English edition. The following January the members agreed to discontinue the death assessment which was a cause of trouble to the Financial Secretary and the dues were raised to 35 cents per month. More changes to the Constitution were approved and about this time the society boasted 346 members.

In February, 1951, member Michael Borkowski took over the management of the Pulaski Club and in this position was very effective in helping the society grow. He continued in this position for nine years and was the backbone of activities and functions which the society held at the Pulaski Hall.

In July it was decided to change the annual meeting date to December instead of July as in the past.

April, 1952 was a notable month as member Casimer Jablonski was appointed City Manager of Bay City.

The year 1953 saw the society start with 479 members and this same year it was agreed that new members would have to pay a full year's dues when they joined the society. In June the society participated in the Polish Parade which was the first one held in a number of years.

In January, 1959 the society dues were increased to 50 cents per month (\$6.00 a year), As a result of this increase the society again increased the amount of sick and death benefits.

In February, 1959 the society held it first Mardi Gras party. Many members and wives attended dressed in numerous costumes.

The death benefits started out with only Masses being said for the deceased, but as the society grew and the funds were available the death benefit has been increased to \$100.00

The society was not only active in personal affairs all through the years of the growth of the city, the members were encouraged to participate in civic affairs and at election time the members were pressed to cast their votes for the candidate of their choice. The society has a number of notable figure on its roster. Such as Judge Leon Dardas, City Manager Casime: Jablonski, Attorneys Tony Bielaski, Clarence Mikolajcak and John McDonough, and Supervisors Bert Dryzga and Theodord Glaza.

Also numerous Commissioners and local businessmen The former City Street Commissioner John K. Zielinski, Sr was and still is an ardent worker of the society. The society has members in Saginaw, Linwood, Kawkawlin, Pinconning and St. Clair Shores.

History of St. George Society

In June, 1959 the society was instrumental in forming an equipment organization comprised of St. George Society, St. Stanislaus A.C. and Knight of Columbus Chapter 4102. In this merger all equipment used for picnic and other activities were pooled for the use of all three groups.

This organization also provides equipment to other groups who are in need of funds and find the equipment very convenient to help raise funds for many charitable purposes.

In the past several years the society has concentrated on its picnics to supplement funds for the operation of this growing society. In June, 1959 the society participated in the city's celebration of the opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway. A flowars entered in the parade depicting Bay City reaching a parts of the globe. A short time later the society was represented in the local French Parade held in the city.

December, 1959, the society made its first contributio to the care of retarded children of the area.

In early 1960 the society put on its second Mardi Graparty which as in the past was a great success. Through the recent years the society entertained an average of over 40 couples at the annual get-togethers.

John Zaremba

Mr. John Zaremba came to the United States from Poland in 1883, settling in Bay City where he became Organist, Choir Master, and teacher at St. Stanislaus. One of the founders of the St. George Society of which he served as Captain of the Military Unit, and first President.

Mr. Zaremba, father of Dr. A. J. Zaremba, lived on the corner of Van Buren and Kosciusko until his death in 1935 at the age of 90. He spoke seven languages fluently. As a student of History he was a staunch advocate of freedom for Poland.



Financial Officer's Report

As Financial Secretary, I am in a good position to note the importance and value of what this Society does for its members and the Community during any given period. As the Financial Reports are presented and questioned by the members at the meetings, this seems to be a time consuming but necessary issue. When all these figures are compiled we can see the real active St. George Society and what is done to abide by the principles of its Preamble and Constitution.

This article is written in the hopes that it will create an interest in the "Luke-Warm" members and convince them they should take a more active part in our programs and activities.

This is a brief look into the last year and a half, since yours truly as been Financial Secretary.

During this period, the St. George Society has done much to promote good-will and brotherhood between our members and give as much aid as possible to deserving charities and needy families in this area. For example:

The operating expenses of the St. George Society since January of 1960 have been close to \$12,000.00; which was paid out to local Businesses for equipment and services renthe Bay County area). The above amount does not include salaries paid to Officers or money spent on rent of meeting rooms or social activities promoted for the members.

Total Sick Benefits paid to members over the past year and a half amounted to \$5,900.00.

Death Benefits have been paid to the families of 17 deceased members.

Donations had been made to 23 needy families at Christmas time.

In addition to all of this, several charitable organizations have benefited from the St. George Society, including:

- 1. Youth Science Fair (Trophies)
- 2. St. Paul Seminary (Saginaw Diocese)
- 3. March of Dimes (Winter Festival Activity)
- 4. Queen of Angels Retreat House (Saginaw Diocese)

This Society has also donated flag poles to the two athletic fields which opened since 1960; namely St. Stanislaus and St. Hyacinth's.

In the past 18 months the Society has gained 75 new members while losing only 15.

