## History of

## Saint Louis The King Parish

Detroit & Michigan



### "Lord I have loved the beauty of Thy house and the place where Thy Glory dwelleth."

We are celebrating the twenty-fifth anniversary of the founding of St. Louis The King Parish. It is a fitting occasion to survey the good work accomplished, and to recognize duly all who have contributed to the spiritual or material edification of this parish.

North of the city of Detroit, starting from Harper and Gratiot streets on the East, and from the southern bounderies, of the city of Hamtramck on the West, there extended a spacious community called Hamtramck, which extended to Nine Mile Road. In the process of the forming of the counties the village of Hamtramck was cut off on the North, so that to-day it borders with 8 Mile Road. In the course of time, more or less about fifty years ago, the present intersection of Mt. Elliott and Nevada, was called the Village of Norris, so called from the then owner of several acres of land in this district. But when the Norris family sold out their holdings, and migrated into another section of the State, not one but many families became the owners of the Norris property.

Since the name of the Village of Norris did not appeal to many new property owners, and wanting to associate themselves with the then growing city of Detroit, these few settlers called the Norris Village: North Detroit. The Village of North Detroit, however, had no definite bounderies, was not incorporated, and in reality was a community of Hamtramck.

The site of St. Louis The King parish, to-day is in possession of that community, which originally was North Detroit.

The last supervisor of the Village of North Detroit was Mr. Anthony Buhr, and he remained a supervisor, until the Village of North Detroit was incorporated into the City of Detroit in 1921.

Sixteen years previous to this, Mr. Louis N. Hilsendegen opened a subdivision. His wife was the daughter of Mr. Kern, who was the owner of a farm on the south-west corner of Mt. Elliot and 7 Mile Rd. The farm extended on the south to our present Hildale street, and on the west to Mound Rd. The corner of Mt. Elliott and 7 Mile Rd.; Mr. Kern sold to Mr. D. W. Simons, whose father was a Federal judge presiding in Detroit.

The parcel of land purchased by Mr. D. W. Simons ran 500 feet along Mt. Elliott, and 200 feet down Hollywood, our present Robinwood Street, and along <sup>7</sup> Mile Road, extending seven and one half feet west of Paulus Street. The remaining part of the Kern farm was granted to Caroline Kern as a dowry, who shortly after her marriage signed a joint ownership with her husband Mr. Louis Hilsendegen.

From this farm after the conclusion of the hostilities of World War I, because of the great influx of peoples from Detroit, Mr. Hilsendegen formed a subdivision. Those were days of superabundant prosperity. Everyone was employed. Not only the Ford Motor Co. but the Dodges and many other automobile factories were operating full blast. The wages were fabulous, and every worker wanted not only a home of his own, but also an automobile. The American Poles especially gave an impetus, and a shining example with their industriousness, their thriftiness, and a sincere desire to form and posses their own homes.

Mr. Hilsendegen, a man of foresight, recognized this. He knew the psychology of the Poles: their willingness to sacrifice and love of their own firesides. He knew that once the Poles purchase a home of their own, they spare no effort to make regular payments on these homes, and no hardships will deter them from their goal. But Mr. Hilsendegen also knew, that in order to have these people settle on his subdivision, a Church is necessary; which is a must with the American-Pole. He therefore, made a proposition to the then Ordinary Most. Rev. Michael J. Gallagher, by donating a parcel of land for a new church, and also made a reservation in the bequest, that a church be organized within three years of the grant, if not, then the land automatically will return to the donor.

Mr. Hilsendegen's foresight was soon to be realized. The Poles on hearing that a new church was to be erected in North Detroit, began to buy lots: some for speculation, others to build homes on these lots.

There was a religious hotch-potch in the community, with two Protestant churches in the district: one a Lutheran at Mt. Elliott and Davison, and the other a Methodist-Episcopalian at St. Louis and Nevada. There were also Catholics of various nationalities, but these were in minority. However, a two man committee was formed of Mr. Francis Nadolski and Mr. Arthur Hitchens. These two men went to see the Most. Rev. Bishop Michael J. Gallagher, and petitioned His Excellency for the organization of an English-Polish church. The Bishop definitely refused.

The time specified by the donor of the parcel of land for a new church was coming to a close. The three years were practically up, in which the church was to be organized, or else the land return back to the donor. Only one month remained! The temporarily formed committee, who were concerned about the organization of the parish, time and again petitioned the Bishop, but to no avail. The Most. Rev. Bishop, could not see how a priest could survive in this desolated community.

