We thank all our faithful members who sacrifice each week, even each day (some), for their Lord and Church.



St. John the Baptist

The feast of the birthday of St. John the Baptist is observed on June 24th. He was born in a city of the hill country of southern Judea about six months before the birth of Jesus. He was the son of Zachary and Elizabeth, a cousin of the Blessed Virgin Mary. He was the last of the prophets of the Old Covenant. His work was to prepare the way and announce the coming of the long-expected Messiah. Thirty years after the birth of Jesus, John began his mission on the banks of the Jordan. Many of the Jews, especially the Pharisees, thought that they would enter the Kingdom of God automatically, simply because they were physically descended from Abraham, but John declared in no uncertain terms that this was not so at all. He called upon them to repent sincerely of their sins and to be baptized. The Baptism by water which he administered signified a break with and cleansing from sin. While the multitudes of common people flocked to the Jordan, Jesus also came to be baptized. Although Jesus and John were cousins, it appears that John did not know that Jesus was the Messiah until he saw the Holy Spirit descend upon him at his baptism.

The occasion of dying a martyr soon presented itself. John rebuked Herod Antipas, tetrarch of Galilee, for marrying Herodias, the wife of the ruler's half brother. Herod imprisoned John in the fortress of Machaerus. On the occasion of the anniversary of Herod's birth, a feast was given in which Salome, the daughter of Herodias, pleased him by a graceful dance. He swore that he would grant whatever she asked. The girl consulted her mother, who advised her to request the head of St. John. An officer was dispatched to the prison, and St. John was beheaded to satisfy the revenge of a woman. The death of St. John occurred about a year before that of Jesus.

n 1926, the southwest part of Dearborn Township consisted mostly of farms and unpaved roads.

The nearest parish was Sacred Heart on Michigan Avenue. A few men of Polish descent got together to discuss the possibility of having a church built in their own community in which the liturgy would be celebrated in Polish.

Permission was received in 1926 and so the task of building this new church to be called St. John the Baptist fell to Joseph and Albin Bartos, Mr. Gierlazyn, John Lukasiewicz, F. Pietrowski, Thomas Niemczewski, Frank Niemiec and Paul Waske.

Gradually over time, a convent, rectory and school were built as the congregation grew. These dedicated men and women worked very hard during an economically difficult time in our country to have their own place of worship and a school in which their children would be educated.

The Sister of St. Joseph, Third Order of St. Francis joined the staff in 1931 and taught 90 students.

Various organizations were formed such as the Rosary Society, Altar Society, Holy Name and the Young Ladies Sodality. The Rosary and Altar societies merged in 1958. In later years other groups developed such as the Parish Council, Booster Club, Club 12, Tatry Dancers, St. Vincent de Paul Society, Scouts, Legion of Mary, Choir and the St. John's Travelers as the most recent.

In 1995, the school closed due to declining enrollment. The Sisters who taught our children for so many years found jobs in other schools but are still with us working quietly around the church and attend Mass every weekend. We are grateful to them for their many years of service in educating children.

We are also thankful for the priests who have served in this parish. We pray for vocations to the priesthood and religious life and for dedicated lay persons to assist the clergy and religious in church ministries.

We pray that our parishioners will remain faithful to the Gospel and live out the virtues of Faith, Hope and Charity as worded in our mission statement.



The following are excerpts from letters written by Fr. John Hewelt, to the Reverend Stephen Woznicki regarding the beginnings of St. John the Baptist Roman Catholic parish.

Detroit, Michigan January 23, 1927

My Dear Rt. Rev. Father,

Said first Mass at St. Albertus this morning at 6, and at Dearborn St. John Bapt. at 10:30. At my request, good Fr. Sharpe sent a messenger yesterday P.M. to the colony some 4 miles s.w. of Dearborn, informing them that they would have mass at 10:30.

There were present some 25 men, 25 women and perhaps 30 children. The church was warm. Luckily I took along a chalice and mass wine. After Mass, the committee came to see me in the sacristy. I told them to see me next Sunday and we would confer about the condition of the mission. The church is a neat little chapel of about 200 seating capacity. It is exactly 15 miles from my house to the church. No complete census was ever taken in district. At present, it would be impossible to take it. But the pews could be rented, and in the spring a census, a house to house trip would reveal the status.

