



Invoking God's blessings upon you and your parishioners, I remain






Felicitations and prayerful best wishes to all of you as you delebrate the centennary of your parish.

BIOGRAPHY OF ST. JOHN CANTIUS

JUNE 24, 1390 - DECEMBER 24, 1473



St. John Cantius was born in the little town of Kety, located in the Archdiocese of Krakow. The grammatical declension of Kety leads to Kanty, and so, our patron Saint has been known as St. John Kanty. Some churches - we included - have adopted the latin designation of Kanty and refer to him as St. John Cantius. This probably happened because all official church documents are usually written in Latin. When we use Polish, however, we have no trouble with Sw. Jan Kanty.

His parents, Stanislaw and Anna, were devout Catholics who fostered a strong Faith in their son. After his basic studies in Kety, and after much deliberation, he decided to go to Krakow to further his studies. He was already 23 years of age at the time. However, his thirst for knowledge allowed him to excel academically, and his zeal for goodness allowed him to grow in virtue and holiness.

In 1418 he received his doctorate in Philosophy and was appointed to the faculty of the University. In 1429 he assumed the Chair of Philosophy. He was 39 years old at the time. St. John Cantius was already a Priest at this time; however, we do not know the date of his Ordination. His biographers note that he must have been ordained sometime before 1421.

In 1439 he was given the honorary title of Canon and attached to the church of St. Florian in Krakow. He was also appointed pastor of St. Andrew Church in Olkusz. Because of difficulties that he would encounter there, St. John Cantius resigned after just eight weeks.

He returned to teaching, this time as a Doctor of Theology, where he remained for the rest of

his life. His reputation as a teacher was so highly regarded that after his death his doctoral gown was used to vest each new doctoral candidate.

However, St. John Cantius was canonized because of his holiness, and there are many stories of his evident holiness that all of us should try to emulate. For example, he was very concerned about the poor. In our church, we have a picture above one of the confessionals that tells the story of his concern and his reward for that concern. One Christmas Eve while walking to the church to celebrate Mass he saw a poor man fall down in the snow. He went to the man, found him shivering with the cold, and gave him his own cloak. When he returned home, he was greeted by Our Blessed Mother who gave him a new cloak. Another incident, which we also have painted above the other confessional, involved a young girl who had dropped her pitcher of milk, and, of course, lost pitcher and milk. St. John Cantius saw her crying and went up to her to see what had happened. As he held the pieces, the pitcher returned to its original form. Then he poured water into the pitcher that immediately turned into milk.

There are many other miracles attributed to him and many other acts of outstanding piety. For example, he walked to Rome four times. He said he did it to make reparation for his sins. After his death on Christmas Eve, 1473, there was great devotion manifested to him and many people attributed miracles to his intersession.

Why it took so long, we do not know, but St. John Cantius was finally canonized in 1767 by Pope Clement XII.



A significant number of Polish immigrants began arriving in America around the year 1870. Most of them came from the Prussian controlled section of Poland where they were restricted in the practice of their Catholic Faith and the use of their Polish language. They came to America to enjoy these freedoms; not just "for bread."

In the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, which at that time included all of the state of Pennsylvania, the first evidence of a strong, growing Polish community was in Shenandoah, Pennsylvania, where they established the Parish of St. Casimir in 1872. There were also groups of Polish immigrants in Conshohocken and Phoenixville, as well as our neighbors in Camden, New Jersey.

In the city of Philadelphia the first Polish Parish was established in 1882 in the section of Philadelphia known today as Fishtown. It was the parish of St. Laurentius. It was a dream come true not only for the Poles of the neighborhood, but for all Polish immigrants in the Philadelphia area. Now they could hear sermons, go to confession, maintain their customs and traditions, all in the Polish language. And, perhaps, more importantly, they had their Polish Priests who could understand them and lead them as they worked to fashion a new life in their adopted country.

As more and more immigrants arrived Philadelphia, there developed larger and str ger neighborhoods. In South Philadelphia, Parish of St. Stanislaus, Bishop and Martyr, founded in 1890.

At this time, there were about 90 Polish fa lies living in Bridesburg. Counting all the c dren, the Polish population of Bridesburg near 400. Most of them belonged to Laurentius Parish and had to travel by hor concern drawn trolley every Sunday to attend Massa Vespers. It seems that almost all of them tended Mass because we are told that the tra ther E. I portation company added extra trollies on Si day to accommodate all the people.

Because of the availability of work in neighborhood, more and more Poles moved i the Bridesburg-Frankford area, and, before lo it was obvious that a new Parish was needed 4636 Riwas decided that a petition should be present to Archbishop Patrick Ryan, and so, the folle ing men were elected to approach the Ar bishop: Mr. Stanislaw Wisniewski, Preside Mr. Andrzej Petner, Treasurer; Mr. Kazimi Kendzior, Secretary.

They arranged to meet with the Archbish and in May of 1892 they presented their requ for a new Parish in the Bridesburg-Frankfo area. Archbishop Ryan was very understand and he agreed that a new Polish Parish w needed. In fact, he promised to send them a P ish Priest as soon as one was available. At time, there was a Polish Seminarian at Charles Seminary who was scheduled to be dained on June 11, 1892. Everyone expected t he would be the Priest sent to them. For so reason, however, Mieczysław Kopytkiewicz w sent to St. Stanislaus Parish in South Philad phia where his brother, Father Mari Kopytkiewicz was Pastor. Shortly afterwar because of internal dissension, Father Mari resigned as pastor of St. Stanislaus and was


OUR FOUNDING PASTOR

REV. MSGR. MARIAN KOPYTKIEWICZ

Father Marian Kopytkiewicz arrived at St. John Cantius on September 17, 1892. His first concern was to find a place to offer the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. There were no halls available in all of Bridesburg, and so, he approached Father E. Deham, Pastor of the German Parish of All Saints, and asked for his help. Father Deham agreed to rent the old church at Edgemont and Buckius Sts. for the amount of \$12.50 a month. Father Marian then searched the neighborhood for a suitable Rectory, and he found a home at 4636 Richmond St.

On October 2, 1892, the first St. John Cantius Parish Mass was offered, and the joy experienced that day was to generate an enthusiasm that has carried on for 100 years. Father Kopytkiewicz made note of this in the anniversary book. He said they had nothing. His vestments, the cruets, the candles, the Missal, everything had to be borrowed. But there was such a feeling of joy and unity that at last they would have their own Parish.

From that time on the work of establishing a new Parish was begun. The first order of business was to build a church and rectory. Of course, money was needed, and so, a collection began, and by the end of October, \$889.55 was collected. On January 4, 1893, Father Kopytkiewicz was able to put a \$50.00 down payment on eight lots on Thompson St. Each lot measured 20 feet. Unfortunately, Mr. R. Dobbins, owner of the property died before the deal could be finalized, and the final payment of \$2,521.43 could not be made until September.

FIRST CHURCH, SCHOOL AND RECTORY

Plans were immediately made to build a church, school and rectory, all under one roof. F.I. Wintz & Co. began work on October 3, 1893, and by December 11, Father Kopytkiewicz was able to move into the new rectory. On December 17, the new church was blessed by Archbishop Patrick Ryan, and, interestingly, the sermon was delivered that day by Father Mieczyslaw Kopytkiewicz, the Priest who could have been the Founding Pastor.

The Parish records show that the original building - church, school and rectory - cost \$4,050.

As was common in the early 1900's, the rectory and school building were photographed and made into postcards to generate income for the parish.

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
Many new families moved into the ptem Bridesburg-Frankford area. Polish immigrants nd not from the area of Poland known as Galicia came in great numbers, and, before long, the little wooden church and school was too small. From the original number of 90 families the Parish grew to 450 families by the end of 1897. At a Parish meeting on January 9, 1898, it was decided to build a new church. The parishioners agreed to take out a loan of \$23,000., and on March 4, 1898, 5 additional lots were bought adjacent to the original lots bought in 1893. The cost was \$1,750. In that same month, work began on the new church and rectory. The architect was Ludwik H. Giele of New York and the work was done by Wilson Milnor of Frankford.

On May 30, 1898, Archbishop Patrick J. Ryan blessed the cornerstone of the new church. He was assisted by Father Mieczyslaw Barabasz, Father Gabriel Kraus and Father Mieczyslaw Kopytkiewicz. Father Kraus delivered the sermon that day. On May 7, 1899, the Archbishop returned to bless the newly completed church, and the parishioners rejoiced in having a truly magnificent place of worship. The cost of the church was \$30,200.

With the church completed, the next order of business was to furnish it. Donations came in

immediately, and Father Marian was able to order the beautiful stained-glass windows that are in our church. The names of these generous benefactors are listed below the windows. Then it was decided that bells were necessary, and Mr. Jan Szuman and Mr. Jan Kaczmarek of Frankford and Mr. Wojciech Hoffman and Mr. Wawrzyniec Smigaj of Bridesburg began collecting money for this purpose. In April of 1900 they were able to buy three bells from the Meneele & Co. of Troy, New York. The largest bell, JAN KANTY, weighs 1,841 pounds; the second one, MARYAN, weights 902 pounds; the third one, JOZEF, weights 549 pounds. The cost of the bells was \$1,042.22. Msgr. J. Loughlin, Chancellor of the Diocese, blessed the bells on May 20, 1900.

After seven years of very hard work, Father Kopytkiewicz took a vacation to visit his family in Poland. While traveling in Europe he met Mr. J. Rifesser of Vienna and discussed the possibility of having a hand-carved altar prepared for the church and some statues. On November 20, 1901 the contract was signed; on November 14,


1902 Father Marian received word that the work was done; and on January 12, 1903 the altar and statues arrived. The cost: \$1,362.91.

And so, the parish had the church, windows bells, altar and statues. What was still needed was an organ. Arrangements were made with the Estey Organ Co., and a new organ was pur chased for \$3,150. It was blessed on November 25, 1906, by Msgr. J.P. Turner, the Chancellor of the Diocese. It was also in 1906 that Father Kopytkiewicz ordered a magnificent the monstrance from Mr. Piotr Seipa, an artisan is Father Krakow, and it arrived at the Parish in Mardre 1907.

THE NEW SCHOOL

During this time of growth and activity thehe parish continued to increase. Many new immipl grants arrived in the Bridesburg-Frankford area sp and they brought with them many children. The H original wooden chapel, which became theof school when the new church was built, was ab solutely too small. By the year 1907 there wen w more than 400 children in school. Once again thes parishioners were asked to be generous as Fa Po ther Marian announced the need for a large ci school. First, more land had to be purchased gr Thirteen lots were available on Almond St., and St. so they were bought for \$4,550. The project wair again directed by Mr. L.H. Giele of New York d and the work was begun in 1907. On Septembe S 13, 1908 the new school was blessed by Arch bishop Edmond F. Prendergast, Archbishop N Philadelphia. When the school opened that yead there were more than 500 children enrolled. Fase ther Kopytkiewicz had to ask the Felicians fota three more Sisters, and that brought the totah number of Sisters to twelve.