The committee, however, did not become discouraged. They wanted to hold on to the offered grant of land. The temporary committee increased in numbers, but some of them had to work days, and could not go to the Chancery to petition the Most, Rev. Bishop. They heard that the Bishop will be present for the Silver Jubilee at St. Stanislaus church on Sunday, the 29th of July. They delegated the speakers, and went to St. Stanislaus to present their petition again. The Most, Rev. Bishop greeted them, and was glad to see them; not only that, but He also promised to send them a priest in a few days.

The Bishop kept his word. He sent for Rev. Bernard F. Jarzembowski, who was at the time pastor of St. John Evangelist parish in Ubly, Michigan. On calling at the Chancery, the Most. Rev. Bishop presented to Fr. Jarzembowski the prospect of organization of a new parish in the vicinity of Mt. Elliott and 7 Mile Road. Fr. Jarzembowski immediately set out to survey the district, and on finding out that there were 120 families already settled, and the possibility of a greater influx of new families, he reported his findings to the Bishop, and consented to start the organization. That was on August 10, 1923.

The first church committee was comprised of Misters: Michael Jakubowski. Francis Nadolski, Sr., John Narodzonek, Stanley Latarski and Anthony Nowakowski. To these men Fr. Jarzembowski detailed the work that they were to accomplish, and stated that next Sunday the first Mass will be offered.

A candy store was rented at 18024 Mt. Elliott near Nevada, and the rental was \$30.00 a month.

The first benefactor was the Rev. Francis Grzella, pastor of St. Stanislaus church, wha donated a new Missal valued at \$25.00. Parishioners Joseph Kastler and Joseph Sosnowski made a contribution of \$100.00 per person.

Sunday, the 12th of August, 1923, the first Mass was celebrated for the intention of the parishioners. A cross was erected over the candy store, made by Stanley Latarski, Michael Jakubowski and Frank Nadolski. The parish also had an altar, which is still in existence in the present church: the Altar of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Mr. Anthony Buhr donated the lumber, and the "Mensa" of the altar was made. Mr. Frank Nadolski had a small altar at home, and this he donated for a tabernacle. There is a history connected with this tabernacle. This tabernacle originally formed the bottom of the arch of an altar in a Lutheran church at Woodward and Medbury. Fr. Van Antwerp purchased the church to establish a Catholic parish: the Holy Rosary. The building was dismantled to make room for a new edifice. Mr. Frank Nadolski was one of the carpenters working on the dismantling of the Lutheran altars. He asked Fr. Van Antwerp if he could have the arch of the altar. The permission was granted and Mr. Nadolski made for himself a home altar, and eventually it has become the altar used in the new parish of St. Louis The King.

The vestments for the church were purchased by the Pastor, and the first wine was borrowed from Holy Name parish at Van Dyke and Six Mile Rd. The hosts for the Sacrifice of the Mass were brought by the Felician Sisters, and Sr. Mary Bonaventure played the organ. Ronald and James Cawley were the first altar boys, and during the week Stanley Nowakowski. The collectors were Michael Jakubowski and Frank Nadolski.

Day after the first Mass in the new parish, 13th of August, the Rev. Pastor with the committee surveyed the donated grant of land. It looked good, but there was one catch: the property did not extend to the street. The adjacent property belonged to Mr. W. A. Simons so Mr. Simons was asked to please be kind enough, and open a street on his parcel of land. This he refused. The matter was taken up with the City Council. A hearing was held, but Mr. Simons would not hear or opening a street at his expense, and on his property. Mr. John Lodge after much bickering prevailed upon Mr. Simons and finally he relented. However, the parish had to purchase the land adjacent to the holdings of Mr. Simons. It was agreed, and the parish bought the land for \$7,500.00; and 11 lots on the east side of Paulus Street (St. Louis Ave.) for the sum of \$11,000.00. The street was opened. But there still remained the purchase of

the strip which extended to Hollywood St. (Robinwood). This property belonged to Mrs. Hilsendegen. She asked \$15,000.00 for her holdings: an exorbitant sum. Slowly through bargaining she sold the land for \$6,000.00.

The permission for the purchase was granted by the Chancery.