No doubt it is a poor mission, but I was favorably impressed.

Humbly I await your further instructions.

Detroit May 13, 1928

My Dear Rt. Rev. Father,

Perhaps it is well that I apprise you of our activity at St. John the Baptist. At a parish meeting held today, the parishioners unanimously voted that we build a parish hall, added to which would be two classrooms, as the State School Inspector Mr. Lee, threatens to drive us out of the church.

The Committee will call upon you in this matter, to obtain your authorization. The people are of the opinion that the parish will develop much faster, if we provide a place for entertainments, and I think, they are right. No doubt the parish hall will be a source of revenue.

The two classrooms under the same roof with the hall would be a precautionary measure. The State authorities forced me to build a school in Warrendale, prohibiting teaching in Church. Mr. Lee wrote me a letter that he will visit me personally in this matter.

The church grounds are paid for now, and on the church building we have \$7000.00 of debt. We have now about 60 paying families. The vacant lots are all purchased by Polish families in Detroit. In course of time I envision there a second Hamtramck.

At present the small parish is beautifully united and full of enthusiasm.

Detroit, Michigan January 1, 1929

My Dear Rt. Rev, Father,

Had a talk today with the Church Committee of our little parish regarding the diocesan obligations. I handed to them the bills but they paid to me only one bill, the collection of the Holy Father.

They requested me to plead with you to remit for this year all the other obligations, if at all possible. The little parish is just now passing through the most crucial period of its existence. It is a fact; these 62 families are doing wonders this year. The Sister's house, its furnishings, and the building of the school and hall take them to the hurting point. May I therefore ask, that you kindly remit the Diocesan tax for this year for the struggling parish of St. John's? They really deserve this kind consideration.

At present, it is the pluckiest little parish in our diocese and, I think, it deserves at present any encouragement.

Detroit, Michigan July 11, 1929

Dear Rt. Rev. Father,

Sometime during May you kindly advised me that Confirmation and the blessing of our new school be postponed until September.

May I respectfully remind you of this again, and humbly ask you, on what Sunday of September we might expect the Solemnity? Any Sunday except the first, will be acceptable, as we would prefer that the Rev. Sister be in attendance. Three or 3:30 p.m. would be the only time suitable for the occasion, as many live scattered on the farms miles away.

My Dear Rt. Rev. Father,

Would it be asking too much of you, Rt. Rev. Father, if you could run out to our parish on Sunday August 11th at 3 or 3:30 p.m. and bless a statue of St. John the Baptist and the High Altar of our church?

By doing so, you would gladden the hearts of our good people and their pastor. Please, Rt. Rev. Father, do not turn down this invitation slightly because you would give an immense impetus and encouragement to the bright little parish and it would be a great consolation and incentive for further enthusiastic work and sacrifice of all members.

So near Detroit, this section of our flock, of our nationality, should be reclaimed 100 percent. A great parish is arising; but we must now cultivate and encourage the tender plant.

Please Rt. Rev. Father, arrange if possible to be with us on August 11th.



### Reminiscing . . .

We live on "Holy Ground", or so we like to say. We moved to Eton Street in 1958, across the street from St. John's School.

There was a visiting priest's house across from us, where the hall is now. St. John's wooden church was still standing on McDonald Street, although not used for masses at that time; and the parking lot was not cemented, but gravel.

When construction started on the hall in the early 60's, and the foundation was being excavated, my husband, Tom, asked Father Mitchell (Witkowski), the pastor at that time, if we could have some of the dirt to fill in our back yard. (That's where the "Holy Ground" comes in!). He graciously said yes.

Father Mitchell had a Boston Terrier (as did we) whom he liked to take for a walk around the block. At times when my husband was out working at putting in a new front lawn, Father Mitch would stop and chat with him. Father often told him to not work so hard in the summer heat or he would collapse.

When Father Mitchell died, he was laid in state in the rectory, so that the parishioners could come to pay their last respects.