THE SISTERS OF THE HOLY FAMILY OF NAZARETH

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The early history of the Parish does not give the reason, but in 1911, The Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth were invited to accept the responsibility of the Parish School. They accepted and have been at our Parish for the last 82 years. Msgr. Kopytkiewicz, in his personal entry in the 25th Anniversary Book, expressed the feeling that the arrival of the Nazareth Sisters in America and eventually in Philadelphia at St. John Cantius was the result of Divine Providence. He pointed out how the Nazareth Sisters were founded in 1873 by a holy, Polish woman, Franciszka Siedliska, just as the Polish immigration to American began. He also pointed out how responsive Mother Foundress was to the plight of the Polish immigrants in America, despite the fact that her Order was in its infancy. He gives great credit to the Sisters for the success of the life and growth of the Polish Parishes.

We know that the education of the children was a high priority among the early immigrants, especially an education in the Catholic Faith and Polish heritage. Of course, language was a special consideration since Polish was the only language spoken, and so, having Sisters who could speak Polish was truly a blessing. It is hard to imagine what would have happened to the children without the care and understanding of the Sisters.

By 1917, the history tells us that there were 15 Nazareth Sisters teaching more than 800 children. Knowing the need to assimilate themselves in the American way of life, the Sisters taught the children in English, except for Polish history and language. Religion was also taught in Polish by the Priests. Monsignor

Kopytkiewicz was proud to say that every child who graduated from St. John Cantius was well prepared to enter any secondary school in the city.

THE TWENTY FIFTH ANNIVERSARY

On Thanksgiving Day, November 29, 1917, the parishioners of St. John Cantius celebrated a double anniversary: the Silver Anniversary of the Parish and the Twenty-fifth anniversary of the Pastorate of Monsignor Kopytkiewicz. On the eve of this wonderful day, a banquet was held, and His Excellency, the Most Reverend Archbishop John V. Bonzano, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, was present. On the morning of the celebration, a Mass was offered at 8 A.M. for the school children, and Archbishop Bonzano was the Celebrant. A Solemn High Mass was celebrated at 10:30 A.M. for the rest of the parish, and Msgr. Peter Masson, described in the early history as "a sincere friend of the Polish clergy," was the Celebrant. He was assisted by Father John Dabrowski as Deacon and Father Stanislaus Sobienowski as Sub-Deacon. Bishop John McCort, Auxiliary Bishop of Philadelphia, was present in the sanctuary, along with Msgr. H.T. Drumgoole, Rector of St. Charles Seminary, and a host of other Priests.

SCHOOL EXPANSION

In the year 1919 there were so many children in school that plans had to be made once again to address the situation. First of all, more living space was needed for the Sisters. Msgr. Kopytkiewicz purchased a home for them on Thompson St. And, in order to prepare for future expansion, he purchased a large tract of land on

did you know?

The salary of the Sisters in 1917 was \$25. a month, and they were paid only during the ten months that they taught school. Since there were 15 Sisters teaching at the time, it cost the parish \$3,750. a year. Lay teachers at this time were being paid \$80. a month.

Almond St. By 1922, the situation of the school was serious, and something had to be done. The parishioners were once again asked to contribute to another building project, and, to their credit, they responded with their usual generosity and understanding. On May 6, 1923, ground was broken for an addition to the school and an auditorium which would stand between the two school wings. In the plans for the auditorium, it was mentioned that it should be the type of building that could easily be converted into a chapel. On July 22, 1923, the cornerstone was blessed by Bishop Michael J. Crane, Auxiliary Bishop of Philadelphia. On May 25, 1924, the new building was dedicated by His Eminence Dennis Cardinal Dougherty in the presence of a large number of parishioners and visiting Priests. At the dedication, Cardinal Dougherty remarked: "This is but another monument of the loyalty of the Poles to the Catholic Faith."

DEATH OF MONSIGNOR KOPYTKIEWICZ

After 40 years of faithful service, Monsignor Kopytkiewicz was called to his heavenly reward on March 3, 1932. He was 69 years old at the time

of his death; forty of those years spent in St. John Cantius, building up this corner of God's vine yard. Through his leadership, and with the cooperation of the people, he was able to leave a magnificent monument of Faith and heritage. It will always give testimony to his excellent management and the love he felt for his Church and his people. He was truly a good shepherd.


His funeral took place on Tuesday, March 8, 1932. It was an overwhelming event! It began on Monday, March 7, with the transferral of his body from the rectory to the church. Father Gabriel Krause led the prayers. All evening and throughout the night, the parishioners came to pay their last respects to their Pastor. The young men of The St. John Cantius Youth Club stood as honor guards all through the night. On Tuesday morning at 8 o'clock, Father Joseph Skibinski, C.S. Sp., a Priest-son of the Parish celebrated Mass for the school children. At 9:30 A.M., a long procession of Priests filed into church, leading Dennis Cardinal Dougherty, Archbishop of Philadelphia. Father Joseph Kuczynski, Pastor of St. Ladislaus Parish, celebrated the Mass, and Cardinal Dougherty led the Absolution of the Body. Father Mieczyslaw Monkiewicz, Pastor of St. Adalbert Parish, led the prayers at the burial which took place at Holy Redeemer Cemetery.

OUR SECOND PASTOR

REV. LADISLAUS GRYNIA

Zather Ladislaus Grynia, a Priest-son of St. Laurentius Parish, arrived at St. John Cantius Parish on May 24, 1913, immediately after his Ordination. During the next 19 years, he assisted Monsignor Kopytkiewicz in the formation and growth of the young Parish. It was only fitting, then, that Father Grynia succeed Monsignor Kopytkiewicz as the Pastor of St. John Cantius Parish. And thus it was. Cardinal Dougherty appointed him Pastor on March 17, 1932.

During his years of stewardship, Father Grynia continued to nurture the growth of the Parish. He was able to eliminate the debt incurred by the building of the new part of the school and the auditorium. He established the Kindergarten and Confraternity of Christian Doctrine (CCD) for the children who were in Public School. In October 1937, he established the Holy Name Society. He also organized the Altar Boys under the patronage of St. Aloysius. It is interesting to note that it was Father Grynia who raised parish Dues from \$6.00 to \$12.00. Interesting because this was in the 1930's.

Father Grynia also presided over the Golden Jubilee of the Parish. He renovated the church in time for the anniversary which was celebrated again on Thanksgiving Day, November 26, 1942. Father Stanislaus Garstka, a Priest-son of the Parish, celebrated the Mass. Bishop Hugh L. Lamb, D.D, Auxiliary Bishop of Philadelphia, presided.

After 33 years, as Assistant Pastor and as Pastor, Father Grynia passed away June 14, 1946. He was laid to rest in Holy Redeemer Cemetery near the Parish he served so well.

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
OUR THIRD PASTOR

REV. MSGR. CASIMIR LAWNICZAK

Geveral months after the death of Father Grynia, Cardinal Dougherty appointed Father Casimir Lawniczak as pastor. Father Lawniczak, known to everyone as Father Casey, arrived at St. John Cantius in November 1946. He energetically carried on the stewardship of the Parish, and did so well that on April 23, 1949, he was named Domestic Prelate with the title of Monsignor. He was also responsible for having the church consecrated, the only Polish church in the Archdiocese to have this privilege. The church was consecrated on October 23, 1952, by His Excellency Bishop Carol J. McCormick.

It was also during his time that the original chapel was once again used for Mass and devotions. For a while it served as the meeting place for the Young Men's Club, but in 1953, Monsignor had it renovated so that Mass could be celebrated there to accommodate the overflowing crowds. He also built an extension onto the rectory for much needed office space. And he purchased additional property so that the school-children had some place to play. Monsignor was also very much involved in all the activities of Polonia, and, in fact, was one of the small group of Priests who helped in the founding of the National Shrine of Our Lady of Czestochowa in Doylestown.

Monsignor was a well-liked and highly respected Priest, not only in the Parish but throughout the Archdiocese. Thus, when it was learned in June of 1964 that he was suffering from cancer and the illness was terminal, there were many tears shed. And, although everyone knew that the end was not far away, it was a




very sad day on July 3, when news of his death was circulated throughout the city.

John Cardinal Krol, Archbishop of Philadelphia and a friend of Monsignor, celebrated the funeral Mass in the presence of numerous parishioners, friends and Priests. It was a tribute to his life and his Priesthood. After Mass, his body was escorted to and laid to rest in Holy Redeemer Cemetery.







Father John Baruch with the 1932 St. John Cantius Baseball Team.


OUR FOURTH PASTOR


REV. JOSEPH KLOSINSKI

Klosinski was named Pastor of St. John Cantius. If anyone ever imitated his patron saint, Father Klosinksi certainly did. St. Joseph the Carpenter was his exemplar. Father could often be seen repairing, renovating or refurbishing some part of the Parish buildings. Since the Parish would celebrate its 75th anniversary in just a few years, Father Klosinski had the church painted, the outside was pointed, the sanctuary and reredos rearranged, new lights installed, the sacristies rearranged to eliminate the passage way behind the altar and a new sound system installed. Renovations were also done in the chapel, among which were four new confessionals.

On September 17, 1967, the 75th anniversary was celebrated with a special Mass of Thanksgiving offered by His Excellency, Bishop Gerald McDevitt, Auxiliary Bishop of Philadelphia, The Jubilee Banquet took place that evening.

In 1971, Father Klosinski retired as Pastor, having reached the compulsary age for retirement, 75. For a while he lived in Green Acres, Florida with his Sister. He then took up residence at the Jersey shore, and when his health began to fail, he entered the Villa St. Joseph, the diocesan retirement home for Priests. Father Klosinski died there on October 13, 1990, in his 95th year of life and his 60th year in the Priesthood. Anthony Cardinal Bevilacqua, Archbishop of Philadelphia, celebrated his Mass and Msgr. Adam Bydlon, Pastor Emeritus of St. John Cantius and the second successor of Father Klosinski, preached the homily.





OUR FIFTH PASTOR

REV. MSGR. JOSEPH HONOROWSKI

Of pon Father Klosinski's retirement, Cardinal Krol appointed Father Joseph Honorowski as Pastor. Father had been a Curate at St. John Cantius from 1959 to 1961, and so, he knew the Parish and was well known by the parishioners. As is always necessary for a Pastor, Father Honorowski continued the care and repair of the Parish. He had new stained glass doors installed at the church entrance and beautiful cut glass doors in the vestibule. It was also Father Honorowski who had the church air-conditioned.

