

Because of another commitment, it may not be possible for me to be with you on October 15. However, I do welcome the opportunity that this letter offers me to congratulate you and the entire parish community.







## People Make a Parish



In 1922 the area around "Addison Switch" was a fast growing community. Previously a part of the sprawling Springwells Township, it had been annexed to the growing Metropolis of Detroit in 1917. Many of the streets were still unpaved, but Michigan Avenue was considered one of the most efficient thoroughfares with its east and westbound traffic lanes separated by the streetcar tracks and the "safety zones". It was during this year that Henry Ford made history announcing that all employees at his automobile plant were to be hired at five dollars a day. This unprecedented wage announcement caused many more men to move their families to the western edge of the city of Detroit and obtain work in the Rouge

The need of a new Catholic Parish in the neighborhood was unquestionable. Although St. Stephen, St. Andrew and Our Lady Queen of Angels parishes were already established just east of the area, they were all primarily Polish-speaking parishes and didn't meet the needs of many of the new residents. In the late months of 1921, a group of four men Mr. George Warner, Mr. Frank Schmitz, Mr. Henry Malesky and Mr. Paul Fischer met with Bishop Michael J. Gallagher and requested his permission to canvas the neighborhood and explore the possibility of establishing a new parish. All of these men had moved in from Greenfield Township, later known as Fordson and presently a part of the City of Dearborn. Their families had been among the German settlers of that area who had helped to establish St. Alphonsus Parish in 1852. In approaching their new neighbors they were pleasantly surprised to find that in addition to their own German families, there were many people of various ethnic backgrounds anxious to help organize a new parish. A review of the early records of the parish read like a Roll-Call of Nations with the Irish Doyles, Duggans, and Condras; the French LaFromboise, Beaudoins, and LaPointes; the English Taylors, Parsons, and Reeds; the Italian Messiscos and DeSantos and a considerable number of Polish families.

By early 1922 the self-appointed committee of four reported back to the Chancery of Bishop Gallagher with their findings and were assured that their recommendations


of a new parish would be acted upon. On March 22, 1922, Father Von Mach was appointed to found the parish with territorial boundaries as follows: Livernois Ave. to the east, Wyoming to the west, the Michigan Central tracks to the south and Warren Ave. to the north. On March 29, Monsignor Doyle, Chancellor of the Diocese, with the approval of Bishop Gallagher, informed Father Von Mach that the parish would be under the patronate of the deacon-martyr of the early Christian era, St. Lawrence. The first Mass was celebrated on Sunday, April 23, 1922 in a rented upstairs flat above Gradecki's Pool Hall at 8803 Michigan Avenue. A temporary altar had been improvised from furniture donated by some of the charter members and the first Mass was celebrated for the success of the new parish. It was in the spring of 1922 that St. Lawrence Parish experienced its beginning of life and began a growth that has matured to the St. Lawrence of 1972. Father Von Mach lived in a rented house at 4901 Lawndale and soon became a familiar figure around the neighborhood. He drove a Model T Ford Coupe, affectionately nicknamed the Chicken Coop, and he made it a practice to become personally acquainted with all the new parishioners.

Property on which to build the church and school building was purchased from the Lonyo Brick Company in the Fall of 1922 and a temporary frame building to house the church was completed within seven months, by July of 1923, on the corner of Lonyo and Arnold. This building still stands bearing the marks of many important parochial functions through the years. Many of the furnishings for the interior of the building were made by the parishioners. The side-altars were made by Joseph Gebauer and Joseph Dornoff, while the kneelers were the work of John Gruber and Charles Fischer. The Communion-rail was brought in from Father Von Mach's home parish in Ruth, Michigan. The ladies of the Altar Society, who had organized almost as soon as the parish was established, made the altar cloths and communion rail cloth. It was in this neat little building that a period of five years that the parishioners worshipped, were baptized, married and buried from. This temporary building was used as the church until December of 1926. In the meantime the upper flat on Michigan Avenue was retained as a Social Hall and many of the original parishioners, now living, recall with nostalgia the dances, box-socials and other gatherings they enjoyed during those years.

The School-Church-Convent building, as it stands today, was built according to the cornerstone, in 1926 by Talbot and Meier, Inc., at the cost of \$200,000. This new fireproof building had accommodations for eight large classrooms, a basement church, and a floor for future expansion. The contract called for the completion by Christmas; the Midnight Mass was to be the first scheduled service. However, Mr. George Talbot, of the Contracting Co., who was also a charter member of the parish, died during the week and his Funeral Mass on December 24. 1926 was the first Mass celebrated in the new building. The Midnight Mass was celebrated as scheduled and the records show that it was offered in memory of Geraldine Gruber, the deceased teenage daughter of John Gruber, one the first Parish Trustees.

In June, 1928, the Parish felt its first great disappoinment when it was announced that Father Von Mach was to be transferred to St. John the Evangelist Church in the predominantly German settlement on the East side of Detroit. With the permission of the Bishop, the Blessed Sacrament was removed from the sanctuary of the church for a few hours on a Sunday afternoon, and the people of the parish filled the church to capacity for a farewell program in honor of their beloved founder and pastor, who felt that a Polish-speaking priest and wellversed in English and mindful of the changing community, could better serve the needs of many more,

The following week, another reception was held, only slightly less well-attended, welcoming the new Pastor, Father Vincent Balcer, who had been serving as pastor of a rather young parish, Our Lady of Christians on the northeast side of Detroit. It appeared that rumors had reached Father Balcer's ears to the effect that now, perhaps, St. Lawrence's would become another Polish speaking parish, for in his welcoming remarks to his new congregation he announced that St. Lawrence Church was not to be a Polish Church, nor a German Church, nor a Irish Church; but was to be first, last and only a Catholic Church.