I remember St. John's had some very early masses, 6:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m., I believe.

I also remember the May Crownings with the school children in procession from the school to the church, singing hymns. The girls were all very beautiful in their lovely gowns, and the boys dressed so neatly with their hair slicked down. There was always a great turnout of parishioners for those May Crownings!

There was also a beautiful procession with the children in their Communion dresses and uniforms, carrying lovely plants to the altar on Holy Thursday Evening Mass.

The church was always decorated beautifully for Christmas also, as it is now. In the early 60's, St. John's had a manger scene outside on the front lawn by the church. My children and I would stop there to say a prayer, and the girls would bring their dollies to show them the Baby Jesus.

And who could forget St. John's festivals with the big tent, the rides, and delicious food! So crowded, people would have to drive around and around the block looking for a parking space!

We have so many happy memories of St. John's Church!!!

## MEMORIES ....

St. John's is like my second home and I have many memories of the school and church, but I would like to try and focus on the time when I attended school, from 1956-1964.

Most of the teachers were religious and belonged to the order of the Sisters of St. Joseph, Third Order of St. Francis, however, Mrs. Cotton, Mr. Murray and Mr. Pedley were lay teachers at the time.

There were the daily and seasonal activities around the school and church involving the school children. We attended mass every morning before beginning our studies and walked back to the school through the breezeway, grade by grade.

Class size was large, about 40 to 50 kids, and you knew most of them during the time spent going to school at St. John's.

Whenever there was a funeral, the upper classes and a few altar boys would get out of class to sing and assist at Mass.

Mass was in Latin and I had a prayerbook that had English on one side and Latin on the other.

Besides studies, there were other little jobs that we did to break up the day. Cleaning and re-covering the books, buffing the floor, choir practice and collecting rags in the neighborhood, are just a few. The Sisters would go to each class selling penny candy and pretzel sticks. We did have lunch and time on the play ground.

Each class competed with each other to raise money for mission babies. We also tried to raise money by saving newspapers from home, bundling them up and bringing them to school.

Special occasions at the church included May Crowning, which included a procession. If the weather was nice, we would process from the parking lot to the church. If not, we came through the breezeway. It was always nice to see all the flowers brought from home by the school children for Mary. Forty Hours, Communion, Confirmation and Graduation were other special activities in the church. My dad took graduation class pictures for many years. Christmas and Easter were joyous seasons to look

forward to every year. Other devotions that we had were Lenten Missions and Perpetual Help Devotions.

The old church was used for parish social activities. I recall winning a cake, walking the cake walk and buying holy cards and medals at the religious goods table. We traded holy cards in class like some kids traded baseball cards at home! Of course there was food and games for all. It was sad to see the old church torn down.

The only organization for girls to join was the Young Ladies Sodality. Later on, one could become part of the Teen Club which was for boys and girls alike until the age of 18. Mrs. P. and others always kept us busy and made sure that we had fun at the dances, field trips or car washes. Actually, there was a baseball team, but I guess that is not something that I did very well.

These are some of my fond memories of the school and church. I hope that they give some insight to life around St. John's back in the 50's and 60's. \*\*\*

### THE SCHOOL...


In September of 1926, the first classes were held as the church doubled as a school during the week. In June of 1929, construction of the school building was completed and was already staffed with sisters from the Order of St. Francis of Sylvania, Ohio. A convent was built in 1930; this same year the Sisters of St. Joseph came to teach. The church community continued to grow. The school was too small to accommodate all the young families moving into the area with children, so a new facility was built. Ground was broken for the original nine rooms of the current school May 1, 1948. The cornerstone was laid June 20th -- school was ready that fall. The new school building was dedicated October 17, 1948. A new convent was also purchased in 1948.

In 1967 Sister Mary Cyrilla was named Principal. In 1983, we had the joy of celebrating with Sister her 50th year with the Sisters of St. Joseph. In 1992, Sister Cyrilla stepped down as principal of the school but remained here at St. John's as organist and sacristan. Mrs. Rhoe Jean Krolikiewicz became the principal in September, 1992. Mrs. K. passed away in December 1993. Mr. Larry Kress was hired as the new principal. Because of declining enrollments and rising costs, the school was closed in 1995 after nearly 70 years of service.