He was rewarded for his good work in December 1974 when he was elevated to the rank of Monsignor. A banquet was held in his honor on January 14, 1974. During the International Eucharistic Congress which was held in Philadelphia in August of 1976, Monsignor Honorowski was Co-Chairman of the Polish Committee with Msgr. Anthony Jaworowski of St. Adalbert's Parish.

Unfortunately, Monsignor's health slowly declined, and, after a long illness, he died on April 22, 1979. His death was mourned deeply by the many parishioners who loved him. He is still remembered as the happy, personable Priest who served his people so well.

did you know?

Ann (Dombrowski) Stahl can claim proudly that her mother and two sisters were nuns. Her mother, Ann, entered the Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth at the age of 65. Her daughter, Sr. Marian, was already a Nazareth Sister, and another daughter, Sr. Mary Venard was a Bernardine.

Sr. Ann Dombrowski, the mother, died in 1972 after 17 years of service in religious life. Sr. Marian died in 1990 shortly before her 50th anniversary. Sr. Mary Venard died in 1991, a few months after her 50th anniversary.

The only problem with this unusual situation, according to John Stahl, was trying to convince people that his mother-in-law was a nun.

OUR SIXTH PASTOR

REV. MSGR. ADAM J. BYDLON

On June 4, 1979, Father Adam J. Bydlon succeed Monsignor Honorowski. He had been the Pastor of St. Hedwig Parish in Chester, after serving many years as a Chaplain in the United States Armed Forces. Shortly after his arrival, St. John Cantius and all the parishes of the Archdiocese began preparing for the visit of Pope John Paul II in Philadelphia in October. While the Pope was in Philadelphia during the days of October 3rd and 4th, many of the parishioners joined the million and a half people who came out to see him. When his motorcade went down Broad St. to the Cathedral, the St. John Cantius School Band was lined up in full uniform to greet him along the way. And many of our Ushers acted as Marshalls at the Mass at Logan Circle.

On August 8, 1982, Father Bydlon was named Prelate of Honor to his Holiness by Pope John Paul II with the title of Monsignor. During his stewardship, Monsignor Bydlon continued the excellent care of the Parish buildings. He enlarged the school library, installed new heaters in the central heating system, and, most importantly, restored the pipe organ. The organ had first been installed in 1906 and then mechanized in the 1940's. The renovation was completed in 1982.

One of the things Monsignor was very proud of was the accreditation that the school received from the Middle States Educational Association. It was a tribute to the faculty and the administration of the school. It also showed the interest and the cooperation of both parents and students.

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Being accredited is no easy thing. The process began in 1979, under the direction of Sr. M. Frances, the Principal, and it was not completed until 1983.


Monsignor Bydlon also contributed much outside the Parish. He was very interested in the life of Philadelphia's Polonia and served for many years as the Chaplain of the Polish American Congress. He continues today as the Chaplain of the Polish Beneficial Association. He was also the Diocesan Director of the Catholic League for Religious Assistance to Poland - Liga Katolicka.

In March of 1990, Monsignor suffered a serious setback when he had to undergo bypass surgery. After some time in the hospital, he realized that it would be very difficult for him to resume the strenuous responsibilities of pastor, and so, he thought it best for the Parish, if he were to resign. He also realized that the Parish was also approaching its 100th anniversary, and that would require a great deal of time and effort. Cardinal Bevilacqua remarked later that he had accepted Monsignor's resignation "reluctantly."

Monsignor's resignation was not only a loss for the Parish; it was also a loss for Philadelphia's Polonia. He was Chaplain of the Polish American Congress and active in all its events. He was the Diocesan Moderator for The Catholic League for Religious Assistance to Poland - LIGA KATOLICKA. And he was Chaplain of the Polish Beneficial Association, a position, however, that he still holds today.

Since his discharge from the hospital, Monsignor has been officially a resident of Villa St. Joseph; however, he does help at several Parishes when the need arises. He also has more time to spend with his family.

At the 100th anniversary banquet, Monsignor was honored with a beautiful plaque as a sign of gratitude from the parishioners he served so well.



did you know?

The Parish of Our Lady of Calvary is an outgrowth of a mission church named St. Michael which was taken care of by the Priests of St. John Cantius. Evidently there were many Polish people living in the North-East, and, to make it more convenient for them, the Priest would celebrate Mass there on Sundays. The interesting fact about this is that the Mission was established in 1922. In 1956 it was renamed Our Lady of Calvary Mission, and then on February 25, 1958, it was officially named a Parish.

The notice in The Catholic Standard and Times of February 21, 1958, read as follows: "The new canonical Parish is a further development of the mission church known since 1956 as Our Lady of Calvary, founded originally as St. Michael's Mission in 1922, and attended by the Priests of St. John Cantius Parish in Bridesburg."

OUR SEVENTH PASTOR

REV. MSGR. BERNARD E. WITKOWSKI

Having accepted the untimely resignation of Msgr. Bydlon, Archbishop Bevilacqua chose Father Bernard E. Witkowski to assume the leader ship of St. John Cantius. He had been the Pastor of St. Ladislaus Parish in the Nicetown section of Philadelphia for 12 years. Father Bernard is a Priest-son of St. Adalbert parish, and he was or dained by John Cardinal Krol on May 19, 1962 Since Ordination, Father served as Chaplain a Philadelphia General Hospital, Teacher at Cardinal O'Hara High School, Administrator of the National Shrine of Our Lady of Czestochowa in Doylestown, and Pastor of St. Ladislaus.

Father Bernard came to St. John Cantius will the realization that he had to carry on the good work done by the dedicated Pastors who preceded him. His immediate concern was to carry on the preparations for the 100th anniversary begun by Msgr. Bydlon.

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
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Father Bernard was installed as Pastor on Saturday, June 9, 1990, by Msgr. Edward P. Cullen, Vicar General of the Archdiocese and a close friend of Father Bernard. He immediately began planning for the painting of the church which was part of the preliminary plans for the 100th anniversary. Father Bernard contracted Mr. Emmanuel Utti, an excellent artist from the Philadelphia area, and he agreed on January 2, 1991, to do the work. It was also at this time that all the lights were removed and taken to be cleaned and polished. Since the old sound system had the speakers in the lights, it was decided to remove them and install a new sound system for the church.

On Friday, August 2, 1991, Father Bernard received a call from Cardinal Bevilacqua informing him that the Holy Father had honored him by naming him an Honorary Prelate to His Holiness, Pope John Paul II, with the title of Monsignor. The actual ceremony of conferral took place at the Cathedral on September 15, the Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows. The following week a banquet was held in the Parish hall.

Father Bernard is also very involved in the activities of the Polish American community, and along with his Parish duties, he finds time to be Chaplain of the Polish American Congress and the Polish Veterans, Placowka 12. He is also the Vice Chaplain of Unja Polek and the Archdiocesan Director of LIGA KATOLICKA. He believes that the strength of Polonia and the Polish Parishes lies in its faithfulness to its Polish Faith and Heritage.

Father Bernard guided the parish it its 100th anniversary which was celebrated on October 11, 1992. During the course of the year, there were several events that prepared everyone for the final celebration. Now that it is over, Father looks to the beginning of the next 100 years. He has but one goal: That we remain faithful to our dedication to God and our Polish Heritage.



mieście Filadelfji na przestrzeni objętej rzeką Delaware od wschodu, torem kolejowym kolei "Pennsylvania" od zachodu, cmentarzem św. Piotra od południa, a dużemi polami niezamieszkałemi od północy,

w roku 1892-gim mieszkało 90 polskich rodzin. W tej miejscowości dla tych Polaków pracy dostarczały następujące fabryki:— fabryka przetworów chemicznych "Charles Lenning and Co.", powroziarnia "Fitler Rope and Cable Co.", fabryka młotków i toporków "F. Plumb Tool Co.", i niedawno zamknięta garbarnia "R. Foederer and Co."

W tym gronie istniała bardzo żywotna grupa Związku Nar. Pol. 176-sta pod wezwaniem Towarzystwa Obrony Narodowej Polski, założona już w grudniu 1891-go roku. Właśnie z tej grupy Związkowej wyszła myśl założenia osobnej parafji polskiej na Bridesburgu i Frankfordzie. Zatem z tej grupy Związkowej zawiązał się Komitet, który miał na celu starać się o założenie własnej parafji. Na czele tego Komitetu stanał pan Stanisław Wiśniewski jako prezes, pan Andrzej Petner jako kasjer, a pan Kazimierz Kędziora jako sekretarz (wszyscy już dzisiaj nie-żyjący). W maju roku 1892-go ten Komitet udał sie do śp. ks. Patryka Jana Ryan, podówczas Arcybiskupa Filadelfijskiego, z prośbą o księdza polskiego. Do tej pokornej prośby Najprzewielebniejszy ks. Arcybiskup się przychylił, dziełu temu pobłogosławił i obiecał przysłać księdza polskiego, ale dopiero wówczas kiedy go mieć bedzie W międzyczasie w domu pana Kaź. Kędziory na Buckius ulicy przy Edgemont odbyło się posiedzenie Polaków. Na tem posiedzeniu jedynastu obywateli złożyło 107 dolarów, które były niejako nasieniem tej dzisiaj olbrzymiej parafji.

We wrześniu 1892-go roku ks. Arcybisku P. J. Ryan naznaczył ks. Marjana Kopytkiewicza jako proboszcza i założyciela tej nowej parafii Dnia 17-go września tego roku przybył do Bridesburga ks. Marjan Kopytkiewicz. Na calvm Bridesburgu i Frankfordzie nie było Hali, gdzieby można odprawić msze świeta. Dopiero za ofiarnością ks. Ernesta Deham, proboszcza niemieckiej parafji Wszystkich Świętych, otrzymal ks. Proboszcz za miesięcznym czynszem dwanaście i pół dolarów ich stary kościółek z całem urządzeniem dla użytku Polaków na ich nabożeń stwa przy ulicach Buckius i Edgemont. Na plebanję został wynajęty dom pod numerem 4638 przy Richmond ulicy. Więc dnia 2-go października tegoż roku z wielka radościa ten lud polski wysłuchał na Bridesburgu poraz pierwszy msze święta odprawiona przez polskiego kapłana i poraz pierwszy na Bridesburgu usłyszał kazania w języku ojczystym. Biedny był to początek bo wszystko było pożyczone lub wynajęte, ale była dobra wola obecnych i poświęcenie ogromne, gotowe na wszelka ofiare.

