ST. JOHN THE BAPTIST

Carreathers, Eva Grade 8 May 6, 1976 Religion

John the Baptist, the immediate forerunner of Jesus, sent by God to prepare the way for the coming of the Messiah. John was of priestly descent on the side of both his parents. His father, Zacharias, was a priest of the course of Abija, while his mother, Elizabeth, belonged to the family of Aaron. They are described as being "righteous before God, walking in all the commandments of the Lord blameless." He was born in a city of the hill country of southern Judaea, about six months before the birth of Jesus. His parents were then old. His birth had been foretold by an angel to Zacharias while he was serving in the temple. The angel told him that his prayer for a child would be answered and that his wife would give birth to a son who was to be named John and who was to prepare the way for the coming of the Messiah. About his childhood and youth we know only that he lived as a Nazarite in the desert and that he was filled with the Holy Spirit even from birth. It is thought by some that he was a member of a Jewish sect of monks called the Essenes, but there is no clear evidence that this was so.

His first public appearance is carefully dated by Luke (3:1,2), according to the way time was then reckoned. This was somewhere about A.D. 26 or 27. His early ministry was laid in the wilderness of Judaea and in the Jordan valley. The main theme of his preaching was the near approach of the Messianic age and the need of adequate spiritual preparation to be ready for it. His mission was to prepare the people for the advent of the Messiah so that when He made His appearance they would recognize and accept Him. His message did not harmonize with what many of his hearers expected, for while they looked for deliverance from and judgment upon the foreign oppressor, he said that the Messiah would separate the good from the bad and would cast into the fire any tree which did not bring forth good fruit. Many of the Jews, especially the Pharisees, thought that they would enter the Kingdom of God automatically, simply because they were physically descended from Abraham, but John declared in no uncertain terms that this was not so at all. He called upon them to repent sincerely of their sins and to be baptized. The Baptism by water which he administered signified a break with and cleansing from sin. His Baptism was not something utterly new to the Jews; it had its roots in practices already familiar to them: in the various washings required by the Levitical law (Lev. 11-15), in the Messianic lustration foretold by the prophets (Jer. 33:8; Ezek. 36:25, 26; Zech. 13:1), and in the proselyte baptism of the Jewish Church. His baptism, however, differed essentially from these, in that while the Levitical washings brought restoration to a former condition, his baptism prepared for a new condition; the Jews baptized only Gentiles, but he called upon Jews to be baptized; and his baptism was a Baptism of water only in preparation for the Messianic Baptism of the Spirit anticipated by the prophets.

While the multitudes of common people flocked to the Jordan, Jesus also came to be baptized. Although Jesus and John were cousins, it appears that John did not know that Jesus was the Messiah until he saw the Holy Spirit descend upon him at his baptism (John 1:32-34). When Jesus came to him for baptism, he saw that He had no sin of which to repent, and would have refused, had Jesus not insisted, saving that it was necessary for Him to fulfill all righteousness. Shortly after, John said to two of the disciples as they saw Jesus pass by, "Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world" (John 1:29), and they left him to follow Jesus. He recognized the subordinate and temporary character of his own mission. For some unexplained reason, some of his disciples did not leave him to follow Jesus; and when some of them came to John with the complaint that all men were coming to Jesus, he said to them, "He must increase, but I must decrease" (John 3:30), and that he was not the Messiah, but only the forerunner of the Messiah. Little is known about John's training of his disciples beyond the fact that it included forms of prayer (Luke 11:1) and frequent fastings (Matt. 9:14); but he must also have taught them much concerning the Messiah and His work. The loyalty to him is shown in their concern over Jesus' overshadowing popularity, their refusal to abandon him in his imprisonment, the reverent care they gave his body after his death,



and in the fact that 20 years later there were disciples of his, including Apollos, the learned Alexandrian Jew, in faraway Ephesus (Acts 19:1-7).

The exact time of John's imprisonment or the length of time he was in prison is not known. It is clear, however, that Jesus began His ministry in Galilee after John was put in prison and that he was in prison approximately seven months at the time he sent two of his disciples to Jesus to inquire whether He really was the Messiah. This inquiry seems strange in view of his previous signal testimonies, and is probably to be explained either in the interest of his disciples, who needed assurance that Jesus was really the Messiah, or in some misgivings of his own because the Messianic kingdom was not being ushered in as suddenly and as cataclysmically as he had expected, and perhaps because he thought he was being forgotten while others were being helped. When the two disciples returned to John, Jesus expressed Himself in the frankest appreciation of John, declaring him to be more than a prophet and God's messenger sent to prepare the way for Him (Matt. 11:10-19).