The building since September 1997 has been rented out as a charter school, which at this time has students from grades 6th thru 12th.









The congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph of the Third Order of St. Francis, also known as The Polish Sisters of St. Joseph, was founded in Steven's Point Wisconsin on July 1, 1901.

The congregation grew and provinces were added in Chicago and Garfield Heights in addition to the Steven's Point province.

The sisters taught in many schools and expanded their ministry to health care by operating nursing homes and hospitals.

In 1931, the Sisters joined the staff at St. John's. They taught 90 students, initially, at the new school. Over the years, the enrollment grew and an addition to the school was built to accommodate the student body and its teachers, but by 1996, the school closed its doors.

The order celebrated its centenary at Sweetest Heart of Mary parish on October 28, 2001. The congregation continues to serve in education, health care, parish and diocesan ministries as well as in the community.

We thank God for these women of God who dedicated their lives in service to the Lord and the ministries of the Catholic Church.

We pray for many vocations so that their work will continue for many years to come.

And who could forget the beautiful religious ceremonies from 1st Holy Communion, to Confirmation to graduation.

### In The Library With . . . MARIE COUSINS



The St. John's school library was first conceived under the stewardship of Sister Mary Florence, the

principal, who was with St. John's for about 2 years. The first library was on the second floor between the new and old additions.

Next, volunteers were sought. Books were needed, shelving to house the books, etc. Happily, Marie Cousins was named Library Coordinator with an initial staff of 2 additional mothers being Helen Gajewski and Mary Wathen. In time, that worked into a staff of 4 in a day.

There was a book sale to provide much needed books. When parishioners bought each book, their name was written just inside the jacket. This worked wonderfully and gave the library about 150 books to begin with.

There was precious little space in that first library room and with 3 lady volunteers and the books and the children, it was pretty cramped but they managed. When the new principal Sister Mary Cyrilla arrived, she moved the library to a larger classroom with the much needed space. The small room (first library) became a teacher's lounge. About 4 years later, it became a "run off" room housing copy machines and other office equipment. Shelving was made by Stanley Maciborski who did a great deal of carpentry around the complex.

Most of the books were obtained free from a Title 2 subsidy through the Westwood School District. Marie and staff had to learn how to order, repair, type up all catalogue cards and help children find their own books through categories and authors, etc. Marie says that Rosemary Lloyd was her "right hand" and that her husband Charlie Cousins was always repairing books for the library.

During the holidays, movies were shown to the children based on their ages. They also were shown film strips in relation to their studies. Flo Aniol loved to read to the children and had one particular story that dealt with lightening and thunder and Marie and others provided the sound effects while Flo read to them in her animated style.

The children used the library on a rotation basis and said that during their library time they were normal kids who would sometimes talk, hiding behind their books or maybe an occasional "spitball" would go flying. But she said they were great kids and she got to know them all. She said the little ones of kindergarten through 2nd grade were so affectionate coming into the library giving hugs to the staff and telling the things that were on their little minds. She said she still misses their little hugs.


After enrollment declined, the staff went to half days. And towards the end, when the school closed its doors, she had to depend on seniors to help her. She said at the last, it was she, Flo Aniol and Agnes Iadonisi.

As the library had over 6000 books in its heyday, that was a bit of a problem of how to dispose of the books and yet put them to good use. Turns out that most of the books were given to two schools with St. Albert being the one who got the bulk of them. The cabinets also went to St. Albert. Then what was left was offered to parishioners. They could either make a donation or just have them. Dorothy Choate was in charge of the sale at the time of closing.

Marie says she loved the volunteer job she held at the library. I guess she did. She gave them around 30 years!

From 1971-1994 the St. John's boys basketball teams, the Mustangs, was coached by George Cassar. The seasons usually ended with a pizza party or dinner and recognition of the efforts of the players. Father/son games were played, too, which were always a lot of fun. 