Teraz rozpoczął sie okres pełen gorliwych wysiłków, okres pełen ofiar pracy i pieniędzy na rzecz swego własnego kościoła. Zbierano składki, kolektujac od domu do domu co tydzień i już we wrześniu 1893-go roku ks. Proboszcz zakupił gotówka za 2,500 dolarów osiem lot na ulicy Thompson niedaleko ulicy Orthodox pod nowy kościół, szkółke i plebanje. Zaraz po nabyciu granta budowniczy pan F. I. Wintz rozpoczął pracę przy budowie. Już dnia 11-go września tegoż roku ks. Marjan Kopytkiewicz wprowadził sie do nowej plebanji. Poświęcenie nowego kościoła dokonał ks. Arcybiskup Patryk J. Ryan w asystencji ks. W. Małuseckiego i ks. Mieczysława Kopytkiewicza, który też wygłosił kazanie. Wiec parafja św. Jana Kantego wówczas już posiadała nowy kościół, sale szkolna i plebanie ze sześciu pokoi, kosztem 4,050 dolarów. Był to okres pierwszych poczatków paraf.i.

Parafja jednakowoż ciągle wzrastała. Ustala emigracja z pod zaboru pruskiego, ale zato rozpoczeła się emigracja najsamprzód z Galicji, a później z pod zaboru ruskiego. Ludzie naplywali gromadami w poszukiwaniu za chlebem i praca. Z drugiej strony, ruch przemysłowy w Stanach Zjednoczonych rozwijał się do roz miarów gigantycznych. Dlatego okolica Bridesburgu i Frankford poczęła się zaludniać i zapełniać przeróżnemi fabrykami i interesami.

W roku 1898-ym parafja już liczyła 450 rodzin. Kościół drewniany okazał się za ciasny, sala szkolna za mała, a parafja posiadała w gotówce 7,600 dolarów. Dlatego też na posiedzeniu paraffalnem dnia 5-go stycznia 1898-go roku uchwalono budowe nowego kościoła ceglanego. Zakupiono pieć lotów na ulicy Thompson zaraz przy drewnianym kościołku za 1,750 dolarów i w marcu tegoż roku rozpoczęto budowę nowego kościoła ceglanego z przyległa plebanją. Plany na kościół w bogatym stylu gotyckim, przyozdobiony we dwie wieże, wykonał architekt pan Ludwik H. Giele z Nowego Yorku, a kontraktorem był pan Wilson Milnor z Frankfordu. Budowa kościoła - same mury - kosztowały 30,-200 dolarów. Dnia 30-go maja 1898-go roku w drugi dzień Zielonych światek ks. Arcybiskup Patryk J. Ryan poświęcił kamień węgielny kościola w udziale ks. Mieczysława Barabasza i ks. Gabrjela Kraus, który też wygłosił kazanie. Jednakowoż, dopiero dnia 7-go maja 1899-go roku ks. Arcybiskup Ryan dokonał poświęcenia nowego kościoła, a kazanie wygłosił ks. Stanisław Wnek, misjonarz z zakonu Jezuitów.

Po wystawieniu nowego kościoła ks. Proboszcz Kopytkiewicz zajął się urządzeniem tegoż, co znowu wymagało wielkiej ofiarności ze strony parafjan. Prywatne osoby i towarzystwa pośpieszyły z ofiarami na witraże czyli okna kościelne. Dnia 20-go maia 1902-go roku ks.

Prałat J. Loughlin, ówczesny kanclerz djecezjalny. dokonał poświecenia trzech dzwonów: wielkiego imieniem Jana Kantego, średniego imieniem Marjana i małego imieniem Józefa. Przy tej okoliczności kazanie wygłosił ks. Zygmunt Rvdlewski ze Zgromadzenia Ducha św. W stvczniu 1903-go roku z Tyrolu Austrjackiego przybyły trzy ołtarze i czternaście stacyj, które kosztowały 4,600 dolarów. Dnia 25-go listopada 1906go roku ks. Prałat J. P. Turner poświecił nowy poteżny organ wyrobu Estey, który był zakupiony za sume 3,150 dolarów. W marcu 1907-go roku z pracowni Seipa w Krakowie przybyła szczero-srebrna Monstrancja w stylu gotyckim za sume 500 dolarów. Chociaż wzięło osiem lat, jednakowoż kościół został bogato urządzony i zaopatrzony we wszystko obficie, co do służby Bożej jest potrzebne. To tylko wykazuje, że lud zgromadzony przy parafji umiłował ten Dom Boży.

Na pokrycie kosztów budowy i urządzenia kościoła i plebanji ks. Proboszcz był zmuszony zaciagnać w roku 1899-tym pożyczkę w sumie 23.000 dolarów. Dług ten ks. Proboszcz zaczał spłacać dopiero w roku 1903-ciem, a już dnia 11-go stycznia 1907-go roku ostatnia rata została spłacona. Jeszcze jeden dowód ofiarności ludu

przy tej parafji!

Rok 1905-ty i 1906-ty przyniósł nową bolączkę dla parafji. Powstała bowiem nagląca potrzeba nowej i większej szkoły, a co zatem idzie pomieszczenia odpowiedniego dla Wielebnych Sióstr. Aby zaradzić temu przepełnieniu szkółki w starym drewnianym kościółku, postanowiono wybudować nowa szkołe i nowa plebanie, plebanje zaś przy kościele na ul. Thompson obrócić na dom Sióstr. W tym celu w roku 1907ym zakupiono za sume 4,550 dolarów przy ulicy Almond 13 lotów, sąsiadujących z dotychczasowemi gruntami parafjalnemi, tak że własność parafjalna rozciągała się od ulicy Thompson do ulicy Almond. Obydwa budynki projektował pan Ludwik H. Giele z Nowego Yorku. Budowniczym został sam ks. Proboszcz, aby w ten sposób zaoszczedzić parafji to, co miał zarobić kontraktor. Tak ks. Proboszcz zaoszczędził parafji przy tej budowie przynajmniej 15 tysięcy dolarów. Budowe obydwóch budynków rozpoczęto w czerwcu 1907-go roku. Dnia 16-go czerwca 1908-go roku ks. Prałat J. P. Turner, kanclerz djecezjalny, dokonał poświęcenia kamienia węgielnego szkoły, a 13-go września tegoż roku ks. Biskup Edmond F. Prendergast dokonał poświęcenia budynku szkolnego. Zatem ks. Proboszcz wybudował gmach szkolny z granitu Pennsylwańskiego o dwóch piętrach i 15-stu salach szkolnych i dogodną plebanję kosztem tylko 70 tysięcy dolarów. Tak z wielkiem poświęceniem zdrowia i swoich talentów ks. Marjan Kopytkiewicz zdołał parafję niskiem kosztem wzbogacić dwoma budynkami tak wspaniałemi.

W roku 1917-tym nadeszła 25-ta letnia rocznica istnienia parafji. Wiele łask i dobrodziejstw spłynęło na parafję w tych latach. Dlatego ks. Proboszcz, aby złożyć przez ten Srebrny Jubileusz nowy dar na chwałę Bożą, wezwał parafjan do składek w roku 1916-tym na pomalowanie kościoła i na poczynienie potrzebnych zmian dla podnicsienia jego piękności i, cytując słowa z Pamietnika na Srebrny Jubileusz samego ks. Proboszcza, "parafja stanęła jak jeden człowiek i w nie-całym roku miałem już złożoną potrzebną sumę". Ks. Proboszcz tedy zaangażował artyste pana Mino Squillace, który przeprowadził malowanie kościoła według planów ks. Proboszcza. ściany kościoła zostały pomalowane w kolorze blado-zielonym. Sklepienie głównej nawy i prezbyterjum zostało powiązane w jedno przez umieszczenie obrazów Litanji Loretańskiej do Matki Božej, punktem kulminacyjnym będąc Krzyż, podtrzymywany przez Aniołów jako znak zwyciestwa w środkowej paneli sklepienia w prezbyterjum. Aby wprowadzić więcej światła białego do kościoła, w dziesięciu oknach ścian podłużnych kościoła zostało zmienione tło witraży z koloru ciemno-niebieskiego na bursztynowy, a prezbyterjum zostały wybite dwa okna i wstawione dwa witraże. Wszystkie trzy Ołtarze zostały przemalowane na kolor kości słoniowej, a w nawie głównej została dodana ambona, wykonana w tym samym kolorze, co Ołtarze, według wzorów staro-gotyckich, dar Bractwa Różańca świętego. W prezbyterjum na bocznych ścianach zostały umieszczone dwa ogromne obrazy z życia Najśw. Marji Panny, mianowicie, Zwiastowanie i Boże Narodzenie. Prezbyterjum zostało przedłużone, przez co nawy straciły po trzy ławki. Nowe balaski zostały wstawione, dar dzieci szkolnych. Nowa posadzka z dębowego drzewa została położona w prezbyterjum, w kościele i w kruchcie. Cała zaś świątynia została upiększona światłem z nowych elektrycznych kandelabrów. Zatem ks. Proboszcz nie szczędził żadnych trudów i kosztów, aby jak najokazalej świątynia Pańska była urządzona na tak ważną chwile w życiu parafji, jaką jest Srebrny Jubileusz. To też te przygotowania kosztowały około 20 tysięcy dolarów i zabrały wiele czasu, bo ta praca trwała od początku kwietnia do końca listopada.

Dnia 29-go listopada 1917-go roku w dzień Dziękczynienia odbyła się ta tak długo oczekiwana i radosna uroczystość i to uroczystość podwójna:— 25-cio lecie założenia parafji i 25-cio lecie pasterzowania ks. Proboszcza Marjana Kopytkiewicza. Uroczystoście jubileuszowe rozpoczęły się już dzień przedtem przyjęciem Delegata Apostolskiego, przedstawiciela Ojca św. we Wa-

szyngtonie, ks. Arcybiskupa Jana Bonzano. Został On przywitany przez wszystkie towarzystwa w parafji w odznakach i w mundurach, przez dzieci szkolne w polskich strojach i przez Komitet i Marszałków parafjalnych. Tegoż wieczora po kolacji ks. Delegat wraz z księżmi obecnemi udał się na halę parafjalną, gdzie byli zebrani parafjanie, i tutaj dzieci szkolne uczciły ks. Delegata popisem.