Rev. dear Father:

We are aware of the fact that the site donated for St. Louis Parish is too small and fronts on one street only, i. e. the Seven Mile Rd., therefore, you are hereby given permission to purchase a parcel of land adjoining the present site on the East, which will permit Paulus St. to run through, and thus give you frontage on another street. The remainder of this newly purchased parcel is to be subdivided into eleven lots and sold. You are also authorized to purchase another parcel of land South of the present church site so that the future site will be 655' x 140', after selling the eleven lots mentioned above. The first transaction is to cost eighteen-thousand dollars (\$18,000). This is to be paid with money received from the sale of the eleven lots. The second transaction is to cost six thousand dollars (\$6,000)

Once the property holdings were accomplished, a new worry arose: the need of a permanent place of worship, a school and a Sisters home. The Rev. Pastor



with the Rev. Francis Grzella went to the Mother House of the Sisters of St. Felix, and petitioned the Rev. Mother for Sisters to teach in the new parish. The Rev. Mother was well pleased with the visitors, and promised to send the Sisters, with the opening of the semester in September of 1924.

The final plans for the erection of the new church and school building were submitted to Mr. Joseph Kastler as architect, and John Lukasiewicz, Gen. Contractor.

Those were days of anniversaries, parish excursions, parties, dances, besides various other social activities. They served perhaps as nothing else to weld the people of the community into one great family. Altogether there was a strong spirit manifested, as well as a general cooperation with the Pastor in material undertakings. In other words, St. Louis The King was alive, and growing by leaps and bounds. It needed and wanted a new church and school, for which ground was broken, and on Sunday, April 27, 1924 the cornerstone was laid by the Ordinary. The blessing of the building took place on Sunday. September 1, 1924, by the Most Rev. Bishop Michael J. Gallagher. The Rt Rev. Msgr. Michael J. Grupa, rector of Polish Seminary at Orchard Lake. Mich., preached the sermon.


The building was finished at the cost of \$85,000.00 with five class rooms. The seating capacity in church was and is 624.

School opened in September, 1924, with three class rooms, and an enrollment of 140 children. The teaching staff consisted of: Sr. M. Dulcissima, principal, Sr. M. Simon and Sr. M. Christopher, who also was an organist to June, 1925. In the month of January, 1925, another classroom was opened, and Miss Marie Jakubowski was added to the teaching staff. The first scholastic year closed with 180 pupils. There were four in the graduation class in 1925; three boys and one girl: Piotrowski Stephanie. Hennig Theodore, Nickrand George and Wysocki Albin.

The second school year closed with an enrollment of 285 children. In the third year 1927-1928 the enrollment in September reached 400 pupils, so much so, that an additional teacher was added to the teaching staff: Mrs. Stella Olejniczak, who shortly after was followed by Mrs. Honoris Wojtowicz. Year after year, the pupils increased in number, so that at present the attendance numbers 500, not counting the great number that is not admitted because of the lack of appropriate facilities of accommodation.

#### RECTORY

The rectory was in several places. First the Pastor lived in a house owned by Mrs. Schwartz on Mound Rd. two blocks north of 7 Mile Rd. Then he moved to 18643 Mt. Eliiott to Mrs. Cetlinski, and from there to 18840 Dwyer St.



The present new rectory was built in 1925. The Rev. Pastor moved to the new rectory October 22, 1925 at 18805 Paulus Street, now St. Louis Ave. which name was changed in March, 1926. The Most Rev. Joseph C. Plagens, the Auxiliary Bishop of Detroit blessed the rectory. The Gen. Contractor was Mr John Lukasiewicz.

#### SISTERS HOME

In 1928 a parcel of land was purchased from Mr. Frank Nadolski on which the Sisters convent was built. A lot was bought for \$1,600 at 18888-18892 Dwyer Ave. Mr. John Lukasiewicz was the Gen. Contractor. The initial cost of the convent on completion of work amounted to \$8,500. The convent was blessed by the Most Rev. Michael J. Gallagher in July. 1928, and was occupied by the Sisters in September.

#### SOCIETIES

The first society to be organized was St. Louis The King in August. 1923: the second Young Ladies Sodality of St. Rose of Lima and the third Holy Rosary In the course of years the following were organized: Third Order of St Francis, St. Bernard. St. Ann's. Holy Name Sr., Holy Name Jr., Children of Mary, Choir Club, Guardian Angel, Polish Falcons, Fr. Ignace Skorupka Chapter St. Vincent de Paul Conference. Altar Society, St. Louis Ladies Auxiliary, Young Men's Order and Young Men's Ushers Club. Some of these Societies have ceased to exist, of the others still active, a brief history is presented in the following pages of this booklet.