The Gospels tell that John met his death through the vindictiveness of Herodias, whose sin of living in adultery with Herod, John had denounced. Josephus, on the other hand, attributes John's death to Herod's jealousy of his great influence with the people. He also says that the destruction of Herod's army, in the war with his spurned wife's father-inlaw, was regarded by the Jews as God's punishment upon him for the murder of John. Josephus undoubtedly gives, not the real reason, which he would not dare to give to the public, but the reason Herod chose that the public be given.

St. John the Baptist

The father of John the Baptist, Zachary, who belonged to the priestly house of Aaron, was offering sacrifice in the Temple at Jerusalem when the angel Gabriel announced to him that, despite the old age of himself and his wife Elizabeth, a son was to be born to them. Because of his disbelief, Zachary was struck dumb until the child's birth. While the child was still in Elizabeth's womb, it leapt with joy when our Lady visited Elizabeth. After the child's birth, Zachary fulfilled the angel's instructions by naming it John; Zachary regained his speech and composed the beautiful song called the BENEDICTUS.

During his youth, John lived a penitential life in the Judean desert, perhaps together with monklike Jews called Essenes. In about A.D. 27, John began to preach a baptism of repentance, in the area of the lower Jordan; his disciples included the future apostles Peter, John, and Andrew. Despite John's protests, Jesus asked John to baptize Him. Many thought the Baptist was the coming Messias, but John clearly denied this before the Pharisees and Sadducees and pointed out to his disciples the true "Lamb of God." Jesus.

John rebuked Herod Antipas, tetrarch of Galilee, for marrying Herodias, the wife of the ruler's half brother. Herod imprisoned John in the fortress of Machaerus, but he feared to do anything more to him. Although imprisoned, John was able to see his disciples, whom he sent to Jesus for word of His activities. But when Herod promised anything to Herodias's daughter Salome as a reward for dancing, Herodias ordered her to ask for the head of John. The Baptist's influence lived on: St. Paul was to find at Ephesus persons he had converted and who knew only of John's baptizing. His chief feasts are on June 24 (his birth) and on August 29 (his execution). The following have served as resident pastors of St. John's





VITA

Fr. Raymond James Studzinski, O.S.B., son of Leonard and Stella Studzinski, was born on April 18, 1943, in Detroit, Michigan. He attended St. John's Grade School and Sacred Heart High School, Dearborn, Michigan, and St. Meinrad Seminary High School, St. Meinrad, Indiana, and was graduated from the latter in May, 1961.

He received the degree of Bachelor of Arts from St. Meinrad College in May, 1966. In the summer of 1963 he was accepted into the monastic community of St. Meinrad Archabbey and made his solemn profession as a Benedictine monk in September, 1969. His theological studies were begun at the St. Meinrad School of Theology in the fall of 1966.

In the fall of 1968 he was accepted as a graduate student in the Graduate School of Indiana University in the Department of the Study of Religion. While at the University, he studied under Dr. David H. Smith, Dr. William F. May, and Dr. David Bidney. Dr. Smith has acted as reader for his thesis.

After completion of course work at Indiana University, Fr. Raymond resumed his course of studies at St. Meinrad and was ordained a Roman Catholic priest in September, 1969. He received the degree of Master of Divinity in May, 1970 from St. Meinrad. In September, 1970 he entered a doctoral program at Fordham University, New York, where he is presently a Ph.D. candidate in historical theology. In 1973 he joined the faculty of St. Meinrad School of Theology where he is currently an associate professor of theological history.





Sister Mary Joan is the eldest of four daughters of Edward and Genevieve Szkutnicki, 24918 Cherry Street, Dearborn, Michigan. Her elementary education was at St. John the Baptist School for eight years. She graduated from the eighth grade in 1955. After attending O. L. Smith Junior High School for the ninth grade, she attended Edsel Ford High School for three years and graduated in June of 1959.

That following August 30th, Sister Mary Joan entered the postulate of the Sisters of St. Joseph, T.O.S.F. in Garfield Heights, Ohio where she also began her studies in Elementary Teaching by attending St. John College in Cleveland, Ohio. After two years of novitiate and four years as a Junior Profess Sister, she made her final vows on August 10, 1967 in the Marymount Convent Chapel. That same summer on June 7, 1967 sister received her B.S.E. degree in Elementary Teaching from St. John College.