W sam Dzień Dziękczynienia uroczystoście jubileuszowe rozpoczęły się msza święta o godzinie ósmej dla dzieci szkolnych, która odprawił ks. Delegat Jan Bonzano przy śpiewie dziatwy szkolnej. Dla parafjan odbyła się Suma Dziekczynna o godzinie wpół do jedynastej, którą odprawił ks. Prałat Piotr Masson, wielki przyjaciel Polaków, w obecności ks. Delegata-Arcybiskupa. Ks. Jan Dabrowski, proboszcz parafji św. Kazimierza w Shenandoah, służył jako Djakon, ks. Stanisław Sobieniowski, proboszcz z Wilkes-Barre jako Sub-djakon i ks. Djonizy A. Corbett, profesor Liturgiki w Seminarjum Duchownem św. Karola w Overbrook, jako Mistrz Ceremonyj. Na tej mszy świetej byli obecni:- ks. Biskup-Sufragan Jan J. Mc Cort; ks. Prałat H. T. Drumgoole, rektor Seminarjum duchownego św. Karola; ks. Prałat J. Górzyński; ks. Prałat J. Strzelecki: ks. Dekowski, kapelan wojsk polskich w Niagara-on-the-Lake i wielu innych miejscowych i pozamiejscowych księży. Chór miejscowy z panem Piotrem Wizłą na czele pod batutą pana organisty Wiktora Gutkowskiego wykonał przepiękną Mszę, a kazanie wygłosił ks. Gabrjel Kraus, proboszcz parafji św. Wawrzyńca. Po tej uroczystej Sumie ks. Prałat J. Górzyński odczytał i wyjaśnił dekret błogosławieństwa papieskiego, przysłany na ten dzień ks. Jubilatowi-Proboszczowi i jego parafji z Rzymu, a ks. Delegat udzielił tegoż błogosławieństwa wszystkim obecnym. Te uroczystoście jubileuszowe zakończyły sie uroczystemi Nieszporami, które odprawił ks. Prałat J. Górzyński przy udziale ks. J. Zielińskiego jako Djakona i ks. Sebastjana Jerzaka jako Sub-djakona, a kazanie wygłosił ks. Stanisław Sobieniowski.

Następny ważniejszy wypadek w życiu parafji przypada na rok 1919-ty. Ks. Proboszcz widział jak parafja się rozszerzała i, chociaż emigracja z Polski ustała z powodu wojny, to naturalny rozrost parafji był ogromny. Szkoła była zapełniona i personel Wielebnych Sióstr musiał być powiększony do szesnastu nauczycielek. Dlatego na mieszkanie dla Wielebnych Sióstr Nazaretanek został nabyty wielki dom podwójny od Doktora Władysława Wizy za 11 tysięcy dolarów. Aby zaś być przygotowanym na przyszłość w razie potrzebna byłaby rozbudowa szkoły, nabyte zostały trzy loty na ulicy Almond, przylegające własność parafjalną, za 1,500 dola-

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rów. W tym samym celu zakupione były przyległe trzy loty na ulicy Almond w lipcu roku 1922-go za 2,400 dolarów.

W roku 1921 -szym wielki zaszczyt spotkał ks. Proboszcza, a w jego osobie całą parafję. Dnia 17-go marca 1921-go roku Papież Benedykt XV odznaczył ks. Arcybiskupa Djonizego D. Dougherty, nadając mu godność Kardynała. Papież zarazem odznaczył szesnastu kapłanów z archidjecezji Filadelfijskiej, a pomiędzy niemi ks. Marjana A. Kopytkiewicza, nadając im godność Prałata. Dnia 24-go kwietnia tego roku ks. Prałat Piotr Masson na Sumie uroczyście przyodział ks. Proboszcza w szaty Prałackie. Ks. Proboszcz za swoją pracę i swoje poświęcenie otrzymał to odznaczenie — pierwszy polski Prałat i jedyny w archidjecezji Filadelfijskiej.

Przy końcu roku szkolnego 1921 — 1922 w szkole parafjalnej znajdowało się 1,350 dzieci. Wszystkie klasy były zajęte i nawet dwie klasy były umieszczone w starym kościółku, a dzieci z pierwszych dwóch stopni uczęszczały tylko półdnia do szkoły. Więc ks. Prałat powziął kroki aby temu przepełnieniu szkoły parafjalnej zaradzić. Po trzykrotnem ogłoszeniu w kościele, jak to wymagało prawo stanu Pennsylwanji, zostało zwołane posiedzenie parafjalne do Audytorjum pod szkołą na 22-go kwietnia 1923-go roku. Ks. Prałat otworzył posiedzenie i przedstawił plany na nową szkołę parafjalną z granitu Pennsylwańskiego z dwoma piętrami, na których mialo być 16-cie pokoi na klasy, jako też na obszerne Audytorjum, które w swej budowie będzie podobne do Kaplicy ze swemi trzema nawami, a to, aby w przyszłości mogło posłużyć jako Kaplica dla dzieci szkolnych. Ogół zgodził sie na przedstawiony projekt, bo wszyscy odczuwali, że dzieciom szkolnym dzieje się wielka krzywda z powodu przepełnienia, a każdy ojciec i każda matka życzyli sobie umieścić swoje dziecko w polskiej, katolickiej szkole parafjalnej. Zatem przystąpiono do wyboru Komiteu Budowy Szkoły i Audytorjum. Następujący Komitet został wybrany: pan Kazimierz Ratke prezes, Dr. Stanisław Petner wice-prezes, pan Kazimierz Przybyłowski, sekretarz; Jakób Wojnar marszałek. Budowa została oddana w ręce firmy budowniczej W. L. and G. H. O'Shea.

W niedzielę dnia 6-go maja 1923-go roku po nieszporach Ks. Prałat, w otoczeniu księży miejscowych i ks. Proboszcza Gabrjela Kraus, pierwszy złamał grunt pod nową szkołę i Audytorjum. Każdy zaś z parafjan otrzymał zaproszenie na tę ceremonję łamania gruntú. To też przy tejokazji parafjanie złożyli przeszło 1,200 dolarów.

Dnia 7-go maja tegoż roku odbyło się drugie posiedzenie parafjalne względem tej budowy nowej szkoły i Audytorjum. Ogół parafjan na tem posiedzeniu zgodził się na prośbę ks. Prałata i dał pozwolenie ks. Kardynałowi D. Dougherty zaciągnąć pożyczkę na tę budowę. Parafjanie zaś postanowili siebie opodatkować, 25 centów od rodziny na tydzień, aby tę pożyczkę jak najpredzej spłacić.

Teraz praca przy budowie poczęła postępować szybko naprzód, tak że już w niedzielę dnia 22-go lipca tegoż roku ks. Biskup-Sufragan Michał J. Crane przy udziale księży ze sąsiednich parafji położył kamień węgielny pod te nowe budynki. Ks. Dr. Piotr Klekotka był djakonem, ks. Józef Niemiec sub-djakonem, ks. Dr. Władysław Grynia mistrzem ceremonji, a kazanie w języku polskim wygłosił ks. Jakób Płoszaj, proboszcz parafji św. Jadwigi w Chester, Pa.

Dopiero dnia 25-go maja 1924-go roku nastapiła dedykacja nowych budynków. Poświęcenia nowej szkoły i audytorjum dokonał Jego Eminencja, ks. Djonizy J. Kardynał Dougherty, w asyście ks. Józefa Kuczyńskiego jako djakona, ks. Józefa Gaździka jako sub-djakona, ks. M. Maciejewskiego jako mistrza ceremonyj, a ks. Mieczysław Monkiewicz, proboszcz parafji św. Wojciecha, wygłosił poniosłe kazanie.

I znowu parafja nabyła coś wspaniałego i parafja też wykazała, że dzieci rodziców katolickich i polskich mają prawo od Boga do wykształcenia katolickiego, polskiego. I, jak powiedział Jego Eminencja ks. Kardynał D. Dougherty przy Dedykacji, stanął jeszcze jeden pomnik przywiązania Polaków do wiary katolickiej. Koszt budowy nowej szkoły i Audytorjum ze wszelkiemi urządzeniami wynosił 230 tysięcy dolarów.

Po czterdziestu latach wytężonej pracy na niwie kapłańskiej w parafji św. Jana Kantego, śmierć nieubłagana zabrała ks. Prałata z grona naszego dnia 3-go marca 1932-go roku. Przeżył on lat 69, spędzając większą część swego żywota wśród swoich, chociaż na obczyźnie. Pozostawił po sobie pomnik, którego czas zatrzeć nie może. Albowiem wartość parafjalna przy jego zgonie wynosiła trzy - czwarte miljona dolarów, podczas gdy dług parafjalny pozostał tylko i to w części na nowej szkole i Audytorjum. Parafja, chociaż wielka, jest nawet do dziś dnia znana ze swej pobożności i stateczności. Osiedle Bridesburg i Frankford jest znane ze swej trzeźwości i roztropności. Lud jest oszczędny i pracowity. A to wszystko dzięki pracy duszpasterskiej śp. ks. Prałata przez 40-ci lat swego pasterzowania!

Pogrzeb za duszę śp. ks. Prałata odbył się we wtorek dnia 8-go marca. Eksportacja zwłok do kościoła odbyła się w poniedziałek po południu, której ks. Gabrjel Kraus przewodniczył. Przy katafalku po nieszporach i przez całą noc straż pełnili członkowie towarzystwa Młodzieży św. Jana Kantego. We wtorek rano o godzinie ósmej ks. Józef Skibiński, C. S. Sp., wychowanek

ks. Prałata, odprawił mszę św. za duszę śp. ks. Prałata dla dzieci szkolnych. O godzinie wpół do dziesiątej orszak pogrzebowy z Jego Eminancia, ks. Dionizem Kardynałem Dougherty na czele wyruszył do kościoła. W kościele najprzód księża licznie zgromadzeni odśpiewali Wigilje. Mszę świętą za spokój duszy zmarłego celebrował ks. Józef Kuczyński, ks. Sebastjan Jerzak był djakonem, ks. Władysław Dąbrowski supdjakonem, ks. Jan S. Pytko mistrzem ceremonyj, ks. Stanisław śliwiński turvferarjuszem, ks. Stanisław Polityka i ks. Józef Skibiński akolitami. Na tronie po stronie Ewangelji zasiadł Jego Eminencja ks. Kardynał, a jego kapelanami byli:ks. Prałat Jan A. Górzyński z Pittsburgha i ks. Prałat Andrzej Żychowicz ze Scrantonu. Po stronie Epistoly zasiadł ks. Biskup-Sufragan Gerald O'Hara, a kapelanami jego byli:- ks. Prałat Józef C. Dworzak z Yonkers i ks. Prałat Ignacy Szudrowicz z Jersey City. Jego Eminencja ks. Kardynał odprawił Absolucję nad zwło-Orszak zaś pogrzebowy z kościoła na cmentarz Odkupiciela Świata poprowadził ks. Mieczysław Monkiewicz, a księża wszyscy odśpiewali na cmentarzu "Salve Regina". Trumnę nieśli nastepujacy: Mecenas Feliks Piekarski, pan Mieczysław Dombrowski, pan Wincenty Rojewski, Dr. Stanisław Petner, pan Kazimierz Przybyłowski, pan Kazimierz Ratke, pan Józef Domżalski Jr. i pan Franciszek Jańczak. Na pogrzebie było obecnych przeszło sto księży ze stanów Pennsylwania, New York, New Jersey i Delaware.