The early years of Father Balcer's pastorate brought many hardships, which however did not curtail his enthusiasm to serve the entire community. His services were available to so very many and his generosity knew no limits. The years of the Great Depression which found many in the locality unemployed, the struggling families of modest income, the command for Catholic school attendance for all children of Catholic parents made it difficult to pay off the debt on the church-school building. At no time however, was any loan requested from the Diocese to meet current expenses. Through those years the people continued to sacrifice in order to maintain their church and school, when many were unable to pay any tuition or make any donation to the church.


St. Lawrence Parish briefly made headlines in the year of 1963 when Richard Cardinal Cushing of the Archdiocese of Boston, a personal friend of Father Balcer, visited the parish. The Detroit Free Press in its coverage of the visit of this distinguished and renowned churchman, referred to the "humble basement church of St. Lawrence," while accompanying pictures in the paper revealed the proud smiling faces of the parishioners. On this memorable visitation Cardinal Cushing personally visited with many elderly shut-in members of the parish. The contributions of the parishioners to the Latin-American Fund, founded by the Cardinal extended much needed missionary help. The proceeds of one of the festivals sponsored by the parish were given exclusively for this apostolate, which was so dear to the Cardinal and so well-understood by Father Balcer.

During the years of World War II, when many of the young men of the parish were in military service, every effort was made to be mindful of their absence from their families and Father Balcer insisted that contact be kept with these sons who in their boyhood years were so familiar to him. Recognition was given to the parish in its promotion and sale of U. S. War Bonds; a document in the parish files attests to that.

With the passing years, although many of the original parishioners had moved to the other side of eternity or to newer suburban localities, still others remained into the second and even third generation. Many devoted families had to seek residence elsewhere when their homes and properties were taken for the construction of the Edsel Ford Freeway. The outward appearance of St. Lawrence property has remained unchanged. The rectory is a two-story home right among the homes of the neighborhood; the outdoor gaslight is the only distinguishing indication that this is not a private home, but the parish house. The neighborhood hasn't changed much either; some families moved in and joined the parish when homes were constructed on land south of the church on Lonyo Ave.; a public park in honor of President Woodrow Wilson stretches across the street from the church property; it was built on acreage that had been used to test small Army tanks during the war. It now provides recreational and restful facilities for the entire community. All through the Sixties there was an evident decline in membership, with the children marrying and moving away, and the "old folks" remaining and continuing to be devoted members of the parish.

In 1965, a gala reception and dinner was held in Sgt. Romanowski Post Hall in honor of the beloved pastor on the occasion of his forty-fifth anniversary in the Holy Priesthood. Although it had been noticeable for some time that Father Balcer's health was fast failing, it was at this banquet that it became shockingly apparent that he would be unable to continue much longer in the role of active pastor. It was the dedicated assistant-pastor, Father George Majewski, who did not spare himself to carry out many of the parochial pastoral responsibilities. It was during his assignment at St. Lawrence that the Pastor had the church floor tiled and new pews and kneelers installed. The 1960's was a decade of strong parish spirit marked by the spectacular summer festivals which were mainly the work of Father George. During those years the parishioners and especially the school children annually during the month of May marched in procession and crowned the statue of Our Lady in ceremonies either outside or in the church.

In June 1966 Father Jerome A. Szelc was appointed by John Cardinal Dearden to succeed Father Balcer. Father Majewski was appointed assistant at St. Stanislaus Parish.

Fr. Balcer rejoiced in the blessing from the Holy Father, John XXIII, extended to him on his 35th Anniversary as Pastor of St, Lawrence Church, He grew old gracefully and he loved you whom he served and helped in so many ways,

Plans were made for the retiring pastor to remain in residence at the rectory. The Supreme Pastor, however, had other plans and Father Vincent Balcer was called from this life just one month later on July 26, 1966. After funeral services on July 30th on which day John Cardinal Dearden officiated and Father Henry Kreft gave the homily the body of Father Vincent was laid to rest in St. Stanislaus Cemetery in Bay City, Mich.

Father Jerome was officially installed as pastor on June 27, 1966 by the Dean of the area, Msgr. Clement Kern. Almost immediately under the zealous and energetic administration of Father Jerome and the cooperation of so many willing workers many changes began to be made, especially those recommended by the Decrees for the Implementation of Vatican Council II and the Detroit Synod. Christmas Day of that year was the day for an almost "miraculous" renovation and transformation of the sanctuary. Participants at Masses that day could not believe the "new appearance" of the interior of the church. The entire sanctuary was brought forward, so that many more could have sight of the altar. The architectural design of the background of straight lines and circles is evident in all the appurtenances, such as the two altars, the credence table, pulpit, president's chair and altar-boy stools, etc. The emphasis on shades of red, amber and yellow colors is noted in the carpeting, the windows and the plexiglass backdrop, which is illuminated by recessed lights.