The intervening years have seen her return to Michigan to teach and do her graduate work at the University of Detroit during the summers. In June of 1972 she received her M.A. degree in Curriculum Construction from the University of Detroit.

Sister Mary Joan enjoys teaching and has taught at Our Lady of Fatima Parish in Oak Park, Michigan; SS. Peter and Paul in Garfield Heights, Ohio and at St. Anthony in Belleville, Michigan. At present she is teaching the third grade here at St. John the Baptist where she attended school as a child.

Sister Mary Roberta (formerly Anna Pelz), is the daughter of Ignatius and Victoria Pelc. Sister Roberta entered the Franciscan Order on October 9, 1934. The first sister to enter the convent from St. John's. Presently Sister Roberta is in Ohio.

HISTORY

When nine men met at the home of Joseph Bartos of 3902 Jim Daly, composed of Messrs. Joseph Bartos, Albin Bartos, Thomas Niemczewski, Frank Niemiec, Paul Waske, Gielarzyn, Szydlowski, F. Pietrowski and John Lukasiewicz to discuss the possibility of bringing a church to this rural area of Wayne County fifty years ago, they could hardly have had an idea that their discussion would result in the St. John's community we have today. But as we built our church and our school and came to know each other, this is what came to be.

This area, like so many in the metropolitan Detroit area, grew up hand in hand with the Roman Catholic Church. Cadillac built St. Anne's Church when he founded Detroit as Fort Pontchartrain in 1701. Throughout the region, as areas became settled, Catholics built churches to maintain their religious and cultural traditions. The Poles who settled in the Westwood area of Dearborn Township had that same desire for a cohesive religious community.

These Poles came to Dearborn Township with the opening of the Ford Plant in River Rouge shortly after the end of World War I.

In those "Roaring Twenties" the auto industry boomed and times were good. Workers moved away from the city to be close to their place of employment. But many of the newcomers to this area found the trip to Sacred Heart in Dearborn, the nearest church at that time, a long and difficult one over poor country roads. Others found the language difficult to understand. So it was that at the home of Mr. Joseph Bartos, those nine men drew up a petition to the Chancery seeking a church and a Polish-speaking priest for this growing region of Dearborn Township.

The bishop moved quickly on their request and assigned Fr. Bona from Melvindale to meet the needs of the Polish community. The first Mass was held outside on one chilly, wintry day in 1926.

Graciously, the Pokrzewnicki family offered their home as a location for Mass each Sunday until the first church was built.

The early parishioners gave generously of their time and materials as they worked swiftly. And so it was very soon thereafter that they erected the first church of the parish. Mr. Lukasiewicz, one of the nine men who had petitioned for a church, donated twelve lots for use as parish proeprty. Fr. Bona contributed \$600 toward construction of the church. On April 4, 1926, about 60 persons proudly attended the first Mass held in the new church. The following week the first Baptism was performed. Fr. Bona celebrated the first marriage ceremony in the church in May and performed the first funeral Mass in October. Documents show that the parish was officially placed under the patronage of St. John the Baptist on June 4, 1926.

That September the first classes were held when the church doubled as a school during the week. The first class graduated the following June.

Fr. Bona left in the early part of 1927 and was replaced by Fr. John Hewelt. Later that year, the first financial report was filed and the first parish picnic was held. The fledgling parish was on its way.

Fr. Hewelt received permission from the Chancery to build a school in October of 1923. The parish, ready with plans, again moved ahead rapidly and completed construction of the school the following spring. The school, finished on June 23, 1929, was already staffed with three sisters from the Order of St. Francis of Sylvania, Ohio. The first convent was a home across the street from the church.

Students enrolled in the new school in September of 1929. Later that month, the community celebrated the first registered Communion and Confirmation rites. Thirty-two boys and twenty-five girls received



First Holy Communion and were also confirmed.

A month later, tragedy struck the nation when the stock market crashed. Many men in the area soon lost employment as industry slowed down. But the strong community commitment that built St. John's, continued. People responded as generously then as they had before the crash. In 1930, the parish built a

convent for the teaching sisters and began a collection to build a rectory. Early that year, Fr. Hewelt left and Fr. John Bartkowiak was named the first resident pastor.