Parafia św. Jana Kantego niedługo była osierocona, bo już dnia 17-go marca Jego Eminencja ks. D. J. Kardynał Dougherty naznaczył na to stanowisko Proboszcza długoletniego asystenta w tej parafji, ks. Władysława A. Grynię. Ks. Władysław A. Grynia urodził się w dzielnicy Richmond we Filadelfji. Został wyświęcony na kapłana dnia 17-go maja 1913-go roku. Swoją pierwsza Solenna Mszę świętą odprawił w kościele św. Wawrzyńca, Naznaczony został zaraz do parafji św. Jana Kantego jako asystent i pozostał na tem stanowisku przez 19-cie lat aż do śmierci śp. ks. Prałata. Ks. Grynia objął ster parafji po śmierci śp. ks. Prałata i zostaje na tem stanowisku jako Proboszcz już lat dziesięć. Wiec 29 lat ks. W. Grynia służy parafji św. Jana Kantego.

Po objęciu stanowiska Proboszcza parafji, ks. Władysław Grynia starał się poprowadzić dalej pracę wydatną po śp. księdzu Prałacie. Na parafji ciążyła jeszcze hipoteka na nowej szkole i Audytorjum. Więc ks. W. Grynia, idac w ślady śp. ks. Prałata, starał się z dochodów utrzymać parafję i co rok pewną sumę spłacić z hipoteki, co za współ-pracą parafjan zdołał uczynić, nawet w tych latach kiedy w kraju całym panowała depresja. To też przy sprawozdaniu rocznem w

styczniu 1942-go roku mógł ks. W. Grynia ogłosić parafjanom, że hipoteka została zupełnie spłacona, żaden dług nie ciąży na budynkach parafjalnych, a hipoteka będzie oficjalnie spalona na bankiecie Złotego Jubileuszu.

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Parafja jako taka przybierała na wieku, a więc budynki parafjalne poczęły wymagać reperacji i odnowienia. Więc na wewnątrz i zewnątrz były odnowione obydwa domy Sióstr, obydwie szkoły, dom Kościelnego i plebanja. Audytorjum została odrestaurowana i Kościół na zewnątrz został oczyszczony i podreperowany. To też wszelkie reperacje i odnowienia za gospodarstwa ks. Władysława A. Gryni przez ostatnie dziesięć lat kosztowały około 40 tysięcy dolarów.

Jakie zmiany zaszły przez ostatnie dziesięć lat pracy ks. Władysława A. Gryni? Aby umożliwić każdemu z parafjan wysłuchać mszę święta, siedem mszy świętych zostało zaprowadzonych w każdą niedzielę. W szkole rozmaite ofiary dzieci szkolnych zostały zupełnie zniesione, ksiażki szkolne za małym rentem są wypożyczane dzieciom, przedszkole, czyli tak zwane "kindergarten" zostało zaprowadzone. Parafjalne, czyli opłata miesięczna na parafję, zostało podniesione ze sześciu dolarów na dwanaście, a opłata na spłacenie długów została zniesiona. Dla dzieci ze szkół publicznych została wprowadzona nauka religijna po szkole przez cały rok i szkoła wakacyjna, a dla dzieci ze szkół wyższych została wprowadzona godzina religijna jeden raz na tydzień. W tym czasie też powstało towarzystwo Ministrantów św. Alojzego, towarzystwo Najśw. Imienia Jezus, które liczy dzisiaj 850 członków, i Sub-Komitet Ratunkowy na pomoc ofiarom wojny w Polsce. Zmiany wiec zaszły wielkie w życiu parafji, ale wszystkie są obliczone ku dobru ogólnemu parafjan.

Pozostaje więc tylko odnowienie na wewnątrz świątyni Pańskiej, co ks. Władysław A. Grynia pozostawił na rok Jubileuszowy 1942, jako też uroczysty obchód Złotego Jubileuszu. Praca nad odnowieniem wewnętrznem Kościoła rozpoczęła się dnia 20-go kwietnia i obecnie jest w toku. Uroczysty obchód Złotego Jubileuszu ma się odbyć w Dzień Dziękczynienia dnia 26-go listopada 1942-go roku.

roczystą Msze Swięta Jubileuszową odprawił wychowanek parafii Sw.Jana Kantego, Ks.Stanisław Garstka, dnia 26go listopada,1942 w obecno-

ści Ks. Biskupa Hugh Lamb, D.D., Sufragana

Archidjecezji Filadelfijskiej. Bankiet Jubileuszowy odbył się na Sali Four Chefs po Mszy Swiętej.

Po długiej i owocnej służbie duszpasterskiej w parafii Sw. Jana Kantego przez 33 lata, jako Asystent i jako Proboszcz, Ks. Grynia pożegnał się z tym światem 14go czerwca, 1946 roku. Zwłoki pochowane są na Cmentarzu Sw. Odkupiciela, w dzielnicy Bridesburg.

Władza Kościelna na miejsce Ks.Grymii, mianowała Ks. Kazimierza Ławniczak.
Ks. Ławniczak objał probostwo parafii w
listopadzie, 1946 roku. Nie długo po
objęciu parafii, Ks. Ławniczak, w roku
1949, wyniesiony był do godności Prałata
przez Ojca Sw. W roku 1952, Kościoł Parafialny był konsekrowany przez Biskupa
Sufragana Archidjecezji Filadelfijskiej,
Biskupa Caroll J. McCormick, D.D. Jest
to wielki zaszczyt dla parafii i jedyny
polski kościoł w naszej Archidjecezji
który cieszy się ta godnościa.

W czasie probostwa w parafii, Sw. Jana Kantego, Ks. Prałat Ławniczak idąc w ślady swych poprzedników, starał się nadal upiększać i poprawiać stosunki parafialne. W tym okresie historji parafii, w częsci szkoły która nie była dokończona od początku budowy nowej szkoly w roku 1923, zamieszczony był klasztor dla sióstr. W roku 1953, stary budynek kościelny, który w tych latach był używany jako Klub Młodzieży, przerobiony był na Kaplicę, która używana jest na nabożenstwa, szczególnie w niedziele. W roku 1957 remont na plebanii, dodał nowe mieszkania dla księży jakoteż pomieszczenia na biura parafialne.

W lipcu 1964, Ks. Prałat Ławniczak marł po długiej chorobie. Pogrzeb odprawił Ks. Kardynał Król, w obecności Biskutów, wielu Księży, i parafian. Zwłoki podowane są na Omentarzu Sw. Odkupiciela.

Na następcę Ks. Prałata Ławniczak, przeznaczony był Ks.Józef Kłosinski. Ks. Kłosinski, objął probostwo parafii Sw. Jama Kantego dnia 12go sierpnia, 1964. Ks. Kłosinski, uważając że budynki parafialne były w użyciu przez wiele lat, podjął prace remontu z tą samą gorliwością i poświęceniem które charakteryzowały jego poprzedników.

Za trzy lata po objęciu probostwa, parafia obchodzić miała Diamentowy Jubileusz założenia parafii. Potrzebne były pewne przygotowania. Kościoł był odmalowany, jakoteż całe sanktuarium było przerobione zgodnie z wskazówkami liturgicmymi Soboru Watykańskiego Drugiego. W
udynku szkolnym, kafeteria była odnowiona z nowoczesnymi urządzeniami. W tym
odresie, kaplica była także odnowiona z

dodaniem nowych konfesionałów.

W roku 1967, parafia Sw. Jana Kantego obchodziła Jubileusz Diamentowy,75 lat założenia. Dnia 17go września,w kościele odprawił Mszę Swiętą Dziękczynna, Jego Ekselencja Ks. Biskup Caroll J. McCormick,D.D. Biskup Sufragan Archidjecezji Filadelfijskiej. W koncelebrze brali udział Ks. Proboszcz Kłosinski, Ks. Prałat Franciszek Pałecki, Ks. Jan Smigielski i Ks. Stanisław Skowronski. Kazanie wygłosił Ks. Infułat Piotr Klekotka,J.C.D. Mistrzem Ceremoni był Ks. Józef Gallagher w Asyscie był Ks. Edward Baraniak. Bankiet Jubileuszowy odbył się na Sali Four Chefs o 6:30 po południu.

W roku 1971 Ksiądz Proboszcz Kłosinski, majac lat 75, przeszedł na Emeryturą. Obecnie Ks. Kłosinski, licząc lat 85, zamieszkuje w Florydzie.

W następstwie Ks. Kłosinskiego, w sierpniu, 1971, Ks. Kardynał Król naznaczył Ks. Józefa R. Honorowskiego. Ks. Honorowski, dobrze już znany w parafii Sw. Jana Kantego ponieważ służył w parafii jako Asystent w latach 1959-1961, rozpoczyna swą pracę duszpasterską z tą samą gorliwością i poświęceniem podobnym do swych poprzedników. W roku 1973, wprawione były nowe drzwi przy wejściu do kościoła wewnątrz i na zewnątrz. W grudniu 1973, Ks. Honorowski mianowany był Prałatem przez Ojca Swiętego Pawła VI. Mszę Swietą dziękczynną odprawił Ks. Prałat dnia 14go stvcznia 1974 w kościele.Bankiet ku czci nowego Prałata odbył się na Sali Four Chefs po Mszy Swiętej. W roku 1974, dalsze odnowienie budynków parafialnych nastapiło z dodaniem wentylacji do kościoła kosztem \$44,000.00.

W roku 1976, Parafia Sw. Jana Kantego brała udział w Miedzynarodowym Kongresie Eucharystycznym, który odbył się w Filadelfii w dniach lgo-8go sierpnia. Połączona z Kongresem była odprawiona Mszą Swiętą Polska w Stadionie Weteran-

ów. Ks. Prałat Honorowski był Współ-Przewodniczącym Komitetu Polskiego na Kongres Eucharystyczny razem z Księdzem Prałatem Jaworowskim, Proboszczem Parafii Sw. Wojciecha. Na Kongres Eucharystyczny, przyjechało 19 Biskupów z Polski i brali udział w Kongresie i w Polskiej Mszy Swiętej. Między Biskupami, którzy przyjechali na Kongres z Polski był Ks. Kardynał Wojtyła, który dwa lata póżniej był wybrany Ojcem Swiętem.

Dnia 22go kwietnia 1979 roku, po długiej chorobie, zmarł Ks. Prałat Honorowski. Ks. Kardynał Król odprawil pogrzeb w obecności Biskupów, wielu Księży i parafian. Ks. Prałat Honorowski pochowany jest na Cmentarzu Sw. Odkupiciela.