The statues and shrines which had become so familiar as to be almost unnoticed in their former setting at the side altars were not discarded but were rather given a new honored place in the back of the church where they have the appearance of watching over the congregation during services and bidding a good day as the church empties. The placing of the organ on the south side of the sanctuary caused some consternation, until those aware of liturgical reform realized the necessity of this change for better choral participation and direction. The renovation of the sanctuary was made possible by the generous donations of the Altar Society, the Holy Name Society, the School Children, and individuals and families (a \$1,000 donation, five donations of \$500, and many smaller ones helped defray the cost of \$7,000.00). The hand-carved statue of the Risen Christ above the tabernacle was the first in the archdiocese and its placement immediately focuses attention on the tabernacle, wherein is our "Living Eucharistic Lord." All new candlelabra, processional crucifix, sanctuary lights, tabernacle, ciborium, linens, etc, were gradually obtained through the generosity of parishioners who wanted to contribute to the sanctuary which is so warm, "homey" and conducive to prayer and meditation. The Holy Family Shrine with the wood-carved statue of Jesus, Mary and Joseph was made possible by the proceeds from the Christmas Program given by the school children. The statue of the Infant of Prague, with a selection of vestments, has a prominent place near the organ; it also was donated. Many new vestments for liturgical services have been donated. All renovations and innovations have been in keeping with the spirit of the changes in the liturgy, but consideration has been given to the traditional elements which mean so much to very many of the elderly parishioners.

Within the first year of his pastorate Father Jerome, because of the need of a complete new roof on the church-school building and the repainting of the exterior, this work was done and paid for; the cost \$14,000.00.

The high hopes of providing finer educational facilities for the children of the parish impelled the pastor to seek cooperation from the parishioners and obtain the funds for many improvements in the school. A very contemporary and well-equipped library was made possible through the generosity of parishioners, whose names are inscribed on a Memorial Plaque in that room. It is hoped that with the need of adult Christian education the facilities will be used accordingly, when books and other reading matters are obtained.

In keeping with Vatican II emphasis on lay participation in parish administration, (liturgical, educational and financial and service) a Steering Committee was organized in January 1970 to formulate the Constitution of the St. Lawrence Parish Council. Even though many in the parish indicated no response to all appeals for participation, the following were elected by secret vote by the parishioners to form the First Parish

Council: Mr. Frank Ruczko, President; Mrs. Frances Berendt, Mr. Joseph Dziak, Mr. Joseph Fryz, Mr. Joseph Kubera, Miss Mary Margaret Mandy (Polando), Mr. & Mrs. Paul Mandy, Mr. & Mrs. Frank Ralko, Mr. & Mrs. John Regis, Mrs. Norbert (Eleanor) Stencel, Mr. Robert Warner, and Mr. Ricardo Cruz. From its inception the Parish Council has been an active body and every committee in the Council (Liturgical, Educational, Community Life, Financial) is striving to know and achieve its own objectives. They are seeking better communications between clergy, religious and laity; increased parishioner involvement; and especially, a greater awareness of parochial problems and a response to ease the heavy burdens that were placed on a few individuals. The Council desires to maintain a strong feeling and a close unity for the parish. They want all members to share the true dimensions of "oneness with Christ," that belonging is more than being registered, having envelopes, or giving money; it means that we have the common task to work for Christ and His mission . . . we must work and be active for Christ. Among the numerous improvements that have been made in the short span of five years are the following: a complete new sacristy and work room for sacristan-ladies; a storage room for church supplies; closets for altar boy cassocks; an impressive statue of St. Lawrence on the north side of the main entrance to church and landscaping of the area along with gaslights that constantly are a beacon and guide to all who pass by.

Improvements in the church have been made almost continuously during the past three years; they were made only after sufficient consideration and sufficient funds were available; many of the improvements were made through the voluntary labors of a few parishioners and friends of the pastor who prefer remaining anonymous. Some of the more noticeable works are: new aluminum front doors replacing the original wooden doors; resetting of doors in the main entrance to church which have eased the entry of processions, especially of funerals; the baptistry was relocated in the "cove" near the main entrance and artistically decorated by Father John Krol just a month before he died; new electrical fixtures were installed in sanctuary, the shrines, sacristies and main entrance; the confessionals were made more convenient for individual penitents; a "stained-glass" divider enclosed the old choir area; a pamphlet and book rack was designed, built and installed by one of the parishioners; the statues of the Crucifixion Group, of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and Immaculate Heart of Mary were beautifully painted by the offering of the Altar Society. This Golden Jubilee Year has three so-called memorials: a fine Wurlitzer Concert Organ Model 4700, a large Leslie Speaker, and Chimes were purchased for \$5,845; they enrich our worship services and express our prayerful moods. The funds for the purchase of the organ were made possible after the Parish Council suggested that Advent Coin-Folders be distributed for the first time to the parishioners and larger donations be solicited from the Parish Societies and families and individuals. The names of the benefactors and donors are on a special plaque on the wall near the organ.