The church settled down now with its first full time pastor, and a school and a convent already built. In the fall of 1931, a new school wing was added and the teaching staff was enlarged with the change to the teaching Sisters of St. Joseph from Garfield Heights, Ohio. With the hard times, funds for the rectory came slowly, but the building was completed in 1934 with

help from many parishioners. After living in a house next door to the sisters during the first three years at St. John's and living in the school for another, Fr. Bartkowiak finally had a place that he could call



home. He stayed in the rectory until he left St. John's in 1939. Fr. Theodore F. Kowalewski was appointed in his place.

And then, with increased industrialization at the start of World War II, the community began to grow again and a need arose for another priest. Fr. Edward Skrocki, from St. Mary's College in Orchard Lake, began to assist Fr. Kowalewski on weekends. In March of 1945, Fr. Francis Szaniawski was appointed St. John's first resident pastor. Fr. Skrocki left later that year and was replaced by Fr. Michael Koltuniak for the weekend help.

After the war, the boom continued. Young men returning from the service found this community, with a well established Catholic Church and school, an ideal place in which to settle. St. John's grew even more rapidly. In 1948, a new convent was purchased

for the sisters. The young people moving into the community brought young children with them. The school again was too small. With the permission of



His Eminence, Edward Cardinal Mooney, ground was broken for a new school on May 2, 1948. The modern facility was completed in record time, but not quite soon enough for the opening of school that September. The Archbishop blessed the new facility on October 17, 1948.

School enrollment kept booming and the parish kept growing, but not without change. In 1950, Fr. Francis Szaniawski left as assistant pastor and was replaced by Fr. Eugene Kijek.

A Solemn Jubilee Mass the next year marked the first twenty-five years of St. John's service to this community. Fr. Kijek left the following year and was replaced by Fr. Leo L. Kulinski.

Meanwhile, the beautiful white frame church that served so well for so many years proved inadequate for the needs of the rapidly growing parish. Just as the area's population explosion resulted in a need for a bigger school building, the time had come to build a bigger church. Construction began in May 1954 on the new church. His Eminence Edward Cardinal Mooney blessed the new structure on October 27, 1955.

In 1957, Fr. Leo L. Kulinski left St. John's and was replaced by a new assistant pastor, Fr. Joseph Matlenga. Fr. Matlenga's stay was short: both he and Fr. Kowalewski left the next year and St. John's received a new pastor, Fr. Mitchell Witkowski, and a new assistant pastor, Fr. Francis Wahowiak. In 1962, Fr. Koltuniak left as weekend assistant and was replaced by Fr. Anthony Kosnik. The following year, Fr. Wahowiak left and was replaced by Fr. Jerome Swierzb.

With the Vatican II Council in 1963 came new ways in the church. In 1969, a steering committee was formed to draft the outline for a parish council. Later that year, on November 23, the parish was saddened by the death of Fr. Mitchell Witkowski.

Fr. Jerome Swierzb, the assistant pastor, performed the duties of pastor until February 18, 1970, when Fr. Joseph Karasiewicz was appointed pastor. Within a week Fr. Jerome left for another appointment, and was not replaced.

That year marked the end of the construction period at St. John's. A new baptismal font, donated by the Rosary Altar Society was dedicated early in February. Later that year, the first parish council was held and the first parish council officers were sworn in in December.

On sick leave from his diocese of Marquette, Fr. John Chrobak took up residence at St. John's on August 5, 1970, and performed the duties of an assistant pastor until August 9, 1973, when he was recalled by his bishop.

St. John's celebrated its Golden Jubilee in 1976, and continues to grow in its life in Christ.











Parish Council

The Parish Council is the coordinating and unifying structure of the parish community. Only a small portion of the fifty year history of St. John the Baptist Parish has been shared by the Parish Council. As recently as 1969, a steering committee drafted the outline for the Parish Council, presented an interim constitution to the parish, and then organized the nomination and parish-wide election of the first council which took place in the fall of 1970.

From this first council in 1970 to the present 1976 members, the Parish Council has moved slowly but steadily to assure a role as your representatives and your voice in the Church.

The first elected members to the council were Hank Wathen, Helen Piwowar, Valentine Warunek, John McLain, Michael Ploucha, Christine Lemon, Al Maci, Virginia Schmelzer, William Siegel, Adam Murzin, Frank Adams, John Hayes, Robert LeFebvre, Raymond Barnes, and Geraldine Filippi.

The first elected officers of the council were: Hank Wathen, president; Valentine Warunek, vicepresident, and Christine Lemon, secretary.