Następca Ks. Prałata Honorowskiego, Ks. Adam Bydłoń objął stanowisko proboszcza parafii Sw. Jan Kantego, dnia 4go czerwca 1979. W pażdzierniku Parafia Sw. Jana Kantego, podobnie jak całe Stany Zjednocznone, przeżywała szczególne chwile gdyż w tych dniach odwiedził Stany Zjednoczone Ojciec Swięty, Jan Paweł II. Odwiedzenie Ojca Swiętego w Filadelfii w dniach 3go i 4go pazdziernika, pozostanie w pamięci wszystkich przez długie lata. Były to dni pamiętne jakoteż i historyczne dla wiernych nie tylko w Archidjecezji Filadelfijskiej, ale i dla wiernych w całym kraju. Była to chwila pamiętna dla naszej parafii, albowiem wielu parafian brało udział w przywitaniu Ojca Swiętego na lotnisku, były także obecne dzieci z naszej szkoły parafialnej, orkiestra dzieci szkolnych w mundurach miała wyznaczone miejsce na przywitanie Ojca Sw. przy moście nowym Girard Point Bridge i sporo z naszych marszałków parafialnych brało udział jako marszałkowie na Mszy Swietej w centrum miasta, przy Logan Circle. Były to chwile przepiękne i bogate które pozostaną żywo w sercach wszystkich parafian.

W latach 1980-1982 organizowany był program (C.Y.O.) dla młodzieży w parafii pod przewodnictwem Ks. Józefa Zingaro.

W listopadzie 1979, rozpoczął się bardzo ważny okres dla naszej szkoły parafialnej. Rozpoczął się proces Akredytacji szkoły parafialnej. Akredytacja szkoły jest to proces, w którym organizacja Middle States Educational Association uznaje, że szkoła akredytowana prowadzi zajęcia według przepisanych zasad, które zgadzają sie z nowoczesnymi metodami kształcenia dzieci. Proces akredytacji zawiera zwykle trzy lata. W marcu, 1982 szkoła nasza przeszła pierwszy stopień procesu i nasza szkoła otrzymała certifikacje od Middle States Educational As-

sociation. Proces akredytacji prowadzi się nadal. Gdy się skończy, szkoła będzie akredytowania. Będzie to niezwykły honor nie tylko dla szkoły ale i dla całej parafii.

W sierpniu 1982, parafia Sw. Jana Kantego znów zaszczycona była, gdyż Ojciec Swięty, Jan Paweł II mianował Ks. Bydłońia, Honorowym Prałatem. W niedzielę 12go września, Ks. Prałat Bydłoń odprawił Msze Swiętą dziękczynna w kościele. Po Mszy Swiętej odbył się bankiet na Sali Four Chefs.

Historia Parafii od 1982 roku

Po uroczystych obchodach Jubileuszu

90-cio lecia, życie parafialne powróciło do normalnego biegu ale z każdym rokiem, mówiono coraz częściej o zbliżającym się kolejnym Jubileuszu. W każdym roku parafialna szkoła, miała około 500 uczniów. Każdego tygodnia w Piątek, dzieci szkolne brały udział w Mszy śwa raz w miesiącu, przystępowały do Sakramentu Spowiedzi św. Po ukończeniu naszej

szkoły, większość uczniów, kontynuowało

naukę w Katolickich Szkołach Średnich.

Ksiądz Prałat Adam Bydlon, jako proboszcz parafii, czuwał nad całością spraw duszpasterstwa parafialnego, oraz nad sprawami materialnymi parafii. Zawsze, otaczawielką troską nowo przybywających emigrantów z Polski. Wiele razy, przybywający w tym najtrudniejszym, pierwszym okresie,

doznawali opieki i wsparcia materialnego.

Pierwszą, poważniejszą inwestycją tego dziesięciolecia, była naprawa systemu ogrzewczego, wszystkich budynków kościelnych. Wysłużone przez lata, piece do ogrzewania, należało wymienić na nowe. W krótkiczasie po tej inwestycji, wyszła niespodzianie kolejna – remont dachu na szkolnybudynku. W tym czasie Ks. Prałat A. Bydlozaczął tworzyć fundusz na coraz szybciej zbliżający się kolejny Jubileusz. W przedsionku kościoła, pojawiły się specjalne tablice a na nich plakietki, których fundatorzy składali ofiary na potrzeby kościelne, związane z Jubileuszem.

Nie najlepsze zdrowie, ciągłe nowe, trudne sytuacje i problemy, które trzeba było rozwiązywać, sprawiły to, że Wiosną 1990 roku, Ks. Prałat Bydlon znalazł się niespodziewanie w szpitalu i natychmiast musiał poddać się trudnej operacji. Po uda do z pełn si k czas Ks. by, z ob ję v Funk nił

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nym zabiegu operacyjnym, powoli powracał do zdrowia. Widząc niemożliwość dalszej, pełnej pracy na stanowisku proboszcza, prosi Ks. Arcybiskupa o zwolnienie z dotychczasowych obowiazków.

Ks. Arcybiskup, przychylając się do prośby, zwalnia Ks. Prałata Adama Bydlonia z obowiązków i zaleca dalszą rehabilitację w specjalnym Domu dla Chorych Księży. Funkcję Proboszcza w tutejszej parafii pełnił przez 11 lat.

Od dnia 9-go Czerwca 1990 roku Ks. Arcybiskup Anthony Bevilacqua na nowego proboszcza, mianuje Ks. Bernarda Witkowskiego, dotychczasowego proboszcza parafii św. Władysława. Nominata spotykają liczne obowiązki parafialne i od pierwszych dni, stawia czoła wyzwaniu, energicznie zabierając się za pracę parafialna. Stanał do wielkich zadań nie znając dostatecznie tutejszego środowiska i problemów, jakie wyłonia się przed

Pierwszą, najważniejszą sprawą, była potrzeba odnowienia kościoła, naprawienie uszkodzeń, oraz prowadzenie różnych bieżących spraw administracyjnych i duszpasterskich.

W tym czasie umiera Ks Prałat Józef Kłosiński, który przez ostatnie 19 lat był na emeryturze a ostatnie lata spędzał w Domu Chorych Księży. Ks. Prałat Józef Kłosiński zmarł 13-go Października 1990r. Vroczystości pogrzebowe odbyły się w tutejszym kościele, którym przewodniczył, powołany przed kilkoma miesiącami do grona kardynalskiego, Ksiądz Kardynał Anthony Bevilacqua. Homilję wygłosił Ks. Pralat Abam Bydlon.

Dzięki trafnie wybranemu Zespołowi Artystów Malarstwa Sakralnego, prace związane z odnowieniem i upiększeniem im kościoła, posuwały się bardzo szybko. W miedzy czasie został powołany Komitet Jubileuszowy, który miał za zadanie, zajęcia się bezpośrednimi przygotowaniami Jubileuszu 100-lecia istnienia parafii. Jak zawsze, tak i teraz nie zabrakło najbardziej aktywnych, spośród Parafian, którzy zaoferowali swoją pomoc. Nie sposób wyliczyć wszystkich prac, które zostaly wykonane i osób, które brały aktywny udział.

Dzień 15-go Września 1991 r. zapisał się ważnym wydarzeniem w życiu Parafii i w życiu Księdza Proboszcza Bernarda Witkowskiego. Tego dnia, Ojciec Święty a- Jan Pawel II, nadał Ks. Bernardowi, zaszczytny tytuł Prałata. W krótce, z tej okazji odbył się uroczysty bankiet w szkolnym Audytorium.

Ostatnie miesiace, tygodnie i dni przed Jubileuszem 100-lecia, to okres wzmożonej pracy Księży, Sióstr, Nauczycieli, Pracowników parafialnych i wielu Parafian. To wszystko zaowocowało wspaniała Uroczystością Religijną i Uroczystym Bankietem.

Pięknie odnowiony, uroczyście udekorowany kościół, wzbudzał podziw i uznanie licznych gości i parafian.

Uroczysty Jubileusz 100-lecia istnienia Parafii Świętego Jana Kantego, odbył się w Niedzielę 11-go Października 1992 roku. Główne uroczystości, odbyły się tego dnia o godz. 3:00 P.M. Uroczystościom liturgicznym przewodniczył honorowy gość, Ksiądz Biskup Louis A. DeSimone a Słowo Boże wygłosił Ks. Prałat Robert Grudowski. W liturgii Mszy św. wzieli udział licznie zebrani Księża, Siostry Zakonne, Honorowi Goście z różnych organizacji i Parafianie.

Po pięknej, bogatej liturgicznie Mszy św. miał miejsce uroczysty Bankiet w restauracji Ilona Kellers w którym wzięło udział ponad 700 osób.

Parafia Św. Jana Kantego, weszła w nowe 100-lecie na progu kończącego się XX wieku i nadchodzącego XXI a jednocześnie na progu trzeciego tysiąc-lecia Chrześcijaństwa.

Życzeniem wielu jest to, aby i dalsze lata istnienia tej Parafii, były szczęśliwe. Aby członkowie tej wspólnoty, zawsze na pierwszym miejscu stawiali BOGA i żyli JEGO NAUKA, obiawioną przez JEZUSA CHRYSTUSA, bo tylko ON może wskazać DROGE - PRAWDĘ - ZYCIE.

ST. JOHN CANTIUS SCHOOL

The early history of the School is closely connected to the early history of the Parish and is contained in that narrative. It is interesting to note that in the early 1920's the average enrollment was 1, 200 students, and there were 22 Sisters teaching in our School. At the time the largest graduating Class was 117 students in 1940. It is ironic because in 1940 the enrollment had dropped to under 1,000, the first time in many years.

From 1940 on, the student enrollment dropped steadily. From 1952 to 1970, however, the enrollment stayed around 1,000. During this

time, the largest graduating class ever was the Class of 1960, which had 144 students. Since then, the enrollment has gone down steadily, but we still have almost 500 students in our School. One thing that has dropped dramatically is the number of Sisters who are now in our School. For example, school records show that in 1956 there was only one Lay Teacher in St. John Cantius. Now, in 1992, we have only three Sisters present in our School: the Principal and two Sisters who teach. The rest of our faculty is made up of Lay Teachers who do an excellent job educating our boys and girls and helping to form them into good Catholic men and women. One of the best indications of the quality of education that has been provided for our children by the Sisters and Lay Teachers is the fact that over the years we have had 26 young men enter the Priesthood and 54 young women answer the call to Religious life.