No less memorable and appreciated will be the beautiful and attractive redecorating of the church interior completed in May. The eight simple but exquisite hand-painted liturgical symbols, as well as the colorful stenciled border, have drawn attention and are a subject of conversation by all visitors to the church. Of necessity and because of an Ordinance of the Public Health Dept., lavatory facilities were constructed in a section of the ushers room at a cost of \$3,000.00. The last two mentioned projects were made possible after recommendation and approval by members of the Parish Council.

The living accomodations for the Sisters of St. Dominic, who have staffed the school since its beginnings, were also taken care of. Without any knowledge of the drastic reforms in convent-living that followed the Vatican Council which has resulted in many large convents today being almost vacant, concern was given to provide adequately for the Sisters here. In 1967 there were six Sisters in residence here. Many new furnishings were obtained for the convent: carpeting for chapel, parlor and community room; all new kitchen and laundry appliances; beds, living room chairs, television, and even an air-conditioner. The large open-spaces next to the convent, once proudly called the "boulevard" by the Sisters, since they used

it for recreation, especially roller-skating, now contains the "ceramic studio" to which many youngsters and just as many adults come regularly for classes in the fine work of clay artistry. The Sisters now stationed here are involved in parish apostolates that take them outside the classroom. After the closing of the school was announced, the Parish Council voted to have the Sisters remain if they so desired. The presence of the Nuns in their modified religious habits retains the image of the traditional Catholic parish and they are greatly loved and respected by both young and old.

Parallel to the material accomplishments of the parish are those of a spiritual nature. Indeed, the only purpose for St. Lawrence's Parish is to provide for the best care of the souls of its people. Through all the years there has been evidence that all who sincerely sought the Christian services were given prudent and honest consideration. The number of families who had their children baptized, their dead buried, their spiritual problems heard and often solved, the converts who received their instructions. through the ministry of the priests cannot be totalled. What was and is important: they were all part of the "Family of St. Lawrence Church" and "The Love of the Crucified and Risen Christ" was extended to each one of them.

Since Christian love knows no boundaries, all who today are part of St. Lawrence, will continue to work for Christ and for all who come seeking "The Way, the Truth, and the Life".

### SO OUR SPAN OF FIFTY YEARS HAS BEEN RECORDED...

In this our Parish Golden Jubilee Year, it seems fitting that we of St. Lawrence should endeavor to evaluate these years. We could say that, from the material point of view the years have been perhaps a bit disappointing: there has been no magnificent church building erected; the school that tried so hard to educate so very many had to close because of financial setbacks; and possible other accomplishments of which we once dreamed, had to be set aside in the face of time. But let us look a little deeper into the very heart of St. Lawrence Parish. There we find the faithful people whose







## St. Lawrence School



The school opened in September, 1927 with an enrollment of almost three hundred students. It was staffed by the Sisters of St. Dominic from Adrian, Mich., with Sisters Grace Eleanor as principal, Sister M. Cecelia, music teacher and seven more teaching nuns. By December of the first year, Sister Cecelia had already formed a junior orchestra capable of performing in the school's Christmas Program. At the end of this program. Father Von Mach told the orchestra members and others present, that he would be willing to forego two of his three daily meals a day, to keep music study in the school and all he would ask in return was an occasional chance to hear the musicians perform.

In 1928, the first Commencement Exercises were held with eight pupils graduating. School enrollment however, increased with the years, so that by 1936 there were sixty pupils in the graduating class. It was this year that a ninth grade was added to the school. The intentions were to add a class each year until a full twelve year school curriculum was offered. In 1937 a tenth grade was added, but during the year word was received from the Chancery that any new High Schools were to be for a consolidated area rather than a single parish. In 1938, therefore, St. Lawrence School returned to strictly elementary education.

In the late fifties, the mothers of the pupils, with the approval of Sister Grace Eileen, school principal, became involved in assisting in school affairs, especially in ex-

tra curricular activities for the pupils. The first leaders in this group were: Mrs. Ruth Mandy, Mrs. Marie Groneau and Mrs. Jennie Kujat. Although the Mothers Club had not as yet been officially organized, this group laid the ground work for parent participation in the formal education of the children and led in many extra activities which the nuns alone had been unable to provide.

By 1960, the Mothers Club became officially organized. Mrs. Virginia Bartos was elected first president with Mrs. Marcella Cypress and Mrs. Mildred Kaleniecki as fellow officers. The Mothers Club sponsored the first of the Parish Festivals as well as many other money making projects. Through their efforts pupils of St. Lawrence School had the advantage of not only well-equipped classrooms, but also the participation in many interesting "field trips." The best remembered of these, perhaps, was the annual train ride to Durand, Mich. with Father Balcer as engineer. The most expensive expenditure was the purchase and installation of 8 Television sets for Archdiocesan closedcircuit TV.

After seven years, the Mothers Club was changed to the Parent-Teacher Guild so that the fathers, too could become active members. Mr. Gerald Hien was elected the first president. The P.T.G., like the Mothers Club, maintained as its primary purpose, the improvement of school facilities and opportunities. It was through the efforts of the P.T.G. that one of the third floor rooms was converted into a school library, fully furnished, with books suitable for study, research and pleasure.