Since the first election to the present year 1976, elections were held to replace 5 outgoing members. The Parish Council consists of 17 members; 15 lay people, Fr. Joseph Karasiewicz representing clergy, and Sr. Mary Cyrilla, religious.

The Rosary Society came into existence in 1925 with Michalene Niemczewski, president, with 11 members meeting in homes to say the rosary.

The Altar Society came into existence in 1943 with 26 members and the following officers: president, Florence Hanson, vice president, Mary LePay, secretary, Dorothy Bowman, treasurer, Mary Kubiak.

In 1958 the two Societies joined, thus the Rosary Altar Society or ROSARIANS. A rosarian is required to recite the fifteen decades of our Lady's rosary every day and to reflect on the Mysteries of Catholic Faith concerned with the Incarnation, Birth, Death, and Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ and to say a rosary for deceased members and husbands. To help with the needs of the Church. Women praying and working together with Mary as our proctor, to give spiritual benefits wherever needed.

Through the early years with the aid of the Holy Name Society raised monies with bingos and raffles to build the new church and school.

Contributed over \$3,000 to the Mothers' Room in the church, Holy Water containers, linens for the altar, vestments and albs for the priests, cassocks and surplices for the altar boys, purchased Communion dresses for the less fortunate, landscaping for the church. The latest donation - the Baptismal Font in memory of Rev. Mitchell Witkowski, dedicated Feb. 1970 by Rev. Joseph Karasiewicz and Rev. Jerome Swiezb, a beautiful cross and red cassocks for the altar boys.

Our Lady of Fatima Rosary making group, with Margaret Blair as chairman for years, made over 3000 rosaries and donated them to the missions, sponsored Jubilians of our parish for couples who have celebrated 25, 35, 40 and 50 years with Mass, papal blessings from Rome and reception. Mrs. Ann Kirsch has been chairman for years.

Donations to the boys in Vietnam, sponsored a child with leprosy, sewing and mending clothes for Plymouth State Home, Jonnie coats, Christmas parties at Wayne County and Veterans' Hospital, donated a record player to the girls at Vista Maria, toys for tots, migrant workers, baskets of food to the needy, helped less fortunate from our parish, etc. Every year when Forty Hour Devotions are held in our parish the ladies cook and serve food to the visiting priests, dishes and silverware to the church hall. Adopted a Korean orphan for one year, medical missions and Pope's Store Room, etc.

To the school - playground equipment, helped establish the library, typewriters, projectors, movie screens, gave Christmas parties with goodies and gifts for many years. The latest donations are for the Science Project.

To the sisters' convent, donations for the station wagons, sewing machine, stove, linens, food, etc. The last few years we have held benefits and proceeds turned over to the convent. The Rosary Altar Society at the present time, is rolling cancer bandages and contributing to the Christ Child Plan, layettes for Social Services of our community.

The present membership of the Society is 98 ladies with the following elected officers: president Virginia Schmelzer, vice president Ethel Traxler (acting), with Bernice Bacalia (Honorary) treasurer Agnes Iadonisi, recording secretary Julia Emmitt, corresponding secretary Dolores Rzucidlo. Committees: Activities, Louise Litnanski; Membership, Theda Johnson; Spiritual, Theresa Breen; C.C.W.A.D., Anna Kirsch; Social, Ann Stevens, Stella Skocen; Parliamentary Committee, Theresa Hobbins, Ann Barnhart and Margaret Blair; History, Loretta Novak,; Decorations, Cecille Mercier; Relief, Ethel Traxler; Blood Bank, Clara Macaborski; Prefects, St. Elizabeth, Loretta Minton; St. Jude, Julia Ringwelski; St. Margaret, Isabella Chieca.

The purposes and aims of the Scouting program of the Boy Scouts of America became a part of the youth program of St. John's in the latter part of the year 1958. Specifically the program is directed to duty to God, to helping others and duty to self in keeping oneself physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight. This then is the precept of the Scout Oath and Promise.

With the approval of Fr. Mitchell Witkowski (deceased) and with Fr. Francis Wahowiak as our Scout Chaplain, the charter members of Troop 1142 met with officials of the Sauk Trail District of the Detroit Area Council, B.S.A. for the purpose of organization. These charter members were Charles J. Cousins, Leo J. Aniol, John C. Dzuiba, Frank C. Kaminski, John S. Warunek and Charles U. Chieca. With the completion of committee training completed under the direction of the Sauk Trail District Leadership Training Committee, appointments to committee were made with Mr. Cousins as Institutional Representative, Mr. Richard F. Horton, Chairman and Mr. Chieca as Scoutmaster.