**BOOSTER CLUB...** 

The St. John's Booster Club was started in approximately 1960. It started out with four boys' teams playing at Powers Field on Powers about 2-1/2 blocks west of Beech Daly. The field at the time was owned by Lollio Brothers Trucking. The amount of work to get the field in order was humongous-it had to be cleared of tree branches, weeds, glass, rocks, etc. We did the chalk lines and installed professional rubber on the pitcher's mound and professional bases. All this work was done by dedicated men and women in our parish. When the Booster Club was formed, one adult member from each family had to participate in some way, such as cleaning the field, umpiring, coaching, selling candy, etc. We had a huge turnout as the boys could start playing in 2nd grade thru 8th grade. Furnished by the league were pants, socks, shirts, hats, the catcher's equipment; bats and balls, umpire's equipment-the players needed to furnish only their shoes and glove.

A short time later, we started four girls' teams and four minor league boys' teams. These teams were also completely equipped through the league which raised money through candy sales, etc. There was a small fee to play, but it was waived in many instances.

After playing at Powers Field for some time, Lollio Bros. decided they needed the lot for expansion; we found a field at Princeton and Gulley. It was quite a distance from our parish but it was the best we could find in the neighborhood and Midwest Abrasives who owned the property gave us permission to use the field. It was a nice grassy field and needed minimal work-so we moved our equipment (including bases, etc.) from Powers Field. We played ball every day of the week and often all-star games were played on weekends.

Most teams had from 11-14 players. It was a huge program, very expensive and very well run. We had official scorekeepers, official scorebooks; we followed American League rules with each player being furnished with a rule book. One of the rules, though, that we established was not an American League rule-a very important one-every player on every team had to play at least 3 innings and bat at least once in every game. That eliminated the possibility that the teams would sit their poorer players and use only the best

ones. The purpose of the league was to showcase all players and hope they all had complete opportunities to play ball with us.

After we had been playing for some time, we chose some of our better players, boys and girls, and enrolled them in the CYO League. One season both our boys' and girls' teams went undefeated (10-0). It only happened once but what a great season we had!

At the Princeton Field we had a nice concession stand built by the men and manned by the women (and sometimes the men)-they sold pop, chips, candy, pretzels, etc.

Elaborating on some of the dedication of the families, I remember one incident that I'll probably never forget. The McLains had a large family--many of the children played ball and Mrs. McLain also coached. The McLains had only one vehicle; so, one day as I was driving up Gulley Road going to the field I see Carol McLain riding her bike with the bat bag on the handle bars, pregnant at the time and trailing along two or three of her children. This is the kind of dedication that I talked about previously and it is only one of the many incidents that happened over the years to make our league so special. Everyone did a fair share and they all worked very hard-we were there for our children and did one heck of a job!

If anyone is interested in seeing some of the awards received over the years by the baseball teams, they are on display in the Church breezeway on the Fellrath side. There are individual trophies; the first ball ever pitched in one of our games; there is the broken bat trophy that for a while listed the team that won the championship every year; the travelling trophy that was given to the younger team that won the championship every year. Your children or grandchildren or children of friends may have trophies in the showcase. Take the time-they are there for you to enjoy looking at and remembering the wonderful times spent as part of the BOOSTER CLUB.
















Each week our bulletin has a smile or two in it. People say they read them, save them, mail them to relatives.

### ST. VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul was established by Blessed Frederic Ozanam in France in 1833. Frederic named the lay organization after St. Vincent who took care of orphans, established hospitals, gave retreats, founded religious congregations and organized missionary activities.

The Society spread throughout Europe, the United States and other parts of the world. Its mission was to help relieve poverty by providing food, clothing, medical assistance and spiritual guidance to those in need.

At St. John's, a conference was organized in 1982, with seven members and Fr. Balazy as the spiritual advisor. All are volunteers who make home visits to determine need and type of assistance, work in the food depot, send cards to shut-ins, and share food with other organizations. Our conference helps to support the poorest Native American reservation in the United States as well as other programs run by the Society such as the camp program for young boys and girls.

Our current members include: Theresa Hobbins, Valerie Koselka, Kevin Krzeszowski, Ed Moline, Maureen Moline, Helen Piwowar, Bernie Sefcheck and Joe Sefcheck.