One of the first things that Father Jerome sought and achieved was establishment of a school board in 1967, to help with school policy and administration. The lay members of the board were elected by the parishioners, the first such board including: President; Mr. Henry Kus; Mr. Jos. Fryz; Mrs. Irene Kajder; Mrs. Frances Berendt; Mrs. Armand Matte; Mrs. Eugene Kowalski and Mr. Stanley Rakowski. Theirs was indeed a most difficult job, coming as it did, at a time when the cost of education had risen to such a degree, that the tuition covered only a small portion of the actual expense. School enrollment too had fallen with the move to the suburbs of many of the younger

parishioners. The school Board offered several plans for financing the school, including an accepted tuition plan which called for a minimum offering of five dollars a week from all parents of pupils and a voluntary increase in contributions from all parishioners. Even this increase did not produce enough revenue to cover expenses of the school.

The passage of a bill which would provide for financial aid to Parochial schools in Michigan, brought new hope that St. Lawrence School could continue to function. However, in 1970, this bill was declared unconstitutional by the passage of the now famous Proposal C, in spite of the tireless efforts of many parochial school advocates. And St. Lawrence School, like many others in the archdiocese was forced to close its doors.

On June 18, 1971, twenty four pupils received their elementary graduation diplomas in the forty-third and final Commencement Exercises at St. Lawrence. The school had served its parish well and many a tear was shed in making and accepting the decision that it must close. Over two thousand former pupils recall with nostalgia their years at St. Lawrence — not only the four R's but also the extras that make childhood the magic thing it is — the yearly visit of Santa on the last day before Christmas vacation — the report cards given out by Father Balcer, always with his huge dog accompanying him — the special nine o'clock children's Mass — The Guitar "Folk" Masses — The Bob-Lo trip for Altar Boys and Service Girls — The Class Picnics in the Park across the Road — the ADF essay contests — the first time the nuns appeared with the familiar white habit ten inches off the floor the Sisters in their Ford Station Wagon the science fairs and its blue ribbons - the presentation of the American Flag that had flown over the Capitol Bldg. in Washington, D.C. by congressman J. Dingell and all the other memories of school days. So, although the school itself has closed, its influence remains for those two thousand persons who received their formal academic and religious education within its walls. They are surely better men and women for having had the privilege of attending St. Lawrence School ...

## Priests Who Served St. Lawrence Parish



In its fifty years St. Lawrence Parish has been most fortunate in having the service of many dedicated priests. Each gave generously of himself just as the Divine Master insists from those whom He calls to be His disciples. Each added greatly to the spiritual and community growth and well-being of the parish.


The three pastors, whose leadership has spanned the fifty years, have perhaps contributed more than any other individuals in the formation, growth and continuity of the parish structure and family. Because of them the parish was a warm, inspiring, protecting reality. Parishioners have felt that the parish was where they belonged, that there pastors loved them and cared about them ... that their pastors knew their responsibilities and in a sense "were wedded" to this particular parish.

Father Leo Von Mach, the founder and first pastor, came originally from Ruth, Michigan, a rural Thumb Area town, and encouraged the parishioners of this newly found parish to take a personal active part in the planning of that parish. Father Von Mach left St. Lawrence pastorate for St. John the Evangelist on the E. Grand Blvd. of Detroit, in May, 1928. He died eleven years later on February 17, 1939.

Father Vincent Balcer was pastor of St. Lawrence from June 2, 1928 until poor health demanded retirement in June, 1972. Father Balcer was born in Bay City, Mich. on December 30, 1894 and attended school there, graduating from St. James High School, Later he attended St. Cyril & Methodius, Orchard Lake and Mount St. Mary Seminary, Norwood, Ohio. Ordained June 27, 1920, his first assignment was at St. John Parish in Ubly. He also served as secretary to Bishop Plagens, and was assistant at Sweetest Heart of Mary and pastor of Our Lady Help of Christians. Father Balcer was uncompromising in his beliefs and was sometimes mistakenly looked upon as unduly strict and even unfeeling. However, a closer look proved him compassionate and most willingly helpful. He is most affectionately remembered for his acts of personal kindness and charity, his interest and love of steam-locomotives, and his "according to Hoyle" pinochle playing, Father Balcer died on Tuesday morning, July 26, 1966 and on Saturday a Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Most Rev. John F. Dearden, Archbishop of Detroit.

Father Jerome A. Szelc, the present pastor, is a native Detroiter; in fact a true West Sider for his family were members in the neighboring parish of St. Stephen. He attended St. Stephen Grade School and St. Casimir High School before enrolling at the University of Detroit. He took his philosophy courses at St. Mary's College, Orchard Lake and completed his theological studies at St. Mary's Seminary, Norwood, Ohio. He was ordained in Blessed Sacrament Cathedral by Edward Cardinal Mooney on October 26, 1946. His assignments were: St. Florian Church, Hamtramck; Our Lady of Mt. Carmel, Emmett; Assumption West, Detroit; St. Luke, Detroit; Ascension, Warren; Our Lady Queen of Heaven, Detroit. St. Law-





rence is his first pastorate. Father Szelc has endeared himself to the people through his gentle leadership in all manners, but most especially in his sincere and fervent celebration of the Liturgy. He constantly shows a deep concern for the spiritual welfare of all his people and he is willing to assist all in attaining a better life in time and in eternity. The physical renewal of the St. Lawrence Parish facilities under Fr. Jerome's initiative are described in the history of the parish. Father Jerome from the very beginning of his assignment here has promoted organizations to foster cooperation and betterment of all church ministries. He is responsible for the organization of the School Board within the first year here. All parents of school children could be involved through membership in the Parent Teacher Guild. The children and youth are not forgotten as Father encourages all programs (sports, social, educational) which demand adult supervision for good Christian upbringing. A great joy to Father is the "50 Up Club," the group of "senior citizens" who enjoy the activities that keep them mindful that they do belong to the parish and are still very important.