Recruitment of prospective Scouts was begun in early 1959 and charter members of the troop were -Leo M. Aniol, Michael C. Cousins, James R. Horton, Timothy Malyszek, Henry J. Modrzynski, Donald Renner, James Susek, Glenn Szoff, Robert and William Warunek, Gerald Pondell and Patrick M. Chieca.

Through the years that followed many father and son combinations became a part of the membership of Troop 1142. Some that come to mind of this historian are (in addition to the above named) Fritz and Fred Jakob, Roger and Dennis Mercier, Joseph Sultana, Jr. and son Joseph III, Walter Gorecki and Gerald, Robert Sullivan and Michael, Marvin Krey and James, Edward Rzucidlo and Anthony, Norman McLain and Michael, John Westfall and sons, Walter and Joseph Seres, Francis Wathen and Robert.

In early 1963 Mr. John Deloge was appointed Scoutmaster, followed by Walter Gorecki, Ollie Birkenmier, Harold Kuypers, Joseph Dickers, Edward Rzucidlo, Robert Minton and William Livingston.

Interesting anecdotes come to mind of past years. One would be the fact that at one time the Troop has had four brothers as members, these being the double set of twins of Mr. & Mrs. John Warunek. One story is told of how one of them pitched his tent on an incline and during the night, while still in his sleeping bag, wiggled his way under the tent and found himself under the morning sky. The Troop, always mindful of the spiritual development of its members, yearly attended the annual Scout Retreats conducted by the C.Y.O. and the Catholic Committee for Scouting at D.A. Scout Ranch in Metamora, Mich. In one of the first yearly retreats a violent storm came upon the site, blowing down all tents with the result that approximately 30 persons, soaked to the skin, found themselves in one huge tent. Scouting is FUN and needless to say a good time was had by all.

One can well remember early fund raising projects such as the annual pancake and sausage breakfasts when hot water had to be heated on outdoor stoves with which to wash syrupy and greasy dishes and silverware and which only this type food fare can produce. This was all done in the old church, well remembered.

Scouting advanced and so did members of Troop 1142. Those that advanced to the rank of Eagle were -James Krey, Joseph Seres, Anthony Rzucidlo and John Westfall. They also, at the same time achieved recognition for their profession to the Catholic Faith by completion of the requirements for the Ad Altare Dei Emblem Award meaning - "To the Altar of God."

Through to the year 1966, young men of Troop 1142 whom we meet from time to time are David McTear, Michael Cousins, Joseph Seres and Anthony Rzucidlo. Time has a way of telling us that life goes on. The Troop prospered through to 1974 when unforeseen circumstances caused it to disband, however in mid 1976 the Troop reorganized. Current committee and Troop members are as follows:

Shortly after Troop reorganization in 1976 Andrew P. Bavol was awarded his rank of Eagle in a ceremony at St. John's. He had completed his requirements while a member of Troop 720. It is interesting to note that seven members of the Troop serve as altar boys while one presently serves as a Lector. Opportunities to aspire to the priesthood have surfaced though they never fully materialized.

Cub Scouting in St. John's will have been in existence for the past seven years and two months. This program is for boys ages 8 through 10 years or in the 5th grade of school. Pack 1142 is a lively group of dedicated people. Since its founding, the Pack has brought Cubbing to many boys in the age group. Though not all have gone on to join Scouting in the older age group (11 to 13), a remarkable job has been done. Most of the Cubs are engaged in working on neir advancements and in particular the Parvuli Dei mblem Award which means "Little Children of od." It is hoped that all will receive this recognion.

From Vatican City, His Holiness Pope Paul VI eclared in a special message to the Scouts at the 1th World Jamboree held on the Plains of Marathon, Freece, stated, "Tomorrow, you and others like you, will be the leaders of your countries, and it is ecessary that you prepare yourselves now for this ask. To be good citizens, you must first recognize your relationship to God Who is the Father of all mankind. We are all His children and therefore prothers of one another. Remembering this, you will trive to do what is best for yourselves and for your heighbor, and in this way you shall be building the oundations for true peace. If you recognize the natural dignity and goodness of others, you will espect their rights."

Presently, there are fourteen ladies on the library staff with Marie Cousins being the coordinator.





The highest faculty salesperson was Sr. Mary Generose.



The program closed with the entire assembly singing "We Wish You A Merry Christmas."