We welcome anyone who is interested in learning more about the works of the Society and would like to join us in helping to serve the needy of our community.



## **EVANGELIZATION**

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



Trecently played a funeral for the father of a former St. John's classmate. The classmate came up in the choir loft to say hello. "You still here?" he asked with surprise.

I have been here a long time, my whole life in fact. I was baptized, confirmed and married here. I received first Holy Communion, Reconciliation and my early education here. It was here that I received a calling to the music ministry.

As a child I was drawn to music. Our neighbor had a 2 octave play organ that I would spend hours playing. She must have gotten sick of me because one day she told me to take the thing home. My mom made me put it in the basement where I spent hours figuring melodies out by ear.

My parents were unaware of my budding interest in music. It took a St. John's parishioner to take notice. He stopped by one night on parish business and heard me playing. "Who's playing music downstairs?" he asked. My parents replied with a wave of their hand, "Oh, that's just Natalie making noise." The parishioner rebutted, "No, she's actually playing songs. You should get that girl lessons."

The parishioner told them that Leo and Flo Aniol (also parishioners) had a daughter who taught piano. I was thrilled at the prospect of learning to play the piano. My father however could not resist the hypnotic electronic rhythms of a Wurlitzer organ. The man at the Mall convinced him that in one short week he would be playing "When the Saints go Marching In" like a professional while using just two fingers - so I learned to play the organ. The Lord works in mysterious ways.

Laura Aniol gave me lessons and after about a year and a half brought me to St. John's to play for Mass. It was Laura who pushed the microphone in front of me and told me to sing. I was scared but obedient. So since the age of 9, I've been playing and singing here at St. John's.



I have so many memories of getting out of class to play for Mass or a funeral when Sister Cyrilla was unavailable. St. John's was very kind and supportive as my abilities developed. Even when I made mistakes, like the time I played all the wrong songs at the wrong time for a Novena, the parishioners were gentle with their correction.

I've done many other things musically but none of my experiences have given me the joy and fulfillment that playing and singing here at St. John's has. Working with the choir and the children of St. John's at Christmas has been an added joy. St. John's is a warm place, its people are unpretentious, hard working and dedicated. So many of you through the years have thanked me for my services but you have given me so much more than I could ever give you. It has been a real honor to lead you in praise, to comfort you in loss and to rejoice with you in times of celebration.

So yes, I'm still here. St. John's is a part of me and always will be no matter where I am. Congratulations on 75 years and thank you for letting me be a part of them.







he sanctuary contains the main altar and crucifix. The altar symbolizes Calvary and table of the Last Supper, while the Crucifix reminds us of Our Lord's death.

When the present church was constructed in 1954, new furnishings, altar, statues, pulpit were donated or purchased by friends and parishioners to fill the interior of the church. The main altar was a gift from a personal friend of former pastor, Fr. Theodore Kowalewski. Originally it was located against the back wall of the sanctuary under the crucifix, however, after the Second Vatican Council, it was moved forward. The canopy and drapes were removed and the sanctuary and side altars were painted with symbols representing the truths of our faith by Sr. Christine and a friend of Fr. Ed.

The corpus on the cross was carved from a single piece of wood in Switzerland. Both the altar and crucifix were constructed and designed by the Detroit Woodcraft Company.

The baptistry was located in the rear of the church and was intended to become part of the tower which was never built. About 1999, one of the confessionals was removed and the baptistry was brought forward in the church. Mr. Joseph McLain was responsible for the work around it. The current baptismal font was donated by the Rosary Altar Society when Fr. Mitchell Witkowski was pastor. The whereabouts of the original font are not known, but often when a church is remodeled or rebuilt, poorer parishes receive the original piece that is replaced.

In the last twenty two years, many other changes have taken place within the interior of St. John's. New carpeting, lighting, organ and chimes were added. Pews were stained and kneelers were covered; some pews were removed for handicap access. The Baptism of Our Lord woodcarving was rescued by Mr. Knoblock, when Immaculate Conception parish was being demolished, and given to Fr. Ed.