Father Jerome began the publication of the Parish Weekly Bulletin which he edits personally. The use of Missalettes for Liturgical functions, the improved congregational singing, the Eucharistic Days and Marian Devotions, the evening Masses, the meaningful Holy Week and Easter Services. the unique and inspiring Nativity Scene, the religious banners, are only a few of the means that have become such an important part in the life of the parishioners and this all through the primary efforts of Father Jerome. The greatest smile on Father's face is when he has a large attendance at any church function and even more so when there are very many recipients of Holy Communion at Mass. The preparation of children for First Holy Communion is so vital that Father interviews and interrogates each child individually.

No one knows how much sadness was in the heart of Father Jerome when it became necessary because of financial circumstances and small enrollment to accept the Cardinal's notice that St. Lawrence School would have to close with so very many other schools in the Archdiocese. Fortunately, almost 70% of the children who attended school here are enrolled in neighboring Catholic schools. A very well organized Parish Religious Education Program now takes care of most of the youngsters attending a public school. It is with the cooperation of the parents of these children that enables to maintain a fine Christian community spirit and family-centered religion. Constant focus is made to need celebrate God at home before faith can be alive anywhere else. Adult religious education is Father's painstaking concern at this time. When questioned about his priesthood in these days of confusion and criticism of the Church and clergy, Father Jerome expressed his desire to keep alive the "sensus Catholicus" among all his people and to strive to be a priest as a priest of Christ ought to be: a man of God, of prayer, of work, of dedication to the things of God for the happiness of man,

The three pastors were each supported in their pastoral ministry by priests, some of whom were assigned as residents in the rectory and others coming from other assigned duties permitting them to give week-end help to the parish.

The first of these priests was Father William Rogers who taught at the University of Detroit during the week. For close to ten years, from 1926 to 1936, Father Rogers helped in this manner. Father James R. Johnson was appointed on August 18, 1928 as assistant in residence. He remained until 1943, officiating at most of the weddings, funerals and baptisms during those years. After leaving St. Lawrence, Father "Jimmie' became chaplain at Memorial Hospital, Chattanooga, Tenn., where in 1969 he was awarded the Bene Merenti Medal, a Papal award, conferred for diligent and dedicated work and devotion to the sick.


Father Thomas A. Jobs, now Monsignor Jobs, was assigned to St. Lawrence in July, 1937 and remained until June, 1944. Monsignor Jobs' name became very familiar to all in the Archdiocese when he was Director of the Office of the Propagation of the Faith from 1947 until 1963 and lived at Holy Trinity Parish in "Corktown". Through those years he continued his friendship with many of the people of St. Lawrence Church and still returns for many special occasions. He finds it easy and a pleasure to reminisce



about the "wonderful times" when he was at St. Lawrence. After a short pastorate at Our Lady of Refuge Parish, Orchard Lake, Michigan, Monsignor Jobs returned to the "big city" and presently is pastor of the Church of the Resurrection on the East side of Detroit.

Father Boguslaus T. Poznanski came to the parish in June, 1943, but stayed only until December, 1944 when he entered as chaplain in the U. S. Naval Service. Father Poznanski is presently pastor of Sweetest Heart of Mary Church, Detroit.

When Father Poznanski joined the Navy, Father LaSalle Lenk became the new assistant and some months later was joined by Father Malkowski, who together served the people diligently for about five years. Father Lenk remained at St. Lawrence until 1949 and at present is pastor of the Church of St. Germaine in St. Clair Shores.

Father Arthur M. Karey, now Monsignor Karey, served at St. Lawrence from 1949 until 1952. In 1950, Father Henry Kreft became a second resident assistant. Father Arthur and Father Henry were especially interested in the young people of the parish and the Club Laurentian flourished under their combined leadership. Father Kreft left St. Lawrence in 1955 and is now pastor of Sacred Heart Church, Auburn Hights, Michigan, From 1955 on the parish began to decrease in membership and the shortage of priests was becoming already acute in this diocese, and so only one assistant could be given for a parish of this size. Father Edward F. Kalinowski, affectionately remembered as "Father Kali," had a short appointment here. He is now deceased, having passed away at 59 years of age, while pastor of St. Raphael Parish in Garden City, Mich.

Father Joseph F. Kernosek, ordained in 1946 and best remembered as Father Joe, followed for the next five years. His tremendous sense of humor and joviality aided him in his priestly work which he shouldered so well. Even though he is now pastor the of famous "Labor Day Weekend Festival" sponsored by his parish of St. Aloysius in Romulus, Mich. Fr. Joe is still a familiar face at many St. Lawrence Parish functions. His exuberance and "new youthfulness" make him feel most welcome in the parish.

