

St. Sylvester Church now and then

In 50 years, parishioners hold

the 1950s. The Archdiocese of Detroit expanded with the The Archdiocese bought the Theut Farm on what is now 12 Mile Road and Campbell Drive in Warren for \$45,740. In June 1959, assigned to St. Clement Church in Center Line, and the future

ollowing World War II, Detroit's population exploded and people began to migrate to the region's young suburbs in

this parcel was turned over to the Rev. Robert A. Bretz, who was parishioners of St. Sylvester Church. There were 506 families in those early parish boundaries.

On a bright and clear Sunday, July 19, 1959, Fr. Bretz celebrated two Masses for 662 parishioners at a temporary site. the auditorium of Frank Rinke Elementary School, now Macomb Christian Academy. But in order to prepare the auditorium for the Mass – setting up and taking down chairs, setting up the temporary altar and other duties - many hands were needed. It was then that the Ushers Club was formed and continues today. At the first Sunday of Masses at Rinke School, the Ushers collected from \$471 for the new parish.

Sunday masses continued at Rinke School as the parish grew in that first year. In October, the first parish bulletin, the St. Sylvester Weekly, was published. It was a one-page bulletin with parish notes and announcements on one side and the parish boundary printed on the back.

Also in the fall of 1959, a local builder allowed Fr. Bretz to use a home on Aline Drive as a temporary rectory. While Sunday Mass was held at Rinke School, daily Mass was celebrated in the basement of the temporary rectory.

In those early days, the church needed many things and they were donated by the parishioners and local businesses – a chalice, vestments, a temporary altar and tabernacle, chairs used at Mass, flowers and statues of saints.

To raise funds to build a church, the burgeoning parish held two fundraisers, the Get Acquainted Parish Dance and the Property Fund Drawing. Both were a success. The goal from the drawing was to raise \$10,000 and the parish exceeded its goal by raising \$10,064, a large sum of money in the late 1950s. The Parish Dance continued as an annual affair for years.

The Christian Mothers Altar Society was formed in Aug. 1959 and was affiliated with the Confraternity of Christian Mothers. They took care of altar linens and flowers. They also had a sick and vigil committee, sponsored card parties, fashion shows, festivals, bake sales, candy sales, rummage sales and held the annual Mother and Daughter Breakfast.

It was in Oct. 1959 that the Holy Name Men's Club was formed. The club took on the job of caring for many of the needs that arose from a growing new parish. Through the years, they sponsored things like men's and youth baseball leagues, altar boy outings, the annual Father and Son Breakfast, athletic and playground equipment for the school, retreats and cared for the Christmas Nativity.

The sun was out on Nov. 15, 1959, when enthusiastic parishioners gathered at noon for the groundbreaking ceremony


for a temporary church, now called the Fr. Bretz Center. Fr. Bretz was the first to plunge the chrome shovel into the dirt. The Rev. Arthur Krawczyk was also there. Fr. Krawczyk, who helped build St. Martin de Porres Church in Warren and later became a bishop, was a weekend assistant at St. Sylvester in 1959-1960.

A church dedication ceremony was held in the temporary church on Aug. 20, 1960. Archbishop John Dearden, the Primate of Archdiocese of Detroit, celebrated the dedication Mass along with Frs. Bretz and Krawczyk. Parishioners built the altar in the new church, along with the main altar platform. Eventually, a rectory was built along 12 Mile Road.

Within the first year, the parish's St. Vincent DePaul Society was formed to help with works of charity within the parish. They distributed food, dispersed Catholic literature and held annual clothing drives.

The parish's social activities began to bloom. Men's and women's bowling teams were formed. The first parish picnic held in April and May 1961. 







ST. SYLVESTER, POPE 314 A.D. - 335 A.D. Sylvester, a Roman

Jeft. Sylvester, a Roman priest, was chosen Pope in 314 A.D. He baptized the great Constantine who re-



leased the Christians from the catacombs by his Edict of Toleration in 312 A.D. St. Sylvester initiated the building of famous churches, notably the Basilicas of St. Peter and of St. John Lateran. The first ecumenical council was called by him. Known as the Council of Nicaea, it drew up the Nicene Creed. This creed proclaims that Jesus is true God of true God consubstantial (one in Being) with the Father. St. Sylvester died in 335 A.D. His feast is kept on December 31.