The wood statues of Our Lady and St. Joseph were moved together on one side altar and a picture of the Divine Mercy of Jesus was hung near the Tabernacle side altar.

The sanctuary and side altars were repainted in November 2001 by Willie Jenders and Fran McCans. The arches behind each side altar were painted blue and the symbols of fleur-de-lis and the cross were used.

The Infant of Prague statue remains in its place on the wall to the left of the Tabernacle. All of these symbols and religious art help us as we worship Our Lord in this church building. Let us be grateful for that freedom.

















The corpus (body) on the cross is handcarved from one piece of wood and was done in Switzerland. The cross and the altar were designed and constructed by Detroit Woodcraft Co. ### "The Beginning Years" with ... SOPHIA MURZIN



This charming, extremely well-travelled 84 year old parishioner with an admitted, "insatiable appetite for knowledge", graciously took time to look back to her early remembrances of St. John's.

Sophia's parents Bernice & John Galazyn lived in Inkster about 7 blocks from where St. Johns would be built. The church had its first origins on Annapolis in a store. And she can proudly point to the fact that her parents were among the first parishioners and that her Dad went on to help build the first rectory around 1926.

First grade found Sophia at Freeman School at Beech Daly and Van Born Rd where present CVS stands. Second grade found her enrolled at Sacred Heart being bussed there where she and brother Walter received their First Communion. Third grade saw her enrolled at St. John's school and she went on to complete 4th through 8th grades having the distinction of being the only 8th grader to graduate that year.

The original school was completed around 1929 and Sophia remembers it being a 2 story brick structure located approximately where our present church now stands. Sophia says the school had 8 grades with 1 through 4 on the east side of one large room and 5 through 8 on the west side of that same large room with just a hallway dividing the two groupings. She says that it was quite easy to tune one's mind to the teachings of another classroom when the opportunity presented itself. She said maybe one could pick up multiplication tables, handwriting lessons and, of course, catechism lessons in Polish and English. Sophia speaks Polish fluently. She is certain there was probably a cook for the nuns. The students brought lunches or went home for lunch.

Sister Florian was teacher of all four upper grades and Sophia asks "can you imagine the stress that had to put on her?" The principal was Sister Theodosia, who also taught the lower grades!

Sophia says tuition couldn't have been much as it was during depression. She goes on to remember Father Bona being first priest followed by Father Hewelt. Then Father John J. Bartkowiak became the first Resident Pastor. He was close friends with Sophia's family and as it was during the depression when nobody had much of anything such as food or money, she relates a touching little story. Seems Father Bartkowiak came to her parents home one day and asked if the family had anything to eat. He was starving and had no food. Sophia's mother said "no, but come in Father and we'll figure something out." She says her mom was good at making something out of nothing. Soon enough, her mother was at the stove frying onions and turned out an onion sandwich for Father. She recalls his eating the sandwich with gusto, as if it were a steak sandwich. Sophia says that was the reality of those bad times. Sophia remembers Father Bartkowiak as being a wonderful speaker from the pulpit.

Sophia with her Liberal Arts degree from Wayne State, her Masters from Eastern Michigan University, went on to spend 20 months on her dissertation (writing it all in long hand) and proudly earned her Doctorate in Education. And, let us remember that this well- educated parishioner had a very good foundation which began at St. John's school. This little one who was taught here, went on to teach others. Thanks, Dr. Murzin, for sharing your memories.

## "The Beginning Years" with . . . MARTHA MOLINE

I attended St. John the Baptist Catholic School from kindergarten through the 8th grade. I was the salutatorian of the last graduating class. There were nine of us graduating that last year. St. John's grade school was a wonderful starting point for me. I learned a great deal from my time there, not only academically but also in terms of faith, loyalty, and friendship.

From St. John's grade school I was accepted into Divine Child High School. Upon my graduation from Divine Child I applied to the University of Detroit Mercy, where I currently attend classes. I am pursuing a double major in psychology and criminal justice. This is my third year at UDM, and I hope to apply to graduate school and receive my Ph.D. in Forensic Psychology. 
### "The Beginning Years" with ... BOB & GENEVIEVE WOODS