The last appointed by the Chancery inresidence assistant pastor was Father George Majewski, who remained until June, 1966. He was transferred to St. Stanislaus Church, Detroit, where he died at a relatively young age (only 18 yrs. in Priesthood) suddenly while at sleep in 1970. He will be always remembered for his concern for all in the parish and particularly for the elderly confined shut-ins of the parish. Father edited the monthly parish publication. The Lauretian, with the assistance of many who submitted articles and reports for publication. His frequent enjoyment of a good cigar added to his capable administratorship, which he fulfilled during the illness of Father Belcer.

For many years the Redemptorist Fathers from Holy Redeemer Parish willingly helped out on week-ends or giving Missions, Retreats and Forty Hour Devotions at St. Lawrence. Among them three of the most recognized are: Father John Schneider, Father Dave Shannon, and Father Joseph Dustin, the famous "banjo" priest. Of course, Father John Schneider is the most familiar because he has almost continuously for the past four years so graciously responded to Father Jerome's invitation for help. Father John will always remember the tribute paid to him on the Golden Anniversary of his ordination in 1970 by the people of St. Lawrence. A very thrilling moment was the presentation of the Apostolic Blessing from the Holy Father, Pope Paul VI at the Mass. Mention must also be made that the Franciscan Conventual Fathers from St. Anthony Monastery on Vernor Hwy. and the Marion Fathers from Iroquois Ave. Mission House were often ministering to the spiritual needs of the parishioners. Only one year was enjoyed by Father John Krol here at St. Lawrence. Fr. John, a very learned and talented man of God, who suffered heavily in the concentration camp during World War II came to Detroit to serve in many parishes before he came to St. Lawrence, where he really felt at home. His profound sermons, especially stressing the teachings of Christ according to St. Paul, were most powerful. He spoke fluently in seven languages and could read and understand five more. He suffered a heart attack on June 10, 1969 and was laid to rest with services at St. Lawrence and burial in the Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

#### Reverend Father James E. Bates



# Servicemen's Memorial



A life-size statue of St. Lawrence, the young deacon who died for his loyalty to Christ after being burned on the gridiron, and the bronze engraved plaque attached to a stone base and standing prominently on the front lawn of St. Lawrence Church, is the MEMORIAL donated by the parents, Edward & Maryanne, family and friends of Pfc. Marine David J. Gronau. The memorial is in his memory and all St. Lawrence sons who died in U. S. Service.

A lifelong Detroit resident, David attended St. Lawrence Elementary School and was a 1966 graduate of Holy Redeemer High School, where he played football and baseball. He enlisted in the Marine Corps in April, 1967 and arrived in Vietnam Sept. 14. He was killed by a Viet Cong grenade, one month and a day after he arrived in Vietnam, October 15, 1967.

He was buried with full Military Services after church liturgy on October 30, 1967 in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

The statue was blessed by Father Jerome Szelc, Pastor, in the presence of many parishioners and with the services of men from the Sgt. Romanowski Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, on Sunday, Dec. 8, 1968 — the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, Patroness of our country.

# OUR PARISH IS NOTED FOR A TRULY APOSTOLIC SPIRIT IN ITS ORGANIZATIONS

Every parish is measured by the spirit of its parishioners and is, indeed, a reflection of that spirit.

When that spirit is illustrated by devotion of parishioners to many spiritual and apostolic endeavors it is a tribute to all who are members of the parish. St. Lawrence Parish has been noted for a fine, generous and fruitful spirit. It has provided for the necessities of the parish and cooperated always with all Archdiocesan projects and programs. The missions of the Church throughout the world have received immeasurably from the contributions of this spirit. The organizations of the parish even to this day, when the image of the parish is changing, are recognized for their help, cooperation and assistance.

#### SOCIETY OF ST. VINCENT DE PAUL

This organization is concerned with helping people meet problems that arise from everyday life — offering spiritual and financial assistance as needed.

Those in real need are advised to make use of the resources that the community and city provides. Even though not very active at this time, through many years Mr. Frank Schmitz was very active and Mr. Louis Liptak from 1959 to 1969. Prayerfully the efforts of Mr. Joe Fryz, Mr. Joe Henn, and Mr. Chet Chojnicki will help to bring this vital group to activity.

#### USHERS CLUB

The St. Lawrence Ushers Club was organized in 1922, the same year the parish itself was formed. The Club records for 1923 thirty-one members with John Gruber, President. Two of the charter members, George Reckinger and Louis Liptak, have retained their membership until the present. Both are now on the Honoracy Roll.

The first official by-laws of the club published in 1923 include two in particular, which reflect the true aim and purpose of the group: The Ushers were organized for the

welfare of the St. Lawrence Parish and to work with and under the direction of the Pastor. Secondly, the group take actual charge of preserving order in and around the church during all services.

It is to the credit of the members, past and present, that these objectives have been followed with gratifying success. Throughout the years, the ushers have performed their assigned duties with quiet dignity and for the comfort of all the parishioners as a whole.

In 1972 the Ushers Club, while still retaining its original identity and purposes, became a part of the Men's Club of St. Lawrence.