The total membership at this writing is 657 active members and 35 honorary members, who have attained the age of 70. These honorary members no longer pay dues, yet are able to take advantage of social activities and receive benefits, for they are the members who, when membership was low, gave their time and effort to make the Society what it is today.

I am proud to be a member of an organization which, from a humble beginning has grown and prospered into a group which in the future, I am sure will continue to grow and increase benefits to members and be a credit to the community.

Joseph Madziar, born October 30, 1886 in Januszkowice, Poland, the son of Stanislaus and Sophia Madziar.

He immigrated to the United States with his father in 1901 settling in Chicago. After one year his father decided to go back to Poland, but Joseph convinced himself that this new country was for him, and started to travel about the country which was very rough going at that time.

Employment carried him to Wisconsin, lumbering in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, railroading and coal mining finally brought him to Bay City. When mining started to fade he secured employment at the Grey Iron Foundry in Saginaw until death in 1950.

He married Catherine Slaby and was the proud father of six children. Three of his sons served in the armed forces during World War II.

Very active in society work, he held offices in Tadeusz Kosciuszko, St. Barbara and St. George societies. Director of Pulaski Hall Association, member St. Stan Holy Name Society, and St. Stan A.C.

President of the St. George Society for 9½ years, passing away in the middle of his 10th term.

To Joe, as he was better known by his many friends, a great amount of credit is due for promoting the prestige and growth of the society to what it is today.

During his tenure of office meetings were conducted in both Polish and English to accommodate the younger members. Picnics became an annual affair to raise money for the society.

He was the first, to realize that the strength of the society was in its youth and encouraged membership drives which bore fruit when the membership grew during his terms as president from 75 to 350.

St. George Society was fortunate to have had many good leaders like Joe and the results are showing in the continuous growth of the society.





Picnics Are A Financial Success

History of Previous Picnics

In order to build up the funds of the Society the first picnic was held in 1939 and this picnic netted the Society \$226.27, which at the time was considered a very good profit.

In 1940 Bert Dryzga, Jr. was elected as chairman and John K. Zielinski, Sr. as treasurer of the next picnic which netted \$381.00.

By 1942 the proceeds increased to \$890.00 and and by 1947 the results of the experience began to show as the picnic proceeds increased to \$1,042.00. Through the years many active and tireless workers contributed a great deal to the success of the picnics.

John K. Zielinski, Bert Dryzga, Chester Luczak and Michael Borkowski were but a few of the numerous contributors in time and work.

In 1948 the picnic proceeds increased to almost \$2,000.00 and the Society put on a party for the workers in appreciation. This practice has continued the past few years in order to show the Society's appreciation for the efforts of all picnic workers.

In 1949 the picnic funds amounted to \$2,037.00 and this built the Society treasury to \$8,872.00.

Ray Przybylski (now deceased) joined the Society in 1940 and in a short time became one of its most active members. He was chairman of many picnics and social events. Many of the picnics of which Ray was chairman, the proceeds exceeded \$2,000.00 and up to \$2,900.00 He was a tireless promoter of activities for the members as well as profitable ventures.

The picnic held in August, 1959 netted the Society \$4,500.00, which is about the largest known net income.

In 1961 two of the younger members were selected to take charge of the picnic which also proved a success. The chairmen were: Dan Krzyzaniak and Richard Kowalczyk who were ably assisted by Chester (Scotty) Luczak who had years of experience in picnics. Members of the softball team contributed a great deal to this picnic.

This year it was unanimously agreed that the same chairmen put on the special picnic for the Diamond Jubilee Celebration.

The miliary unit (Rycerze) continued their activities for 37 years. Through this time the members participated in Church and civic affairs. The unit appeared in parades held in the city and formed an honor guard at all Church functions. During the early years it was a hardship on these members to purchase uniforms out of their meager wages and spend many evenings in drills and training, while working long hours to provide for their families.

The uniforms were kept in a wardrobe at the Pulaski Hall and it was the duty of the officers to see that the uniforms were returned in good condition and kept until the next function. The society had purchased the uniforms and each member was reimbursing the society on small installment basis.

Many St. Stanislaus parishioners may recall the Knights standing guard in the Church just before Easter when the body of Christ was laid in the grave in the Church niche. The members took pride in their ability to stand at long intervals, motionless, without twitching a muscle and many visitors believed them to be dummies and not live persons.

As the members grew older it was difficult to get good attendance at the functions and after numerous attempts to reorganize and recruit new young members to the Knights, they disbanded.

Some members retained their equipment, others left it. Some families still have parts of the uniforms worn by these members. In a short time all reference to the Knights was eliminated from the society's Constitution.

A fine Catholic practice of reciting the Rosary for our deceased members is carried on by a (few) members of the society. The recitation of the Rosary by the society is gratefully appreciated by the deceased family. 




