



Never, dear Father Marvin, has there been a person more generous with his time than you. You


have always been present at our special occasions, have always been ready to pass our report cards, to help us with our problems and to counsel us when counselling was needed.

#### Valedictory

And now, my dear classmates, a farewell message to all assembled here this evening. Everything that has happened since we gathered for our Class Day Banquet has conspired to make saying "good - bye" more

difficult. The delicious banquet, the excellent company, the good wishes, the realization that this is one of those "last times" that is sort of plaguing us these days; all these make it hard to bid farewell to this event and to you who are very dear to us.

I feel that I can conclude in no more fitting way than by taking up the theme of our distinguished Salutatorian--that is, our beautiful class motto.

Thus far, Gary has presented to us an explanation of the first part of our class motto—"All for one". He has attempted to show us practical applications of this motto for our own benefit and the benefit of all, and for the glory of God. I shall now apply the same efforts to the remaining portion of our class motto—"'One for all."

The phrase "one for all" contains an abundance of meanings--or perhaps one general meaning. In either case, it seems difficult to explain in just so many words. Perhaps the best interpretation is that it means just what it says--one for all, one individual working, living, praying for the good of all.

Our motto must first be applied to literally all, every soul existing in the world. In a smaller circle, it must be applied to the Mysterical Body,the Church. Even nearer home, it must be applied to our business or place of work. But closest to the individual, it must be applied to our families--spiritual if we enter the religious state, physical if we enter the married state.

To apply this latter half of our class motto to the widest area available, the world, we need simply begin each day with a Morning Offering. In it we offer each prayer, work, joy, and suffering to God. We offer these for His glory and His intentions; and because God intends that each soul attain etermal happiness we fulfill our purpose—we become a one for all.

Vital and forceful application of our motto can be made to the Mystical Body, the Church, by assisting at Mass and frequently the sacraments. Several of the Mass prayers contain such phrases as "for all faithful Christians living and dead", "for all here present", "for all His holy Church." By saying these prayers properly we pray for and with the Mystical Body. And because the Mystical Body is a living organism, increased life in one member increases life in all. Worthy reception of the sacraments increases the life of God in our soul and consequently in all the Mystical Body. This, again, each of us becomes a "one for all."

On a more proximate plane of association, the business world, we must also apply our motto "one for all." Seemingly, since we are in a material atmosphere, our efforts for all would be material. True, we would work for the betterment of our company or business, and of course, for those individuals in it in a material manner. We would try to bring cooperation, friendliness, and honesty into our work; and the benefits might be in higher wage standards and a better working atmosphere for all. Now these efforts and their results are material and are good, as such. But are not the principles of cooperation, friendliness, and honesty based on the virtues of charity and justice? So even our wordly efforts can have a spiritual aspect in working for all.

The final phase of application is closest to the individual and probably the most dear and meaningful. We must apply our motto "one for all" to our families. This may be done through the Morning Offering, Mass and sacraments. The rewards will be family unity and a deep, abiding family love.

If one of us enters a religious order, he or she will acquire a spiritual family. And that person must be a "one for all" in spirit, will, and body for the good of the community. His or her efforts will be rewarded with unity and blessings for the order and personal sanctity for self.

As may be noted in each of the examples given, the key to the best use of our motto is the free offering of ourselves for God's glory and the general welfare of all. This too is the key to living the life God expects of us. With this impressed on our hearts, dear classmates, let us go forth into the world and be the good Catholics our loving pastor, Father Marvin, and the fine Sisters pray we will be. They have worked hard. Let us show our gratitude and worthiness by living by our motto--- "All for one and one for all."