Academically, we have been second to none. In fact, the School received Certification from the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools in July 1982. Finally, on March 3, 1983, the School received notification of its Accreditation, a recognition that all of us can be proud of

In our research to prepare the anniversary book we came across a Parish Dues Book that had a small piece of paper pasted to the top of the Parish name. The small piece of paper had "church of St. John Cantius." However, when we lifted this small piece of paper we found the "church of the Holy Rosary" was printed underneath. We couldn't understand the reason for this. But, we did find a letter from Father Klosinski, written to Msgr. Bydlon, in which he mentions that Msgr. Kopytkiewicz had used that name for the church evidently before the Archdiocese had decided on an official name. Father Klosinski mentioned that he had seen a baptismal certificate with the church listed as the "Church of Our Lady of the Rosary" and it was signed by Msgr. Kopytkiewicz.

PARISH SOCIETIES

The strength of a Parish can often be measured by the strength of its Societies. The members are, after all, the parishioners who show the most interest in their own spiritual life and the life of the Parish. They are in touch with the activities of the Parish and are involved in them. They are also the people that the Pastor and the Priests of the Parish can contact most readily in order to inform them of some happening in the Parish.

St. John Cantius has been blessed with many men and women who have joined our Societies and have been instrumental in keeping the Societies and the Parish strong. Their dedication and hard work should be remembered in this 100th anniversary year because they have played such an important role in the history of our Parish. May God bless them, and may Our Beautiful Lady keep them always in her care.

THE ADORATION SOCIETY

The first religious Society founded at St. John Cantius was the Adoration Society. Its purpose was to honor and adore Our Lord hidden in the Most Blessed Sacrament. The Society was founded on March 1, 1894 by Monsignor Kopytkiewicz and Mr. Franciszek Chwieroth who was the first President. Jozef Chojnacki was

Vice-President, Franciszek Sucharski, Secretary, and Franciszek Szperka was Treasurer.

The Golden Anniversary Book still mentions the existence of the Adoration Society, but there is no mention of it in the 90th anniversary book.

THE HOLY ROSARY SOCIETY

Shortly after the Adoration Society was formed, Mr. Wojciech Kowalski, Jozef Franecki, Jozef Wisniewski, Wiktorja Szablewska, Konstancja Szrankowska and Agnieszka Wojnar met with Msgr. Kopytkiewicz to form a Society that would have as its purpose the love, honor and devotion of the Blessed Mother. They chose Our Lady of the Rosary and immediately encouraged their members and all parishioners to pray the rosary at one of the Sunday Masses.

One interesting fact about the Society was its decision to provide a fifty dollar benefit to the survivors of any member who died, in order to help with funeral expenses. It is another example of how the early immigrants took care of themselves. They did not wait for the government to help them.

It was the Rosary Society that donated \$2,000 at the time of the Silver Jubilee of the Parish for the beautiful pulpit that used to stand in the church. Unfortunately, it was disassembled during the renovation of the church after Vatican Council II. All that remains now are the small statues of the Evangelists that are on the wall of the sanctuary.



the Jesuit Fathers to lead the first Parish Mission. The Jesuits were traveling throughout the United States trying to spread this devotion. Shortly after the Mission, in December of 1904, the Society was organized. Mr. Jozef Domzalski and Stanislaw Grabowski were instrumental in the formation of the Society. The purpose of the Society was to become acquainted with the mercy of God, manifested through His Most Sacred Heart.

THE THIRD ORDER OF ST FRANCIS

The III Order of St. Francis was founded at our Parish by Father Zygmunt Janicki of Krakow, Poland, on March 24, 1912. Father Janicki visited Polish Parishes in America for this very purpose. At the outset, there were 130 members - men and women. Membership in the III Order is quite demanding. A person who chooses to join the III Order must, first of all, be of exemplary character; must accept a year of novitiate; must wear a scapular and cincture; and at profession must promise to obey the Commandments of God and the Church. There are certain required prayers, and confession is a monthly obligation.

Unfortunately, interest in the III Order has decreased greatly in all Parishes. In ours, we have only three members.

The first Prefect of the III Order was Jozef Matraszek and his assistant was Jozef Domzalski. The women were led by Wiktoria Szablewska and her assistant, Michalina Zaporowska.

CHILDREN OF MARY - DZIECI MARJI

In 1899, the Bernardine Sisters had established a Society for the young girls of the Parish known as the Young Women of the Immaculata (Towarzystwo Panien Niepokalanek). In 1912, when the Nazareth Sisters arrived at the Parish the name of the Society was changed to Towarzystwo Dzieci Marji. And so, it can be said that the Children of Mary has existed officially since 1912. The Moderator was always one of the Sisters, and, by vote, three girls were chosen to assist her. The first girls were: Julja Tyminska, Wiktoria Kedziora and Helena Drzewiecka.

It was through the generosity of the Children of Mary that Father Grynia was able to purchase the beautiful statue of Our Blessed Mother which stands on the north side of the church.

Today there are not very many members, but efforts are being made to revive the Children of Mary.

PARISH CHOIR UNDER THE PATRONAGE OF ST CECELIA

The Parish Choir was founded formally on November 8, 1893, through the efforts of Msgr. Kopytkiewicz and the Organist at the time, Mr. Franciszek Majer. Mr. Szczepan Sejda was its first President and Mr. Jan Norkiewicz was elected Secretary. On July 5, 1901, Mr. Wiktor Gutkowski became the Organist and Choir Director, and he served in this capacity for 52 years. After his retirement in 1953, Mr. Edward

Grudowski, father of Msgr. Robert Grudowski, become the Organist. However, he died shortly after, and Mr. Joseph Mensick then assumed the position of Organist and Choir Director. He stayed in this position for the next 39 years until his retirement. Today the Organist and Choir Director is Mr. Wojciech Hollender, a young, talented musician who is working hard to enhance the liturgical music that accompanies our Masses and devotions.

SOCIETY OF ST. VINCENT DE PAUL

Concern for the poor, widows and orphans was always an important consideration of the Parish. There were several of these organizations in the Parish right from the beginning. However, on November 16, 1916, the Society of St. Vincent De Paul was founded. The money raised to help the needy was acquired through yearly dues of the members and from money collected each week in church. The original Officers included: Mr. Jozef Domzalski, President, Franciszek

Wolnowski, Vice-President, Marcin Szarejko, Secretary, Waclaw Garstkiewicz, Treasurer, Rafal Pacewicz, Auditor. Mrs. Aniela Kowalewska and Mrs. Anna Dylewska were the visitators.

Today, a collection is taken up in church once a month to gain support for the work of the Society. The money is distributed to the needy of the Parish. The Pastor determines the extent of the need and he issues all checks.

THE UNITED SOCIETIES OF BRIDESBURG AND FRANKFORD

Father Grynia recognized that there was a lack of unity and, at times, a conflict of dates and interest among the Societies and so, he decided to found a United Society which would consist of representatives from every Society. The purpose was to foster harmony among all the Society

eties so that they could work together for the good of the Parish and the good of each Society. The first Officers were: Stefan Hoffman, President, Wanda Buczkowska, Vice-President, Jozef Bogucki, Secretary, Jozef Domzalski, Marshal. It was founded on January 25, 1933.

It is interesting to note that the Golden Anniversary Book mentions that there were 60 organizations represented in the United Societies.

The United Societies still exists today, and its purpose and goal is the same as at its founding.

THE HOLY NAME SOCIETY

Father Grynia was also instrumental in the founding of the Holy Name Society. With the help of Father Stanislaw Pawlowski, OFM, the Society was founded on November 14, 1937. The first Officers were: Mr. Kazimierz Przybylowski, President, Stefan Rosinski, Secretary, Stanislaw Pietrusinski, Financial Secretary. The Directors were: Jozef Domzalski, Kazimierz Ratke, Henryk Dombrowski, and Antoni Gutkowski.

On the first Communion Sunday, January 19, 1938, more than 400 men filled the church and received Our Lord in Holy Communion. By the Golden Jubilee Year, 1942, there were 791 members.

The Holy Name Society is still very active and contributes much to the life of the Parish. In this 100th anniversary year they are making a strong effort to draw the young men of the Parish into the Society.

The present Officers are:

At one time, the membership consisted of 1000 men; today there are 212 men listed as members.



that all Parishes in the Archdiocese form an organization known as The Archbishop's Committee for the Christian Home and Family. The purpose was to have members of this Committee visit mothers of new babies every three months for a period of three years to instruct the mothers about the spiritual welfare of their children. Pamphlets for this purpose were given to the mothers. The general idea was to interest the young mothers in the life and the needs of the Parish, especially in the life of the School. They were encouraged to meet the Sisters and form a close relationship with them.

The Society was eventually known as the Holy Family Sodality, and their title sums up

their purpose and goals.

POLISH BENEFICIAL ASSOCIATION

Besides the societies that we established to strengthen the spiritual life of the parishioners, there were other organizations established to help them in their daily struggles in the new world. For example, the organization known today as the POLISH BENEFICIAL ASSOCIATION was founded to provide financial help in the event of the death of a member or his wife.

The idea for such an organization was first thought of by three of our parishioners: Franciszek Jaskowiak, Juljan Wessel and Franciszek Chwieroth. They went with their idea to Father Marian Kopytkiewicz who thought the idea was excellent and he called a parish meeting for all who were interested. On Sunday, December 3, 1899, the meeting was held in our Parish hall. The organization was first called STOWARZYSZENIE KASY POSMIERTNEJ NA WSCHODZIE

POLNOCNEJ AMERYKI. At its first convention, however, on October 1st and 2nd, 1900, it was decided to call it STOWARSZYSZENIE KASY POSMIERTNEJ POD OPIEKA SW. JANA KANTEGO. In later years it became known as the POLISH BENEFICIAL SOCIETY OF ST. JOHN KANTY, and now, simply POLISH BENEFICIAL ASSOCIATION.

At the first meeting, thirty-nine men joined the Society. It was decided that a death benefit of \$600. be given in the event of a member's death and \$300. at the death of a member's wife. It was also decided that members would only be ac-


cepted from St. John Cantius and St. Laurentius Parishes.

Of course, since then the Polish Beneficial Association has become one of the largest insurance and fraternal organizations in the country. They are also very active in civic, charitable, patriotic and religious activities. We are proud to say that they began their successful history right here at St. John Cantius.



ST. JOHN KANTY STATUE

he statue of St. John Kanty which now stands in our church stood above the main entrance of the famous St. John Kanty Prep in Erie, Pa. since September 2, 1912, until its arrival at our Parish on February 3, 1992.


The School had been closed since 1981 and the property was sold, but the statue remained above the door. Msgr. Bernard E. Witkowski, Class of 1953, thought often about bringing the statue to our Parish, and, finally, called Mr. Kenneth Lochbaum, the owner of the property, and asked if it would be possible. Mr. Lochbaum graciously agreed to give the statue to Monsignor, and through the generosity of the Alumni, the statue was removed and transported to Philadelphia.

The statue, made of Carrara Marble, was hand-carved in Milan, Italy. It weighs 1800 pounds, and stands six feet, seven inches tall.