#### **ASSISTANTS**

The first assistant was Rev. Joseph Zielinski, who also was professor at Orchard Lake, Mich. He came regularly every Sunday. He was followed by Rev. Sylvester Kolkiewicz from 1925 to September, 1926. The first resident assistant was Rev. Alexander Jarzembowski, brother of the Pastor. He remained at St. Louis The King to November, 1929. Then followed Rev. Ladislaus Babula. 1929-1930. Rev. Francis Sysol. 1930 — Rev. Stephen Rojewski: Rev. Edward Krawczak — Rev. Miecislaus Witkowski. Rev. Boleslaus Pakizer. Rev. Ignatius Czapski, Rev. Ladislaus Golas, Rev. Edmund S. Dommer, Rev. Francis Szczepanski and Rev. Peter P. Borkowicz.

#### REV. CONSTANTINE DZIUK

Appointed Pastor of St. Louis The King

On the recommendation of the Most, Rev. Bishop Michael J. Gallagher, Rev. Constantine Dziuk was called from St. Mary's church at Parisville, Mich., to take over the pastorate of St. Louis The King parish February 1, 1932. Those

were the days of depression, unemployment, lack of material needs, and consequently times of poverty and indegency. The financial status of the parish was in a deplorable condition. Because of the unemployment of the parishioners, the payment of the loan on the principal and interest lacked behind. Debts accumulated, until they reached the enormous sum of \$180,000.


In these dark days of material inefficiency the Rev. Constantine Dziuk took over the responsibilities of the pastorate at St. Louis The King. Known to be a man of foresight, energy, self-sacrificing, his ease of manner, his quiet repose, his qualities of heart and soul, won him soon many friends, and aided by the generous and whole-hearted cooperation of his parishioners, he initiated a money raising program, by sponsoring affairs and activities, social events. dances; curbing unnecessary expenses, adding penny to penny to keep the usurious wolf away from the portals of St. Louis the King parish. The work of raising funds was arduous and strenuous, but the good pastor was not detered by the difficulties and hardships. Twice a year he paid a visit to the homes of his good parishioners to solicit money to pay the pressing notes of interest, which were binding on the parish. Through his "dynamic" efforts, and that of his parishioners, the debt slowly decreased, and with the outbreak of World War II, when the economic conditions increased a hundredfold, the generosity of the parishioners knew no bounds. In the second half of 1945 the entire debt of parish was liquidated.

The fabulous wages paid by factories engaged in production of war materials attracted the attention of peoples living outside of the confines of the State of Michigan, and what followed was the extraordinary influx of new families to Michigan, and Detroit in particular. The parish also gained on these new families, for many of them settled in St. Louis the King parish. With new families came new obligations. The accommodations in the parochial school proved to be too small and inadequate. To remedy this condition, four new class rooms were added to the school building in 1942, at the cost of \$16,913.55.

#### SPECIAL NOTE OF THANKS




Since the St. Louis Parish is a canonically constituted territorial parish, all the Catholic people, irrespective of nationality, living within these boundries belong to this parish.

#### REV. CONSTANTINE DZIUK

Rev. Constantine A. Dziuk was born in New City (Nowe Miasto) Poland on March 11, 1880. He was the first child of Anthony and Elizabeth Tamila-Dziuk When Constantine was 5 years old, his parents migrated to the United States, and settled in Buffalo, New York. For the first year of their stay in Buffalo, they belonged to St. Stanislaus parish, and there young Constantine went to school. A new parish was organized, St. Adalberts, and the Dziuk family moved into this parish; it was here that the Rev. Dziuk received his elementary education. After compelting the parochial school, he enrolled as a pupil in Public School No. 11 at Buffalo, New York. He proved to be a very diligent pupil, and graduated from grade school with the highest honors.

His good parents recognizing his facility in studies, had him enrolled in SS. Cyril and Methodius Seminary to pursue a classical education. Here he again proved to be more than an ordinary student, and on maturing in his College studies, for his extraordinary diligence, he was awarded a scholarship from His Eminence Miecislaus Cardinal Ledochowski, to study for the priesthood in the Propagation of the Faith Seminary, Rome, Italy.

While a student at the Propagation, Rev. Dziuk, through his perseverance and fidelity has gained a friend in Cardinal Bonzano, then Rector of the Seminary, became His Eminence's secretary, and held this position until his ordination.