#### HOLY NAME SOCIETY

Although the date of the official organization of this group in the parish is not known, it very probably was established at the same time as the Ushers Club, for in addition to their duties as Ushers, the members were urged to receive Holy Communion in a body monthly and generally carried out the functions of the Holy Name Society from the beginning. The objectives are to promote greater devotion to the Holy Name of God and of Jesus Christ and for closer family participation in the Mass and reception of the Eucharist. The spiritual advantages of membership are many. The Society has always been concerned about the youth in the parish and so has through the years been the financial and moral backbone for youth athletic programs. It sponsors the Little League and T-Ball Teams for all neighborhood boys, many of whom come from homes without any religious church affiliation. What better way is there to build Christian community and help the man of tomorrow? The Holy Name is now one of the branches of the Newly organized Men's Club of St. Lawrence Parish.

#### LADIES ALTAR SOCIETY

The Altar Society offers the women in our parish a focal point in expressing their

desire to enrich their spiritual lives, to increase their knowledge of the Church and to serve the parish in many ways.

The first officers included Mrs. George Talbot as president; Mrs. George Warner as vice-president and Mrs. Paul Fischer as secretary-treasurer.

The members provide for the care of the altar and sanctuary, the vestments, and the flowers. Even though the group is perhaps best known for their social functions, such as their card and bingo parties, bake sales, flower sales, etc., all these functions are merely the means to provide and care for the Altar linens, priests vestments, and general maintenance of the Sanctuary and Sacristies. The parish has a reputation, especially among visiting clergy and laity, for its ever-immaculate and neat sanctuary, clergy and altar-boy apparel and for everbeautiful floral arrangements. Throughout the years the Society as always donated generously to every parish need and to many mission and other worthwhile projects.

There are presently 125 members on the membership roll, but it is constantly emphasized that membership is a privilege extended to all the women in the parish. The members are encouraged to join in Corporate Communion on the first Sunday of each month. Meetings are on the first Wednesday of each month.

#### CANCER PAD SEWING CLUB

The Cancer Pad Sewing Group was organized in the late fifties by a group of six or seven women headed by Mrs. Virginia Bartos. Although the membership has never exceeded thirty women, the mountains of cancer pads that have been assembled by this small group, reflects the dedication and zeal of each of the members. Mrs. Marguerite Downes, who was devotedly headed the group for the last nine years, with almost weekly get-to-gethers, has collected tons of materials which were made into pads and bandages and distributed for use of cancer patients in hospitals, homes, and wherever needed. Mrs. Josephine Zientek, a member of this group, has made over 600 "Johnny coats" an abbreviated hospital gown, from white shirts, for the use of various medical groups. Several times a year a beautiful social gathering stimulates the dedication of this very charitable group.

#### FIFTY-UP CLUB

The 50 Up Club is the "newest" of the parish organizations, having been organized in 1969 through the encouragement of Father Jerome. With the many retirees and elderly members in the parish it was pastorally sound for such a organization to be founded. The response has been stimulating and every effort is being made to seek every one over 49 years of age. This group has shown itself to be "young" in spirit, although, as the name implies, the members most admit to being at least in their "golden" years. The first and still presiding officers are: Andrew Olejnick - president, Justine Liptack - secretary, William Rash vice-president, and Catherine Reckinger treasurer. There are approximately 50 members. Most of them share many enjoyable hours together at dinners, picnics, tours, outings, card games and other planned entertainment. Annually a special Liturgy is celebrated followed by a fine dinner-party. Most of the members are also known for their generosity of time and help in all parish activities.

#### PAST ORGANIZATIONS

During the fifties years as a parish there have been several other groups which have served well, but have been discontinued because of accelerated changes in the community. There are many sentimentalized memories of yesterday by those who were members of these groups at one time. Things never were as they used to be. Neither can they ever again be just as they were. Life is process; change is inevitable. A Parish Family must be a object of that also. The Laurentian Club was a young adult group, very active during the 1950's. They sponsored many dances and other social activities that answered the needs of the community during those years. The Loyalty Club was also active during the fifties. Its membership was restricted to students attending High School. The Sodality of Mary had many members among the students of St. Lawrence School and the image of Mary, the Virgin Mother of Jesus, was ever deeply impressed on the young ladies of the parish.

The crowning of the statue of Our Lady, usually in the month of May, was the highlight of the year for the Sodality members and for the entire parish. Even though

the Sodality as such no longer exists, the devotion to the Virgin Mother is still deeply fostered and practiced in the parish. Most of the young ladies of the parish upon making their marriage vows, along with their spouse, make an act of consecration and a presentation of flowers to the Holy Family. of which Mary is the model for all Christian viwes and mothers. This invites for a happier marital and family life. Although in the recent years most emphasis is being placed on community singing, there is still memory of the Parish Choirs, especially for the major occasions of the liturgical year. There were several active choirs during the years under the direction of William Premsky and Frank Bitonti. At present Miss Ruth Rash capably directs and leads the parish, with excellent choral presentations at special celebrations in the church year.

The St. Lawrence School also had many groups that at one time or another functioned beautifully and provided activities for the children with excellent adult directionand supervision. Just to mention the Boy Scout Troop, Campfire Girls, Brownies, and Parent-Teacher Guild. Gratitude will always be rendered to the ladies who organized and worked in the Mothers Club, which after a few years became the nucleous of the PTG, so that both parents would share in the programs presented for school involvement. The benefits to the children in the last years of St. Lawrence School are well-known. So many expensive educational supplies, including the diocesan closedcircuit television setup & intercommunication set-up, were obtained throught the sacrifices of the Mothers Club and the Parent-Teacher Guild.