On March 10, 1906 Constantine A. Dziuk was ordained in St. John The Latheran Basilica, Rome, Italy, by His Eminence Cardinal Respighi. In June of the same year he celebrated his first solemn Mass in St. Adalberts church, Buffalo, New York. His first appointment was as a professor at the Polish Seminary, then at Detroit, and after 2 years of teaching, he was appointed as assistant at St Albertus parish. Shortly after he was appointed pastor of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel parish, Wyandotte, Michigan. While at Mt. Carmel he reorganized the parish, and placed it on sound financial basis.

On the recommendation of the Rt. Rev. Bishop Foley he was requested to organize a new parish under the Patronage of Assumption of B. V. M. at Warren and Lovett Sts., Detroit, Michigan. The people of the locality have been notified of the organization or a parish so sorely needed. A meeting was called at the neighboring St. Francis parish, and the first elementary plans drawn up. At Assumption Fr. Dziuk through his untiring efforts erected a rectory and a combination church and school building.

His activities during the first World War gained him praise and glory seldom achieved by a Priest in contributing to the propaganda of the love of Country. He was selected as one of the Liberty Bond Drive speakers. His work and activities were not only confined to spreading good-will among the Americans,

but he also urged Americans of Polish descent to enlist in the ranks of the then forming Polish Army at Niagara-On-the-Lake, Canada, which has become to be known as General Haller's army. For his untiring efforts in 1935 he was decorated by General Haller in the name of the Polish Government.

The sacrifices rendered during the World War, had their repercussions. Fr. Dziuk began to fail rapidly in his health, and on the recommendation of his physician left for the Upper Peninsula to recuperate. After several years, his health regained he was appointed pastor of St. Mary's parish, Parisville, Mich. He was pastor of St. Mary's for seven years. On February 1, 1932 he was recalled from St. Mary's to take over the pastorate of St. Louis The King. As to his accomplishments in St. Louis The King, the good parishioners can best testify. In the sixteen years of his pastorate the entire debt of the parish has been liquidated, and not only that, but the parish today boast to the savings of \$121,000.00 which savings with the help of God will be used for the erection of a new church. May the Almighty God in His Providence, abundantly bestow upon our good pastor graces and benefactions, that he may enjoy the completion of his plans for the St. Louis The King Parish.



#### WAR DEAD

Pause for a moment to look at the pictures of these men, who left St. Louis The King never to return. For these men, by what they did, have indeed written one of the beautiful pages in this parish's history.

#### Beautiful, you say?

Yes, beautiful! But beautiful only in direct proportion to what the lesson of their death means to us.

They did not want to die — these men whom we loved; their prayers for preservation were just as sincere as those of us who came back. But the good and merciful Lord — the all wise God — selected them from the two-hundred and forty St. Louis stalwarts to represent this parish on War's sacrificial altar. Surely He found them worthy of Life after Death!

And we? What have we learned from their sacrifice? We who, wearily sinking to our knees before an altar during those evil days, prayed: "Oh God bring us Peace! Bring us Peace! and then manufactured, without that God, a plan of baleful subjection, which merely sets the next War's stage; we who, not even

I say, some day we'll come to fully appreciate that fact — I mean really and truly appreciate it for its infinite worth. For these indeed lies the lesson to be learned from their sacrifice. And the measure of beauty in their death lies in how well we learned that lesson.

And when we have learned, we will have to become a more humble, more Christian people. We will have forgotten self and turned our eyes compassionately towards our neighbor. We will have no more confusion of mind but a real meaning to our existence.





The St. Louis Young Mens Order was organized February 29, 1932, by a group of young men for the purpose of working in unison to gain the respect and admiration of the community, the parents and the Church, and especially to take an active part in Athletic activities. To promote the Athletic endevours of the Young Mens Order moneys was raised by arranging picnics, social functions, dances, excursions etc.

The Young Mens Order was active in practically all fields of sport. Out of their ranks came boxers, and bowlers. They formed Base-Ball and Basket-Ball teams. Their Soft-Ball teams gained renown in three City finals, and through their untiring efforts of industriousness and thriftiness in time were able to purchase a permanent Club-House, where a good Ping-Pong game or Pinochle was always in progress.


The home like atmosphere of the Clubrooms attracted the attention of the Young men of the community, and consequently gathered them in respected surroundings, thus leading them to be prepared for respected citizens, and forstall the possibility of hanging around street corners.


